EPL Peregrine Falcons Were Named And Banded By Experts From The Field Museum On Wednesday, June 3rd

Mary Hennen and Josh Engel, from The Field Museum, will band falcon chicks born at the Evanston Public Library Peregrine Falcon nesting site. The baby falcons (eyases) will also be named at the event which is free and open to the public. Hennen and Engel will take questions from the press and the public. Limited seating is available on a first come first serve basis.

This is the 12th consecutive year that a pair of Peregrines has nested at the Evanston Public Library. This is the 10th year that Nona, the mother, and Squawker, the father have nested together at the Library.

Once on the Endangered Species list, Peregrine Falcons have made a dramatic recovery. Today there are about 20 pairs of Peregrines in the Chicago area. The banding process is a criti-

cal tactic in supporting the Peregrine population. The baby falcons will be removed from the nest, brought indoors for banding, blood sampling, and viewing, then returned to the nest. While some bird species are sensitive to human disturbance at the nest, Peregrines are able to handle it. The adults exhibit defensive behaviors such as yelling and flying at the intruders, but they are willing to accept the young when they are returned to the nest.

"COOL & DAMP" Good, Or Bad For Your Plants?

While the spring of 2012 is remembered for being unusually warm and mild, not to mention a consecutive string of about ten 80 degree days in March, the spring of 2015 will be recalled as being cool and wet. Looking back, it seems like it was raining every other day, and we even had several flooding storms. In fact, many of us had water in our basements. Concerning the coolness, many days – even the ones that

were "warm"- turned cool as evening approached, and cool damp lake Since 1922 air filtered in. Most nights this spring were at or below 50 degrees. So how do these damp and cool conditions affect plants?

The primary effect of wet, cool weather on plants in general is that it slows their growth. Most plants prefer a warm temperature to optimally grow roots into the soil. The cool temperatures inhibit the root growth which then translates to less top growth. Mind you, some plants do really well with the cool temperatures. However, many of our favorites like Coleus, Vinca Periwinkle, Sweet Potato Vine, the herb Basil, Cucumbers, to name a few, really struggle with the cold. Excessively cool temperatures (like night temperatures around 50 degrees) can cause a stunting effect whereby the plant is "frozen in time" by the cool temperatures. Then extra warm temperatures are needed to shake the plant out of its initial cold shock. This cold shock or stunting can be accompanied by defoliation (the process of leaves randomly falling off) on some occasions. This is especially true of Sweet Potato Vines.

Excessive dampness caused by flooding or repeated rains promotes root rot. Several customers reported that their Vinca Periwinkle was experiencing root rot. Others had rot problems with their tropical Caladiums. When it is cool and damp, planting young tender annuals into a cold, damp soil usually presents problems. The coolness prevents the plant from robustly growing, while the excessive dampness challenges the plant's ability to dry out and grow. It is almost like repeatedly dunking someone in water. If dunked enough times, eventually one cannot take it and they expire. The purpose of writing on the topic of how cool damp weather affects plants is to inform the reader of the truth. Knowing this information will help you diagnose problems in the future. Ultimately, we cannot control the weather; however, being armed with the knowledge can help us understand what is going on when it happens in the future. Urhausen Greenhouses is located at 6973 N. Do's and Don'ts Of Negotiations

When you are negotiating in a real estate transaction, it pays to have an experienced and knowledgeable Realtor to negotiate on your behalf. Here are some tips in preparation for the transaction.

Before you even find a home, get financially qualified and be able to provide proof. This will help if you are competing with another buyer for the same house. It implies you are organized and shows the seller you can actually afford the home.

Take The K.I.S.S. Principle Home For National Safe Boating Week

May 11, 2015 – May 16-22 is National Safe Boating week, reminding anyone who spends their time on the water to think about ways they'll have a great summer and avoid any chance of becoming US Coast Guard statistic. The BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water has four tips that follow the familiar K.I.S.S. principle – but with a bent for boating safety – that are near universal:

Keep your life jackets handy: This means readily accessible within arms reach, not still in it's plastic bag or behind compartment doors buried under junk. Better yet, wear it. You'd be surprised at how comfortable and slim today's newest inflatable life jackets are.

Instruct your passengers on where to sit and how to move about the boat safely. This applies to all boats, but the smallest ones can have biggest problems: swamping, large wakes and overloading can turn your day into one you'd rather forget.

See that all passengers are briefed on where emergency equipment is kept and how to use it: don't forget to show how to use the VHF radio, and what everyone needs to do in case someone falls overboard (designate a spotter).

Share your float plan with someone ashore to let them know where you're headed and expected to return. The simple act of telling someone has been demonstrated to greatly reduce a rescuer's response time.

Mayor Emanuel Announces Riverwalk Attractions To Open For Summer 2015 Full Array Of Chicago Dining, Educational, Cultural And

Full Array Of Chicago Dining, Educational, Cultural And Recreational Activities To Be Available This Summer

As part of his efforts to transform the river into a recreational frontier, Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced that phase two of the Chicago Riverwalk will open tomorrow, and also announced the lineup of vendors that will provide dining, educational, cultural and recreational activities along the waterfront stretch from LaSalle to Lake Shore Drive for the 2015 summer season. The exciting new lineup includes numerous dining options, live entertainment, biking, kayaking, cruises, boat rentals and water taxis. The Riverwalk will also offer live music later this summer through the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE).

"It's exciting to see the vision of the Riverwalk coming together and becoming a reality. It's a big step forward in making the river the next great recreational frontier in Chicago," said Mayor Emanuel. "Memorial Day Weekend has long been the unofficial start to summer in Chicago and I can't think of a better time to start to open up the Riverwalk so families can relax, have lunch or dinner and enjoy our great city."

Located along the main branch of the Chicago River, the Riverwalk is being constructed as a continuous walkway and recreational amenity connecting the lakefront with the heart of downtown.

"The Chicago River is one of our city's greatest – and underutilized -- natural assets. I commend Mayor Emanuel's effort to connect the lakefront with the heart of downtown and to turn the valuable, underused real estate along the river into an attraction for city residents and tourists alike," said Senator Durbin. "I supported TIFIA's expansion and am pleased Chicago seized the opportunity to tap the program for this valuable project."

The newest section, which opens tomorrow, connects to the existing Riverwalk east of State Street to Lake Shore Drive. The three new sections are thematically named: The Marina (from State to Dearborn) will feature a restaurant and area for boats to dock; The Cove (Dearborn to Clark) will offer rentals and other amenities for kayakers; and the River Theater (Clark to LaSalle) will connect Upper Wacker to the River through a series of steps and a ramp designed to accommodate wheelchairs and strollers. The Marina and the Cove are now open, and the River Theater will open in early June.

The final phase of the Riverwalk will begin this summer extending the River walk to Lake Street, with the following three themed sections: The Water Plaza (LaSalle to Wells); The Jetty (Wells to Franklin) and The Boardwalk (Franklin to Lake).

The six new sections of the Chicago Riverwalk are financed through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Transportation Infrastructure Finance Innovation Act (TIFIA) program.

In addition, DCASE will offer weekly music series and programming, which will take place later this summer; a full list of programming and events will be released in the coming weeks.

Mayor Emanuel's goal of making the Chicago River the city's next recreational frontier launched in 2011 with the construction of three new boathouses in neighborhoods throughout the city, as well as a fourth in the Bridgeport neighborhood that is set to be completed by 2016. The city's commitment to investing in increased recreational usage of the river ways is also evident in the recent expansion of Ping Tom Memorial Park that opened along the Chicago River, north of 18th Street at the edge of the Chinatown and South Loop neighborhoods. The park reflects the City's pledge to river development with a \$6 million investment in new parkland, riverwalk, native plantings, topography, new vistas, boat landings and a "disappearing" staircase into the water.

The Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) has been working on the Chicago Riverwalk since East-West Wacker Drive reconstruction began in the 1990s. The roadway was reconfigured to accommodate the expansion of the riverwalk to promote a pedestrian walkway and activate the space as a public amenity. The East-West Wacker Project included utility build-outs for the future Riverwalk build-out for the entire length from Michigan to Lake Street.

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FLAG DAY

Each year on June 14 we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes, which came into being on June 14, 1777. At that time, the Second Continental Congress authorized a new flag to symbolize the new Nation, the United States of America.

The Stars and Stripes first flew in a Flag Day celebration in Hartford, Connecticut in 1861, during the first summer of the Civil War. The first national observance of Flag Day occurred June 14, 1877, the centennial of the original flag resolution.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. It was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance by resolving "That the 14th day of June of each year is hereby designated as Flag Day....". The measure was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

Although Flag Day is not celebrated as a Federal holiday, Americans everywhere continue to honor the history and heritage it represents.



PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

"I Pledge Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for All"

The Pledge of Allegiance received official recognition by Congress in an Act approved on June 22, 1942. However, the pledge was first published in 1892 in the Youth's Companion magazine in Boston, Massachusetts to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America, and was first used in public schools to celebrate Columbus Day on October 12, 1892.

In its original version, the pledge read "my flag" instead of "the flag of the United States." The change in the wording was adopted by the National Flag Conference in 1923. The rationale for the change was that it prevented ambiguity among foreign-born children and adults who might have the flag of their native land in mind when reciting the pledge.

The phrase "under God" was added to the pledge by a Congressional Act approved on June 14, 1954. At that time, President Eisenhower said: "in this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our Country's most powerful resource in peace and war."

The American's Creed

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies. (Authorized Version)

The Creed was written in 1918 by William Tyler Page of Friendship Heights, Maryland in the course of a nation wide contest on the subject. Page was a descendent of President Tyler, and Representative John Page. who served in the Congress from 1789-97. William Tyler Page began his government career as a Congressional page in December of 1881. In 1919 he was elected Clerk of the House of Representatives, and held that position until December of 1931. A new post, Emeritus Minority Clerk, was then created for him which he occupied until his death on October 20, 1942.

How to Fly the United States Flag

(From literature by the VFW National Veterans and Military Services)

- The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously. 1.
- 2. The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.
- 3. When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.
- 4. When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to theeast in a north/south street.
- 5. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.
- 6. The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.
- The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial 7. Day then raised to the top of the staff.
- 8. Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- 9. The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using an all-weather flag.
- 10. The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

Taking Care Of Rover After You're Gone



Your pet may have been with you for years. In fact, pet ownership can likely lead to a higher life expectancy. A report by The British Journal of Health Psychology found that pet ownership resulted in lower blood pressure, lower cholesterol, and better overall health. In fact, pets may be especially helpful when you are in the greatest need. A study in Public Health Reports found the heart attack survival rate among pet owners was 28% higher than among those without pets. For example, according to the ASPCA, 2-3% of pets entering shelters each year do so because of the death or disability of their owner. That is between 120,000 to 240,000 loving cats and dogs who end up in shelters, or worse, because of their owner's death or disability. None of us like to consider our own mortality. When doing your planning, don't forget the pet members of your family. These loving, vulnerable members of your family need you to plan for them, too.

While you cannot prevent your own death or disability, you can prevent your loving pet from ending up in a shelter or being euthanized at your death. You can arrange with your friends or family for someone to be your pet's caretaker upon your death or disability. The estate plan you create for your family should include a "Pet Trust," a trust which ensures that your loving pet is cared for even after you are gone. Your Trust can set aside some money to provide for your pet's food and medical needs for the remainder of your pet's years. Your Trustee will administer that money and is under a duty to use the money that you set aside for your pet's needs. If you choose, you can even pay your pet's caretaker a monthly stipend or a set sum for taking on this responsibility. If you have no friends or family to act as caregiver for your pet, consider designating a charitable organization such as Best Friends (www.bestfriends.org), Bideawee (www.bideawee.org), or a similar pet adoption / rescue agency to take your pet, along with a donation, to the charity as part of your estate plan. Village Cooking Corner

BAKED COD FISH ALA KALAMATA (BAKALIARO PLAKI)

From the Kitchens of Anastasia E. Weaver

This is a recipe that was handed down to me by our mother who came from the area of Kalamata the capital of Messinia in the southern tip of the Peloponnese in Greece. It is a favorite in homes throughout Greece and the United States.

4 to 6 filets of fresh cod 1 finely sliced onion 2 garlic cloves, mashed ½ cup extra virgin olive oil Juice of 1 lemon 1 cup water ½ cup currants, or raisins soaked in 1 cup of white wine 1 (16 oz) can whole tomatoes chopped Several whole cloves 2 Tbsp. chopped parsley Salt and pepper to taste This regime is bitter if you are able to purchase (dry cod

This recipe is better if you are able to purchase (dry cod fish - bakaliaro*) rather than fresh cod. But either will work fine. Assuming you purchase dry cod fish, place in water so that you can get rid of the heavy salt. Keep in water for a full day and change the water frequently. Rinse and saute in hot oil until slightly browned. If you use fresh cod, you will not need to saute, but the flavor of the dry cod fish is really extraordinary.

Place the cod filets in a greased baking pan. Sprinkle each steak with salt and pepper; rub with garlic and pour lemon juice over the fish. Lightly, saute in olive oil the onions, parsley and the tomatoes. Add the currants or raisins, wine, cloves and 1 cup of water. Simmer about 5 minutes. Pour this sauce over the fish and bake at 400 degree F for about 45 minutes to an hour. Baste the fish several times as it is baking. You may have to add just a little more water as it bakes.

This is great served with green vegetables e.g., Dandelion greens or Endive, seasoned with salt extra virgin olive oil and lemon juice and a crusty Greek bread for dunking the delicious sauce.
