### A Century of Daredevils Celebrated in Skies Above Chicago

Lincoln Beachey soared over Lake Michigan in his Curtiss biplane until he reached over eleven thousand feet, when suddenly his propeller lurched to a stop. He was out of gas. His wire-strung crate pitched nose down and began to drop in a lazy spiral, plummeting toward downtown Chicago. The wind whistled through his struts and thousands gaped. The spot in the sky grew larger and larger...

Beachey broke the altitude record in the 1911 Chicago International Aviation Meet, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year, and will be featured in the upcoming 2011 Chicago Air & Water Show (August 20-21). The Chicago Cultural and Special Events group at City Hall has once again tapped authors, Gerry and Janet Souter to help promote the show. The opening chapter of their book: The Chicago Air and Water Show – History of wings above the waves is dedicated to the World record-breaking 1911 International Aviation competition.

This aviation meet brought together virtually all the famous aviators of that period to the skies above Grant Park for nine days in August. when six million spectators packed the lakefront to view record-breaking, prize winning and breathtaking flights. It was the largest aviation tournament ever held and by 1913, almost all of the most daring pilots had been killed in crashes trying to go faster, higher and for longer distances. One hundred years ago the aviation age burst upon the United States and the Chicago International Aviation Meet helped launch that aerial revolution.

#### Tax Sale Recovers More Than \$90 Million in Unpaid Taxes from 2009 Property Owners Have Two Years to Redeem Purchased Taxes

Cook County Treasurer, Maria Pappas today announced more than 20,000 parcels of property were purchased during the Annual Tax Sale, recovering more than \$90 million of delinquent debt. The Annual Tax Sale is an auction of unpaid taxes that the Treasurer's Office is required to conduct by state law.

"The money collected from property taxes is essential for the operating expenses of local municipalities," said Pappas. "At the same time, the downturn in the economy has taken a toll on Cook County families and some are unable to pay. We want to make sure property owners whose taxes have been sold are treated fairly and are aware of every opportunity to pay their taxes so they are able to keep their home."

This year's Annual Tax Sale of delinquent taxes from Tax Year 2009 was held July 19-26. A total of 37,827 Property Index Numbers (PINs) were available for auction, and 20,814 of those PINs were purchased. Most of the money recovered from the Sale will be used by 2,200 taxing agencies and local governments across Cook County to pay for schools, police and fire and other community purposes.

Property owners whose delinquent taxes are sold have up to two years to pay their bill in full, which includes interest, fees and penalties. Once the redemption period expires, the buyer can begin legal action in court to obtain the title to the property.

## **Container Gardening**



By Nick Urhausen, Urhausen Greenhouses Even if you live in a condo and only have a confined space like a balcony or a small deck, you can still experience a bit of nature with a container garden. A container garden is a collection of plants grown in a container or planter.

Whether you choose to buy a container which is already URHAUSEN planted, or you decide to plant your own, there are a few things GREENHOUSES to remember.

Since 1922 First, realize that the size of the container will impact how frequently you will have to water. There is an old saying that "container gardening is container watering" implying that in a container, unlike the soil in the ground, you must supply all the water. I think larger containers are easier to care for over a long season.

Second, determine how much sun and shade your area has. This is very important because it will impact how your plants perform. If you put a sun loving plant in the shade it will not bloom as well as it should. Conversely shade loving plants may not be able to take the heat generated by the sun, and will struggle to live. You must determine the level of light over the course of a whole day from sun-up to sun down. With the information you will be able to select the right plants for your space.

Third, try to come up with a theme for your container. Your theme could be simple, symmetrical and elegant with a combination of something like geraniums and petunias or it could be more sophisticated with an asymmetrical blend of many different plants. Many people are copying the natural look best demonstrated by the public planters seen around the City of Chicago. On higher balconies, I would limit the use of really tall plants as one must consider the effect of the wind.

Fourth, you must maintain the planter. Any spent blooms should be discarded along with yellow leaves. Water the container when you see wilt in the plants or when the soil mix feels dry to the touch. Observe the weather - hot windy periods will always require more watering than rainy cooler periods.

The easiest way to keep your planter looking good is to fertilize the plants every two weeks with a well balance fertilize. There are many brands to choose from and they all get the job done. Follow the directions - don't fall in the trap of thinking if it says 1 scoop per gallon, then I'll really make my planter beautiful by using 2 scoops. This is wrong because too much fertilizer could make your planter perform as poorly as neglecting it would.

Fifth, enjoy your little slice of nature both visually and sensually with the various fragrances the plants give off.

If you are looking to modify your eating to that of a hearthealthy eating plan note that many of my recipes are geared to fish and vegetables.

#### **GARIDES MIKROLIMANO** (SHRIMP WITH TOMATOES AND FETA CHEESE

2 lbs of medium shrimp 2 to 3 ripe tomatoes, finely diced or a can of "no salt added" diced tomatoes <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil 2 onions, finely diced 2 cloves of garlic 7 oz. Feta cheese 2 tsp.. Sugar 1 bay leaf (fresh if available) A dash of salt and pepper to taste

In a large frying pan, saute the onions in the Olive Oil. Add the diced tomatoes, the garlic and the bay leaf, the sugar, salt, pepper and an adequate amount of water. Cook the sauce for about 30 minutes. Drop the cleaned shrimp into the sauce and continue cooking for another 4 minutes. Remove from heat. Place both the shrimp and sauce in a Pyrex dish. Spread slices of Feta cheese over the shrimp and sauce and bake for just 10 minutes. Serve immediately with rice and a mixed Greek Salad using Extra Virgin Olive Oil and Wine Vinegar for dressing. Finally, be careful of scams. We have been noticing an increase in changes of approach by telemarketers. For example, we have more calls lately are asking us for our thoughts and opinions by answering a few minutes worth of "survey" questions. The most recent was from a telemarketer who requested to speak with the person in the house who suffered from diabetes. When we informed them that they must have the wrong number because no one here had diabetes, the response was, "well then, do you or anyone else in the household suffer from back pain"? Obviously this was a lead-in to either insurance, a medical product, etc. "Take a survey from you?", I said. "No way, and I would never consider buying a product from a company who began by lying to me". Note: Sometimes the caller will ask for a person they know does not exist, and when you say they have the wrong number, then the process begins, "Well, then, may we ask you a few questions for our survey"?

In short, telemarketing hasn't changed in the number of calls people receive. The folks calling you are just more deceitful than before. If the animal's life is in danger they are authorized by the state of Illinois to remove the animal from a dangerous situation.
