Stay Safe During Very Cold Weather

From the City of Evanston

- **Staying Safe Outdoors** • Wear several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing rather than one layer of heavy clothing. Wool offers good protection from extreme cold and moisture.
- Don't forget to wear a hat, gloves and scarf. In extreme cold, frostbite can occur within 60 seconds. Make sure to cover all exposed skin.

• Restrict outdoor exposure for infants, children and pets.

Staying Safe Indoors

- Never use your oven for heat.
- Use electric space heaters with extreme care, and avoid placing them near curtains or other flammable materials. Be sure to turn them off before going to bed.
- Keep cabinet doors open under kitchen and bathroom sinks overnight to help prevent frozen water pipes, and insulate water pipes in unheated spaces, like garages, basements and crawl spaces.
- Install and maintain smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in every level of your home, replacing the batteries at least twice a year.

Staying Safe on the Road

- Don't run your car or truck in your garage, even if you leave the door open, and make sure the tailpipe is clear of snow, ice and other debris.
- Ensure antifreeze levels are sufficient to avoid freezing.
- Maintain a full tank of gas.

Prevent Water Service Lines from Freezing

During cold weather, property owners should take precautions to prevent the water service line from freezing:

- Insulate or wrap UL-listed heat tape around water pipes.
- Keep cabinet doors open under kitchen and bathroom sinks overnight.
- Run water at a small trickle.
- Set the thermostat no lower than 55 degrees.

Electric Vehicle Charging Station at Oakton-Skokie CTA North Lot

In late November, the Village of Skokie competitively selected a firm to install an Electric Vehicle (EV) charging station in the community. The North Shore Electricity Aggregation Consortium, of which Skokie is a member, worked together to receive proposals and identify prime locations for charging stations in their member communities.

Skokie has started with one EV charging station at the short-term parking lot at the northwest corner of Searle Parkway and Skokie Boulevard. This is the first operational charging station within the consortium through this process.

The Skokie charging station initially, will be offered at no cost for visitors to charge their electric vehicle. The two parking spaces provided for the charging area will also be exempt from the 15-minute parking regulation. The station will have two plugs to charge two vehicles simultaneously, automatic retractable charge cords and a daylight-readable screen.

The consortium communities also are applying for the State of Illinois EV Charging station rebates that will return 50 percent of the charging station and installation costs to the Village of Skokie.

Selecting a Trustee You Can Trust



Finding a suitable person or company to manage your financial assets can be an agonizing process. For many people, there are two key questions: "Who can I trust?" and "Who is capable of handling the financial duties?" Hopefully, your trustee has the investment savvy and organizational skills to keep everything on track and moving forward, but if there isn't an underlying foundation of trust, nothing else matters.

The transfer of control to a trustee other than yourself comes into play under three different conditions: 1) you no longer want to, nor feel capable of, successfully managing

the assets yourself; 2) you are incapacitated and unable to make the decisions; or 3) you have passed away.

A trustee is given the authority to manage the trust's assets for the benefit of another person – called a beneficiary. The trustee will watch over your assets according to the instructions in the trust agreement. And your trustee has the fiduciary duty to act responsibly and in good faith.

The process the trustee goes through in fulfilling his or her duties is often referred to as trust administration. Duties that are commonly given to a trustee include investing the trust's assets, receiving the income that the assets earn, making income and principal distributions according to the requirements of your trust agreement, maintaining detailed financial records, making periodic accounting and tax reports to the beneficiaries as well as preparing and filing the trust's income-tax returns.

Upon the death of the creator of the trust or at some other specified time, the trustee must make arrangements for the distribution of the trust's property and then the trust will eventually be terminated.

You can choose almost anyone to be your trustee as long as the person is an adult and is not legally disqualified from serving. So, you can name your spouse, brother, aunt, friend, partner, attorney or anyone else. The advantage is that you typically have a high level of trust in this person and that he or she knows you well.

Note, however, that if a family member who is a potential beneficiary (or whose dependents are potential beneficiaries) is named as trustee, special provisions may be required to be added to the trust agreement to ensure that certain undesirable income and estate tax consequences do not apply to him or her.

If you're so inclined, you may decide to name a corporate trustee. This alternative is especially advantageous for substantial and complex trusts. Banks and other institutions have financial expertise in these matters. They can also remain impartial as they carry out the instructions in the trust. This can help reduce the occurrence of squabbles among family members. The disadvantages of a corporate trustee may be evidenced in higher fees, lack of convenience, and no personal touch.

Some people even choose to have co-trustees. This enables them to designate one person for the administrative and financial concerns and another person to make sure the personal wishes of the family are followed. This approach may work well for elderly spouses who inherit their husband's or wife's estate and are not equipped to manage the assets but are capable of participating in all the decisions.

Regardless of which selection you make, you should always name a successor trustee. If for any reason the original trustee cannot continue, an alternate will be designated to step in and take over the duties. Choosing wisely can give a person peace of mind about his or her financial situation. Making a poor choice can lead to inconsistent decisions, financial losses and endless frustration.

Costs will vary depending on the amount of the trust's property and the individuals or institutions that are part of your trust administration team. Many firms will charge an hourly rate for each person's time based on education and experience. One helpful tip when dealing with legal and financial professionals is that your family can save money on billable hours by volunteering to do as much of the legwork as possible. This may simply be making a few phone calls and tracking down information.

In the end, the choice is yours. There isn't one master estate plan or trustee strategy that works for everyone. It's a matter of personal preference. But you do need to consciously make the choice rather than leaving your estate up for grabs.

REAL WOMEN SPEAK UP VOTER REGISTRATION AT RESURRECTION

Seniors in Ms. Maria Fumic's Modern American History class registered to vote during the week of January 13, 2014, taking advantage of Illinois' new law which permits 17-year-olds to participate in Illinois primary elections.

At Resurrection College Prep High School students are taught that "Real Women Speak Up," and exercising one's right to vote is an important part of having one's voice heard. Resurrection seniors, and some juniors, registered to vote the week of January 13, 2014 during their social studies classes. As of January 1, 2014, Illinois has enacted a new law which permits 17-year-olds to participate in Illinois primary elections, as long as they will be 18 by the November general election.

Young eligible voters (18 to 29 year-olds) have traditionally voted at the lowest rates because they are not prepared for participation. The new policy ensures more young people are on the voter rolls and prepared to participate in the general election. Studies show youth will vote if asked to do so - this policy will increase youth engagement in the political process by creating an ethos of participation from a younger age. Voting when young forms a lifetime habit and once a person votes, that person is likely to vote again. Students at Resurrection are learning to exercise their voting rights and learning that "Real Women Speak Up."

Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today that the property tax bill mailed to nearly 1.8 million Cook County owners contains debt figures for every local government that taxes a home, business or other real estate property.

Property owners can use their 2013 first installment tax bill to track how much of that total debt is from their own seven to 20 local governments. The bills, due March 4, 2014, show these categories:

- Money Owed by Your Taxing Districts
- · Pension and Healthcare Amounts Promised by Your Taxing Districts
- Amount of Pension and Healthcare Shortage
- Percentage of Pension and Healthcare Costs Taxing Districts Can Pay

Pappas said taxpayers "should be aware of how local government debt affects their finances. Just as they need to know how much credit card debt they have, taxpayers should know their local government debt. This information should be a wake-up call: Your local government debt is like having seven to 20 credit cards you may not know you had." Lawrence Msall, president of the Civic Federation, said the bill not only gives taxpayers information about total debt, but breaks out pension and healthcare costs that threaten to overwhelm local governments.

"By putting these numbers on individual property tax bills, Treasurer Pappas has taken an important step toward educating taxpayers about the crippling level of debt and pension obligations carried by many of our local governments," Msall said. "These obligations are a growing threat to the fiscal and economic stability of our communities."

Pappas said that people have a right to know where their tax money is going, and showing them the debt of the governments closest to them, local governments, "is transparency in its highest form."

Pappas explained that the information comes from the Debt Disclosure Ordinance (DDO), which requires all primary local governments across Cook County to report their financial data yearly to the Treasurer's Office. Pappas also put the DDO data on cookcountytreasurer.com, where taxpayers can look deeper into the finances of the individual taxing districts that claim shares of their tax bill.

"The debt you see on your bill will raise the property taxes that you pay today and your children will pay tomorrow," Pappas said. "We are leaving a debt-filled future to our children."
