MISSION ACCOMPLISHED FOR "OPERATION: MOMS COOKIES" AND NORWOOD CROSSING'S HUG

Last November, a busload of Norwood Crossing residents rode to suburban Wilmington to complete a mission that began at Norwood Crossing when HUG was formed to involve residents in their Chicago community. HUG, an acronym for Help, Understand, Give, enables residents of the long-term care



retirement community at 6016-20 N. Nina Ave. in Chicago, to actively participate in a local project. After deliberating and reviewing about 30 non-profit organizations, the residents selected OPERATION: MOMS Cookies, an acronym for Men/Women of Military Service. MOMS provide basic everyday necessities in care packages year-round to U.S. military troops in Afghanistan and Iraq. During four Friday afternoon gatherings in the new Norwood Crossing Assisted Living building, 10 – 15 residents and their family members wrote 119 cards and filled 147 packages with treats and goodies. Copies of a sketch of logs in a fireplace that a HUG member drew and titled, "Norwood Crossing, We'll Keep the Home Fires Burning," were made and inserted into each card. While working on the project, many residents who either served or knew a loved one who served in World War II felt a special bond with the servicemen and women and were able to reminisce about former war times. Big Ten City Managers' Group Meets in Evanston to Discuss Sustainability

The City of Evanston hosted the Winter meeting of the Big Ten City Managers group Thursday and Friday this week. The Big Ten City Managers group is made up of the City Managers of the six cities with the Council-Manager form of government that host Big Ten Conference universities (Evanston, IL; Champaign, IL; State College, PA; Ann Arbor, MI; East Lansing, MI; and Iowa City, IA). Each meeting is focused around an issue facing communities and representatives from all twelve Big Ten Conference cities and universities are invited to attend.

The subject of the Winter meeting was sustainability issues and eight of the twelve communities/universities sent representatives to Evanston to participate in the meeting. In addition to the six City Manager communities and their universities, representatives from Urbana, IL; Bloomington/Indiana University and Lincoln/University of Nebraska also participated.

Each community and university made presentations about their separate and joint sustainability projects. The meeting also included a roundtable discussion of best practices. Evanston/Northwestern University was represented by City Manager Wally Bobkiewicz, Evanston Sustainable Programs Coordinator Catherine Hurley and Northwestern Manager of Refuse and Recycling Julie Cahillane.

Both Ms. Hurley and Ms. Cahillane gave a joint presentation on Evanston/Northwestern efforts. There was much interest in the implementation of the Evanston Climate Action Plan (many other Big Ten communities are just now moving to create such a plan), the many community environment/sustainability organizations in Evanston and at Northwestern and the early success of the City's Green Building Ordinance and the focus Northwestern has had on building LEED certified buildings long before the Evanston Green Building Ordinance.

Some of the programs presented by other communities of particular interest to Evanston/Northwestern were the expansion of self-service car rentals in the community, greater emphasis of recycling during student move outs each Spring, continued publicity of the City and University recycling programs and the development of a community-wide sustainability challenge program involving residents and businesses.

The sustainability directors of the universities in the Big Ten have an existing network and many of the sustainability directors in the cities are part of larger municipal networks for dialogue. This meeting was the first time that both groups have met together to exchange ideas and have promised to continue the sharing after the meetings concluded.

South Branch Library to Close Feb. 26

The South Branch of the Evanston Public Library, located at 949 Chicago Avenue, is scheduled to close at the end of business on Saturday, February 26, 2011 upon termination of the lease. This closure is a result of reduced funding as part of the City of Evanston budget process that provided the Evanston Public Library Board with \$3.7 million to allocate for library services.

Additionally, the South Branch exterior book drop will close at the end of business on February 26. After this date, library materials can be returned to either the Main Library (1703 Orrington Ave.) or the North Branch (2026 Central Ave.). The South Branch collection will be reallocated throughout the system for outreach efforts, summer reading programs, reading train stops, etc.

"The city would like to recognize the outstanding efforts of the public, the Evanston Public Library Board and the Evanston Public Library Friends. Specifically, we would like to thank the Friends who were able to raise \$108,400 to be combined with \$50,000 from the Evanston Public Library Board to fund operations at the South Branch for six months through the end of February 2011," said Library Director Mary Johns. "This was an extraordinary feat that demonstrates the support that the Evanston community has for its library services."

The South Branch first opened in 1917 at 926 Chicago Avenue and moved in 1934 to its current location. The City of Evanston would like to thank the community for their support through the years.

Skokie Burn Awareness Week Information -Preventing Scalds

The Skokie Fire Department reminds us that February 6 to 12, 2011 is Burn Awareness Week. In conjunction with Burn Awareness Week, the Skokie Fire Department advises on ways to prevent scald burns.

Scald burns are preventable and infants, young children, older adults and people with disabilities are the most at risk for such an injury. It is this group of people who are more likely to require hospitalization and suffer complications.

Most burn injuries occur in the person's own home and a majority of these injuries could have easily been prevented.

The Skokie Fire Department recommends the following simple safety tips to decrease the risk of scald burns.

· Set home water heater thermostats no higher than 120 degrees Fahrenheit.

 \cdot Provide adult supervision when bathing children. Run cold water first and gradually add hot water. Turn hot water off first.

 \cdot Establish a "kid free zone" out of the traffic path between the stove and sink where kids can play safely.

 \cdot Cook on back burners when children are present.

· Never drink or carry hot liquids while children are present.

Evanston Mayor Elizabeth Tisdahl and CUB Executive Director David Kolata announced Evanston's participation in the CUB Energy Saver program in a press conference on August 9th ,2010. In five short months, 330 Evanston residents signed up to participate, and CUB estimates the are saving a total of \$6,542 a year on their electric bills by implementing recommended changes.

"Poison prevention education is vital to the public's safety," said Michael Wahl, MD, managing medical director, IPC. "By using the entire month of March as a means to increase awareness of this serious health issue, we hope to reduce the incidence and injury caused by poisonings."

Year after year, millions of accidental poisonings occur in America – the majority of them affecting children. Last year, the Illinois Poison Center (IPC) handled more than 90,000 exposure and information calls – 52 percent involving children age 5 and under – on everything from household chemicals and carbon monoxide to medicines and mushrooms.

According to Illinois Poison Center experts, preparing yourself and your family is the best way to avoid a potential poisoning.

IPC Tips to Prevent Poisonings:

• Store all food and beverages in a completely separate area away from cleaners, medicines, automotive, yard and healthcare products.

• Keep medicines and household products in their original containers with original labels

• Always read labels before using medicines, cleaners and other products

- Teach children to ask first before eating or drinking anything
- Never call medicine candy or make a game out of taking it

ful reforms passed before raising taxes was even a consideration," said McAuliffe.

The legislation will increase the personal income tax rate from 3 to 5 percent for the next four years and then it will decrease to 4 percent. The new legislation is supposed to generate \$6 billion.

"The Democrats who control state government have gone on a spending spree over the last eight years and now are asking the taxpayers of Illinois to pay for it," he said.

Representative McAuliffe has been a strong opponent of tax increases and has supported many reform initiatives to change the way business is done in the State of Illinois.

The new legislation will also increase the corporate income tax from 4.8 to 7 percent.

"During this time when millions of people in Illinois are unemployed, we should be holding the line on taxes and finding ways to entice companies to set up shop in Illinois. We need to find ways to put people back to work and make it profitable for businesses to operate in our state or they will go elsewhere," said McAuliffe. "Higher taxes on employers and families will simply drive more people to leave Illinois."

Shakespeare Theatre is known for its dramas, historical epics and comedies. "As You Like It" now on the main stage is one of Shakespeare's better comedies. Some of his works have been adapted as musicals, also. If you see a Shakespeare play be aware the show will run a good two hours and forty-five minutes.

"By April of 2012, the VPEAAC must submit recommendations on matters concerning video description, accessible emergency information, and the accessibility of user interfaces, apparatus functions, on-screen text menus, and video programming guides and menus on video devices," Genachowski said.

National Wildlife Federation The Real Reason for Groundhog Day

Punxsutawney Phil, America's most famous weather forecaster, will have love, not weather, on his mind when he emerges from his hole on February 2. Researchers tracked 32 groundhogs for more than four years and concluded that the real reason for the early February appearance is a version of the dating game, groundhog style.

Male groundhogs wake up after three months of hibernation to check out the available pool of ladies within their territory. They select a female with whom they spend the night, and this sleepover acts as a first date, allowing the groundhogs time to get to know each other before the official start of mating season the following month. During these meet and greet sessions, contact is confined to rubbing noses - there's no going "all the way."



After scoping out two or three females, the male groundhog returns to his burrow to sleep -7

again until March, dreaming of the hotties he has just met. When he awakes and revisits each of the females, the earlier slumber parties allow the woodchucks to skip the small talk and get right down to the business of breeding.

February 3 marked the Chinese New Year. Join us celebrating the Year of the Rabbit, a year sure to bring prosperity and abundance.

Did you know that rabbit teeth never stop growing?

Rabbit poop makes really good fertilizer.

A female rabbit is a doe; a male is a buck; young rabbits are kits.

Brace yourself for breeding - cottontails (the type that is likely to visit your backyard) start hoppin' from February to September.

Rabbits are most active at dawn and dusk.

During the winter, rabbits eat the bark of woody plants. In the summer, they eat leafy plants, like your lettuce (see solutions below).

Rabbits do not make good Easter gifts, unless they are the chocolate kind! Never purchase rabbits for someone if you are not absolutely sure they want a new pet. Considering a rabbit for your own family? Be certain it is more than just the novelty of an Easter bunny that is inspiring your gift and that your family is ready for the responsibility of raising and caring for a new furry family member.

Rabbits do not belong to the rodent family, they are lagomorphs. Wild rabbits

Worried about "abandoned" bunnies. Young rabbits are often left home alone while mama searches for food. In fact, generally, she only returns once or twice a day and stays only for five minutes. Not sure if she has returned? Place an X of yarn over the nest. If it is still intact after 12 hours, mother has not visited and the young rabbits may be orphaned. In this case, contact a licensed, humane wildlife rehabilitator (visit www.urbanwildlifecoalition.org for a listing).

Bunnies bothering your beans? Try a fence and/or creative planting. The fence can be just two feet high with posts eight inches into the ground (spaced about six to eight feet apart). Run chicken wire between the posts. Consider strategic planting - a combination of plants rabbits like and do not like. Plant a row of chili peppers around the perimeter or woven through the beans or other plants rabbits are munching. Tempt them away from your beans with delicious cabbage planted far away.

BE SURE TO GET YOUR STATEMENT

Your Social Security Statement is an important document that can help you plan for your retirement. Whether you're a young worker just starting a career or a seasoned employee ready to retire, the Statement is designed to help you.

The Social Security Statement includes a message from the Commissioner and a record of your earnings each year. It provides you with retirement benefit estimates using different retirement scenarios. The Statement also provides estimates of disability and survivors benefits for you and your family in the event that you become disabled or die.

If you're like most workers who pay Social Security taxes, you automatically receive a Statement in the mail each year, about three months before your birthday. But there are situations in which a person may not be receiving a Statement each year.

For example, if you work each year, but your earned income is low enough that you do not need to file a tax return, you won't receive an automatic Social Security Statement. Also, if you are younger than 25 years old, or if you are already receiving benefits, you won't receive an automatic Statement each year.

However, if you need a Statement, you can request one. Just go to www.socialsecurity.gov/mystatement. There, you can learn more about the Social Security Statement, and request to have one mailed to you. Keep in mind that if you're already receiving benefits, your Statement will continue to show your updated earnings each year you work, but will not provide an estimate of future benefits.

- Here's what you'll need to make your request:
- · Your name as shown on your Social Security card;
- · Your Social Security number;
- · Your date of birth;
- \cdot Your place of birth; and
- · Your mother's maiden name.

The online request also is handy for people who do receive their automatic Statement each year, but can't find their most recent one and have some financial planning to do. You can request to have one mailed to you at any time.

Keep in mind, however, that if you request to have one sent to you even though you already receive one automatically each year, the next scheduled automatic Statement will be canceled. You'd then receive your next automatic Statement in the following year. For more information, read the Social Security Statement page at www.socialsecurity.gov/mystatement. Chicago Career Tech is expanding the businesses and nonprofit organizations it partners with to provide hands-on training for participants. Additionally, some partners, such as OnSale.com, will be hosting numerous participants in the upcoming session with the hopes of hiring them following their successful completion of the program for positions as Digital Media Specialists.

"The innovative public-private partnerships we've developed allow Chicago Career Tech to create a trained corps of highly-skilled professionals in our community who utilize technology as a platform for new career opportunities," said Marie Lynch, executive director of Chicago Career Tech.
