

**When: Thursday, July 4, 9:30 p.m. • Where: 600 E. Grand Ave. • Cost: Free**

How to get there: The CTA provides five bus lines serving Navy Pier daily. These are #29 State, #65 Grand, #66 Chicago, #124 Navy Pier (serving Metra lines from Millennium Station, Ogilvie and Union Stations) and #2 Hyde Park Express (during weekday morning and evening rush hours only). Make sure to check the bus schedule for information on holiday service. You can also take a cab, Uber, Lyft, or Divvy.

Enjoy a spectacular pyrotechnics show along the downtown lakefront. Chicago's iconic Navy Pier will present a spectacular fireworks display, in synch with a score of patriotic music.

There will also be plenty of events and activities going on at the Pier throughout the day, including live music performances at the Miller Lite Beer Garden.

Taste of Chicago is the nation's premier outdoor food festival showcasing the diversity of Chicago's dining community. The delicious array of food served at Taste of Chicago is complemented by music and exciting activities for the entire family. Every summer since 1980, Chicago's beautiful Grant Park at Jackson & Columbus on the city's magnificent lakefront has been home to the world's largest food festival.

## History of the Taste of Chicago

In 1980 a group of restaurateurs approached the Mayor of Chicago with the idea of a food festival on the Fourth of July, and Taste of Chicago was born. Inspired by a "build it and they will come" attitude, a \$150,000 budget, and confidence the event could attract 75,000 people, plans for the one-day food frenzy got under way. The festival was held in a three-block area of Michigan Avenue bordered by the Chicago River and the upscale stores and buildings that were then beginning to grace the Magnificent Mile; and between the architectural wonders of the Wrigley Building and Tribune Tower.

It was a huge success, (250,000 attended the first "Taste," and food and soda sales grossed \$330,000).

# Assessor Fritz Kaegi Pledges Swift Implementation For Automatic Renewals of Senior Citizen Homestead Exemptions

## HB 833 passes both Illinois House and Senate and heads to Governor's desk

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi today announced swift implementation of HB 833, a bill that requires the automatic renewal of the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption.

Unanimously passing through both the Illinois House and Senate last week, HB 833 will amend the Property Tax Code so that a person who has been granted a Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption will not need to reapply for the exemption every year, as is the case now.

"The successful passage of this bill lifts a significant burden from the more than 740,000 seniors in Cook County, who previously had to verify for this exemption every year," said Assessor Kaegi. "It's another step forward in the modernization of operations in our office while also making these annual exemptions more accessible for seniors."

In the House, the bill's chief sponsor was Assistant Majority Leader Rep. Fred Crespo while Sen. Laura Ellman and Sen. Bill Cunningham were its chief co-sponsors in the Senate.

"We heard from many taxpayers during my countywide listening tour about the need for HB 833," said Assessor Kaegi. "I'm grateful to Representative Crespo for his yearlong advocacy on this issue and for Senators Ellman and Cunningham who moved this through the Senate. I was proud to work in collaboration with these legislators on the bill's technological implementation and the safeguards necessary to prevent fraud."

To allow for the automatic renewal of the Senior Homestead Exemption and prevent fraud in its application, the Illinois Dept. of Public Health would be required to send the Cook County Assessor's Office (CCAO) death record information

quarterly while the CCAO would access the Social Security Administration's Master Death List and exchange information with the Recorder of Deeds Office on deed transactions of properties with a Senior Homestead Exemption.

The CCAO would be required to conduct an audit on every Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption at least once every three years.

"Local seniors shouldn't have to go through burdensome bureaucracy to receive necessary relief on their property taxes," Rep. Crespo said. "This is a commonsense reform that will make government more efficient and accessible while we work to provide greater relief to seniors and middle-class families across our state."

Attorneys with the Chicago Bar Association's Call-A-Lawyer Program will be available to take calls from the public and offer brief legal advice on Saturday, July 20, as part of an ongoing legal public service program offered by the CBA.

Calls will be accepted July 20 from 9 a.m. to noon at (312) 554-2001.

Citizens can call in and briefly explain their situation to an attorney who will then work to suggest self-help strategies or provide advice to help resolve their issues. If callers need further legal services, or have questions beyond the scope of the attorney's practice area, they will be advised to contact the CBA Lawyer Referral Service during the week for a referral to an attorney in the appropriate area of law.

The CBA's Lawyer Referral Service has more than 200 prescreened, qualified lawyers experienced in almost every area of law that offer their services to the public. When contacting the LRS during normal business hours Monday through Friday, callers can be referred to attorneys practicing in numerous areas of law including:

- Domestic Relations, including divorce, custody, support and other family law matters;
- Personal Injury (including auto accidents, slip and falls, products liability, wrongful death, malpractice and other types of injury cases.
- Estate Planning, including will and trust drafting, probate and will contest.
- Real Estate, including buying or selling real estate, foreclosure defense and landlord/tenant issues.
- Employment Law, including wrongful termination, harassment and discrimination.

Additionally, the CBA offers an after-hours On-Call service which provides callers' access to attorneys in three different areas of law at any time after normal business hours. ## Ascension Greek Orthodox Church To Open Doors Of Its New House Of Worship

Ascension of Our Lord Greek Orthodox Church announced that His Eminence Metropolitan Nathanael of Chicago presided over an "Opening of the Doors" service in front of its newly-constructed church at 1207 Riverwoods Road, Lincolnshire, Illinois, on June 5, 2019. In the Orthodox tradition, a Hierarch conducts the short service, referred to in Greek as a Thyranoxia, to sanctify a church prior to worshipping in it. Following the Thyranoxia, the faithful were invited to celebrate the church's Feast Day by attending Great Vespers, the first service to be held in the new house of worship.

The \$9-million new construction and expansion project formally began with a groundbreaking service in September 2017 when clergy blessed the site's foundation. The 18,600-square foot building includes a new 11,000-square foot Greek Orthodox church, chapel and adult baptistry based on a late 12th century Byzantine design. The art and architecture of the building is purposefully designed to create a distinctive atmosphere of worship that embodies many of the fundamental teachings of Orthodoxy. The additional 7,000-square feet of the building includes a redesigned fellowship hall with a kitchen, office space, and refurbished meeting spaces for its Sunday church school and growing ministries. In addition, the church added a 4,000-square foot basement to accommodate future growth.

The Ascension Parish held its first Divine Liturgy on January 11, 1998 with 30 families in attendance. The parish received its official charter from the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese on April 24, 2002. Today, the Ascension community has grown to more than 320 families that actively participate in a wide range of ministries for all age groups from infancy to seniors.

## RTA Rolls Out 2019 Summer Campaign, Encourages Riders to Show "We Can All Agree on Transit"

This summer the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) of northeastern Illinois is launching a unifying marketing campaign to focus on the benefits of riding transit. The Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), Metra and Pace provide two million rides each weekday and riders and non-riders alike benefit from transit in the six-county system.

"Transit is the great equalizer, bringing people together from all across our region," says RTA Executive Director Leanne Redden. "Riders on public transportation save time and money, and non-riders benefit because public transportation in our region means fewer cars on the road. This summer, the RTA and its transit agencies will focus on how transit unites us and opens doors to economic opportunity for all."

The agency traditionally promotes transit ridership during the summer months, when the region is flush with outdoor concerts, sporting events, festivals and more. This year, the RTA is adding a unifying message to its ridership promotion: #WeCanAllAgreeOnTransit.

Short social media posts by the RTA will feature "opposites who agree on transit," such as "I like jazz and she likes rock 'n' roll, but we agree on taking public transportation to the festival," or "I like the Sox and he likes the Cubs, but we agree on taking public transportation to the game."



## Roadside History of Illinois



This is the twenty-ninth in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, *Roadside History of Illinois* (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.

### The Significance of Other Cemeteries in Forest Park

The first cemetery established in Forest Park was Jewish Waldheim, built in 1870; its first burial took place in 1873. Made up of 250 sections, it is the largest Jewish cemetery complex in the Chicago metropolitan area. Among its most famous gravesites is that of movie producer Michael Todd, third husband of actress Elizabeth Taylor. Todd was killed in a plane crash in 1958 and interred here under his real name, Avrom Hirsch Goldbogen. Two decades later, in 1977, grave robbers unearthed his body looking for a diamond ring rumored to have been buried with him. Finding no ring, the robbers left the body in some brush, where police found it two days later.

Concordia Cemetery is a lovely and well-kept burial ground, noted for its obelisks and marble angel sculptures. Notably, it is the burial place of about 23 of the victims of Chicago's 1915 Eastland boating disaster that took place on the Chicago River between Clark and LaSalle Streets. The event is known as the deadliest in Chicago history, surpassing those killed in the Great Chicago Fire in 1871 and the Iroquois Theater fire in 1903.

Altenheim Cemetery, a small graveyard adjacent to Concordia, was established shortly after the opening of Altenheim German Old People's Home in 1885 as a burial place for the home's residents when they died. The nursing home operated for more than a century before it closed in 2000, and the Victorian building was converted into apartments for independent seniors. The 11 acres of undeveloped open space to the front and rear of the Victorian building were purchased by the village of Forest Park in 2001. Several community events, including the Forest Park Ribfest, were held on the front property which also includes a picnic grove. The idea of a Culture Park, a sort of mini-Ravinia on the rear grounds, was proposed in 2015 and has gained some traction. With a grant from the National Park Service Rivers, Trails, & Conservation Assistance Program, the village was able to fund several studies and proposed concepts for a multi-use and multi-season community park, all of which are undergoing hearings and further analysis. Each proposal must meet the village's recreational and open space needs without encroaching on nearby neighborhoods. Meanwhile, plans are underway to demolish several vacant and deteriorating outbuildings on the property, including a former chapel.

The nondenominational Woodlawn Cemetery, established in 1912, is best known for its Showmen's Rest section, the burial place of hundreds of circus folk, including nearly 60 of the victims of a 1918 circus-train wreck. The five life-size elephant statues that surround Showmen's Rest make it a local landmark.

Showmen's Rest had actually been created two years before the wreck as a cemetery for circus and road-show performers, established by Buffalo Bill Cody and the Showmen's League of America, headquartered in Chicago. On June 22, 1918, a horrific tragedy occurred that would soon make use of the graveyard. In the early morning hours, a 26-car Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus train on its way to Hammond, Indiana, stalled on the tracks. In spite of warning signals, the driver of an empty train, asleep at the wheel, slammed into it from behind. The crash killed dozens of passengers, and a subsequent fire killed several more. The final death toll was 86. The grave markers show that about 40 of the victims' names were unknown, while several others were known only by their stage names.

The village of Forest Park, west of Chicago, is rich in history, and much of it can be found in its cemeteries. A visit to these four can enhance one's appreciation of the historical events that have been memorialized on its grounds.

## Former Mayor Emanuel Recently Announced Completion of 1.25-Mile Chicago Riverwalk with The Opening of Chicago Riverwalk East

Earlier this year, Former Mayor Rahm Emanuel, Former First Lady Amy Rule, city officials, Riverwalk architects, site designers, artists, vendors and other local partners celebrated the opening of the newly transformed Chicago Riverwalk East from Michigan Avenue to Lake Shore Drive, completing the 1.25-mile Riverwalk. With the completion of this \$12 million investment, every block of this award-winning 1.25-mile promenade and recreational amenity has been modernized or developed for the first time.



"Chicago is reconnecting with the River in a way that improves our quality of life, protects our environment and enhances economic development that is sustainable for future generations," said the Former Mayor. "The completion of Riverwalk East is a major milestone in that journey. We are finally fulfilling Daniel Burnham's original vision of Chicago as a true two-waterfront city."

In August 2018, Former Mayor Emanuel announced plans to improve older sections of the east end of the Riverwalk from Michigan Avenue to Lake Shore Drive, building upon the success of the Riverwalk and creating even more opportunities for residents and visitors to interact with and enjoy the Chicago River.

The design team, led by Mueller and Mueller, worked with the landscape architecture firm of Site Design Group to substantially complete this reimagining of Riverwalk East. This design emphasizes the transition from a park-like environment on the east end near Lake Shore Drive to the urban civic space of Michigan Avenue and creates areas of public seating surrounded by landscaping. The new Riverwalk East space includes: 10,000 square feet of "play" space; 94 new LED dark sky compliant light fixtures; three public restrooms; approximately 150 new tree plantings from 35 different species to increase the diversity of the urban tree canopy, and 20 types of furnishings from the Riverwalk palette increasing public seating by over 500 along the Riverwalk.

Additionally, a submarine memorial designed and funded by a group of Navy volunteers is another new addition to Riverwalk East, and will be dedicated on Saturday, May 18. The memorial commemorates the twenty-eight submarines manufactured in Wisconsin that used the Chicago River to connect through various waterways to the Gulf of Mexico and on to the war efforts after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

### TWO BEAN CASSEROLE

1 lb fresh green beans	Salt and Pepper to taste
1 (15.5 oz can) Eden's Butter Beans- no salt added	1/4 cup Parsley - chopped
1/2 of a Vidalia Sweet Onion, chopped	2 Tbsp. Dried Oregano
1/2 of an (8 oz) no salt added Hunt's Tomato Sauce	1 Garlic Clove, chopped
1 can of Hunt's Stewed Tomatoes	2 Tbsp. Olive Oil

Wash and cut the fresh green beans in half. Chop onion and garlic and saute until soft not browned. Add the green beans and the stewed tomatoes and tomato sauce and simmer for about 20 minutes. Place in a 10 x 7 casserole baking dish. Rinse the butter beans and mix with green beans in the casserole dish. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, parsley and oregano and add the Olive Oil. Place in a preheated 350F oven for approximately 1-1/2 hours. Add small amount of water if needed.

For variety, instead of the butter beans you may use 2 small zucchini that have been cut in rounds and potatoes cut in small pieces and follow the same procedure of seasoning and baking as above. This is a great side dish for chicken, steak or fish regardless of the season.
