Alderman Doherty and Representative McAuliffe have chosen Jack Barry, a Pearl Harbor Survivor and Jim Del Medico, a Korean War Vet, to head-up a committee to come up with suggestions and options to accomplish the restoration.

There are 51 veterans of WWI now inscribed on the current monument. Messrs Barry and DelMedico are seeking descendants of those veterans. The plan is to surround the monument with single bricks, double bricks, and benches which will be inscribed with the names of the veterans. A donation is asked for these bricks and benches; \$100 single brick; \$200 double brick; \$500 for one of the four benches.

Bucktown - A Walk-Through (Part II)

Many houses and businesses were razed for the building of Kennedy Expressway, among those on Damen Avenue were North Chicago Laundry, Webster Theater and the A & P (Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company), a grocery chain-store, which no longer exists in the Chicago area.

In place of the Kutza Drug Store on Webster and Damen is an interesting architectural structure. As you pass II Covo, one of today's classic Bucktown restaurants, you might recall Madzinski Hardware Store, Lewandowski's shoemaker shop, Lezon meat market, outside of the store on the sidewalk was a coop of live chickens, as well as rabbits hanging over a barrel. (Would this pass the health inspectors in these days?) Finally in this block was the Ward Offices of Alderman Terry Gabinski and the political-great Dan Rostenkowski.

As was mentioned in an earlier article, there were many families of five and more children. Such as the Toporek and Piontek families. Each had a girl enter the Sisters of the Holy Family convent ... Sr. Lydia (Toporek) and Sr. Felicia (Piontek). At Charleston was the Patulski family, of whose family son, Richard, became a Resurrectionist priest but died at an early age of a massive heart attack. Although Pocklacki's Tavern and Hall, where small wedding receptions and

Although Pocklacki's Tavern and Hall, where small wedding receptions and other family parties were had, is now gone, another newcomer, the Miratage, a French-cuisine restaurant replaces a cleaning establishment.

There was a gold star hanging in the Widak's residence (a sign that someone of the family was killed in the II World War). The Widaks were another large and active Bucktown family. Helen, who married Joe Wilkos, built up a Small Chalet Restaurant (Western and Howard) from a hamburger and sandwich shop. They later acquired Richard's Restaurant on South Harlem and Richard's Ballroom, a bit further south on Harlem. Finally, the family created the Lilac Lounge on Wolf Road and 22nd St. Stanley, another member of the family, was faithful to St. Hedwig, as was brother Joe, who sacrificed his time to coach those championship teams (previously mentioned) for St. Hedwig and Holstein Park; Millie married "Warneke" Woznicki, who moved in rank to Lieutenant in the Fire Department and Dolores, who entered the Holy Family of Nazareth convent and continues her ministry at St. Mary of Nazareth Hospital on Division Street.

In the same block on Damen were Depa's Men's Store and Rajski's Clothes and Household dry goods store. Under the direction of funeral director, Mr. Stermer, Liberty Savings Bank was opened on Damen and Dickens. The bank was moved to Milwaukee and Fullerton, for larger space accommodations and a parking lot.

Further on Damen were several store-front businesses, including a music store and Banka's Deli. On Saturday morning, one could get fresh, warm meat loaf at Banka's ... together with fresh, warm Pazik's rye bread ... a real treat!

A Chinese laundry was on the corner of Damen & McLean and a large empty lot. A National Food Store, another chain-grocery store, ended the block. Look around Armitage and Damen: a branch of Mid-America Bank replaced a drug store, the "Greek's" Ice Cream Parlor and a hardware store is now La Buchon, another French-cuisine restaurant. In these days you might look further down Damen Avenue for various boutiques and restaurants. The Fire House (Damen and Cortland) is the group of firemen, who would answer a call from Bucktown.

Walkers Raise Record Amount for Local Epilepsy Services

Walkers, runners, and supporters of all ages are expected to have raised over \$185,000 for the Epilepsy Foundation of Greater Chicago through the Foundation's 2007 Greater Chicago Epilepsy Walk, making this year's Walk the highest grossing in the event's seven year history. The Walk was held on Saturday, May 19 in Chicago's Lincoln Park. In addition, an earlier Walk was held on Saturday, May

12, in suburban Wheaton. Nearly 1,500 individuals attended the combined events. Photos from both Walks can be viewed online at the Epilepsy Foundation of Greater Chicago's web site, www.epilepsychicago.org.

Based on a tally of donations received to date, Epilepsy Foundation of Greater Chicago president Debbie Goss estimates that the 2007 Greater Chicago Epilepsy Walk will raise at least \$185,000 in gross revenue, although that total may go even higher as additional donations are turned in and totaled over the next few weeks. Money raised will be used to fund epilepsy education and support services throughout Chicago and northeast and central Illinois.

Goss was encouraged not only by the increased participant support of the Walks, but also by the growing level of corporate support the event has been generating over the past seven years.

"It's so vital that individuals see the money they contribute to events such as the Greater Chicago Epilepsy Walk being directed to those people who need it most," Goss noted. "As support from our corporate sponsors grows, a larger portion of every dollar contributed by participants and their supporters can go directly to programs and services for individuals with epilepsy and their families."

The Walk's top fundraising team, "2Es 2Ms 2Ts - Too Cute," headed by Erin and Patrick Leyden in honor of their three-year-old son Emmett, single-handedly raised nearly \$10,500 for the Foundation. Over 70 people participated as part of Leyden's team at the Lincoln Park Walk.

"Jerry Springer - The Opera" **Bailwick Repertory** 1229 W. Belmont Ave. Chicago, Illinois

Reviewed by Richard Allen Eisenhardt David Zak and his Bailwick Repertory Theatre Company have scored a coup with obtaining the rights to the United States premier of "Jerry Springer - The Opera." The show fast became a cult favorite in England

but New York so far has kept their hands off the show. I'm sure New York representatives will come to Chicago to see the show and who knows New York my get a production.

If you're a Springer fan or a cult aficionado you'll get your pleasure out of this show. Zak has assembled a cast of 29 actors under his direction who can sing like they belong in the lyric opera. They are good actors and under the choreography of Brenda Didier you would think that they were trained like Fred Astaire.

This show is not for everyone and if you are thin-skinned I suggest you don't put it on your agenda.

The music and book is a collaboration of Richard Thomas and Stewart Lee. Some of the four letter words used in the show are definitely Xrated and if you're a church going person you'll be turned off with the irreverent of Jesus is lampooned as a mama's boy, while Mary is dressed in a man's habit and God is dressed in White Fur.

Zak found an excellent actor in Brian Simmons as Jerry Springer and Jeremy Ritt is perfect as Jerry's warm-up man and later the devil when in the third act we find Springer in Hell.

The show opens with Dwight played by Joe Tokarz tells his fiance played by Katherine Gibson he has been cheating on her with a crack whore played by Harmony France and a transvestite played by Ryan Lanning and that is only part of the raunch that happens on stage. One of the highlights of the show besides the cat fight between the fiance and the whore is the first act finale that ends wit the tap dance number danced by the Ku Klux Klan.

In the third act we find Springer in Hell and those attending and not loving the production might find it a perfect place for Springer. It's wild, campy and not one everyone will like - so be forewarned.

As with many New York shows it received lukewarm and mixed reviews by the critics but under the direction of Gary Griffen it should have a successful run with \$11 million advance ticket sale before going on the road. Even if it doesn't get extended past it's fourteen week run it should return to Chicago as it is well worth the trip back to Chicago.

For the national tour Michelle Williams has the role of Shug and Jeanette Bayardelle has the role of Celie, a role that LaChanze played in New York and who lost her husband in 9/11 - but from all reports Bayradelle is much stronger singer and actress in the role of Celie as I didn't see LaChanze in the role.

Marsha Norman has dapted the play from the novel by Alice Walker with the music and lyrics by Brenda Russell, Allee Willis and Stephen Bray with choreography by Donald Byrd, sets by John Lee Beatty and costumes by Paul Tazewall. Norman's book of the show that runs two hours and forty minutes retains much of the story line of Walker's book that one might expect. The story covers the downtrodden Celie, whose sexual and social awakening over a period of four decades gives the musical its shape. While Celie is a stay-at-home woman, her traveling missionary sister Nettie played by Latoya London travels to three continents. Celie write to God and her sister but the story also

In addition to Celie and Nettie, who we find discovers her ethnic identity while she is a missionary in Africa we meet the defiant Sofia played by Chicago actress Felicia P. Fields, who should have won a Tony for best supporting actress in a musical role that she originated in New York and the role Oprah played in the move. Sofia is Celie's step daughter-in-law. We also meet the pleasure seeking Shug who is a saloon and sometimes mistress of Mister.

The show offers several plot twists and is one of Chicago's events of the year and I can only hope it has a long and healthy run. Others in the cast are Stu James as Harpo, Stephanie St. James as Squeak, Lynette Dupree, Kimberly Ann Harris and Virginia Woodruff as Church Ladies, and Adam Wade as O' Mister.

Investing for Experts: Let's Start With the Fundamentals

Luau Ribs

3 pounds boneless pork loin ribs
1 tablespoon chopped garlic
1/2 teaspoon fresh ginger, chopped
1/2 cup soy sauce
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup tomato sauce
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
3 tablespoons port wine
1 tablespoon liquid smoke

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Bring all ingredients (except ribs) to a boil, then cool. Marinate ribs 4-6 hours.

Place ribs in a rack in a roasting pan filled with 1-inch depth of water. Bake for about 1 hour. Cut into about 20 1-inch pieces and serve. Serves 8-10
