# Cook County Assessor's Office Releases Update On 100 Day Reform Plan

## Assessor Fritz Kaegi details recent changes to expand ethics, fairness and transparency

Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi released an update today on his 100 Day Plan to bring ethics, fairness and transparency into the operations of the Cook County Assessor's Office (CCAO).

"We made promises during the campaign that we would start reforming this office on day one," said Assessor Kaegi. "We've kept that promise and took immediate action. This report is part of our effort to be fully transparent with taxpayers about our work."

After reaching the halfway mark of the first 100 days of his administration, Assessor Kaegi

and the leadership team of the CCAO have made significant changes in every department. The CCAO's 100 Day Plan was created to prioritize Assessor Kaegi's promises of reform and ensure the continuity of service for taxpayers and property owners.

"The work of the assessor's office impacts the homes and neighborhoods of the people of Cook County," said Assessor Kaegi. "It affects where they live and how they live. Few things are more important. We want people to know that that the work of restoring fairness to this office will continue in the months and years to come."

Highlights of the changes made in the first 50 days include:

- An audit by the International Association of Assessing Officers to identify ways the CCAO can adopt best practices in assessment methodologies and operations
- The adoption of a new ethics order, including the public posting of a visitors log which will provide transparency about meetings held by executive leadership
- The relaunch of social media channels on Facebook and Twitter to provide easier communication with the public

• Creating an extra oversight and approval layer for Certificates of Corrections and assessor review

- The release of the 2019 tax calendar, created with the Cook County Board of Review
- Improvements in quality control of valuation data processes

## Mayor Emanuel, City Colleges of Chicago and AAR Announce the Aviation Futures Training Center

Mayor Rahm Emanuel joined City Colleges of Chicago and AAR to announce the new Aviation Futures Training Center to train students in aviation sheet metalworking. AAR, a global leader in aviation aftermarket services, will partner with Olive-Harvey College to prepare students for in-demand jobs in aviation, heavy manufacturing, boating, automotive repair, and HVAC.

"When you bring together the strengths of AAR and Olive-Harvey College, one plus one is much greater than two," said Mayor Emanuel. "The Aviation Futures Training Center will prepare students with the high-quality education necessary to seize in-demand careers in aviation."

The Center will launch in March 2019 as an extension of Olive-Harvey College's Transportation, Distribution and Logistics (TDL) Center. The aviation sheet metalworking course prepares graduates for the CertTEC Certification with 300 hours of instruction and hands-on training with sheet metal from airplane fuselages.

"The shortage of middle skills workers in aviation and manufacturing is at acute levels in deindustrialized cities in the Midwest, like Chicago," said John Holmes, AAR President and Chief Executive Officer. "AAR is actively

working with colleges to recruit and upskill workers to get them in the pipeline faster to address the short supply. We're thrilled to be working with City Colleges' Chancellor Juan Salgado and his team, and Mayor Emanuel's Office to drive solutions."

The program is part of AAR's EAGLE Career Pathway program, which AAR is introducing at schools near its five U.S. aircraft repair stations. EAGLE demonstrates how students can earn portable, stackable skills and earn \$80,000 or more annually within three to five years. The stackable skills will enable students who are interested to pursue the coveted position of FAA-certified airframe and powerplant (A&P) mechanic. There is a shortage of 189,000 aircraft mechanics in North America, according to a study by Boeing.

According to the Great Cities Institute at the University of Illinois at Chicago, there were 58,000 unfilled manufacturing jobs in Cook County last year, and one in three manufacturing workers in the metro area is over the age of 55.

## Pappas: There's Help For Senior Citizens Struggling To Pay Cook County Property Taxes

With prescription prices and utility bills rising faster than Social Security payments, a tax-relief program can help senior citizens who are hard-pressed to pay their property taxes, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Seniors whose annual household income is \$55,000 or less can apply to the Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program for loans to cover property tax payments.

"When property taxes are due, too many of our elderly are forced to make difficult choices about which bills to pay," Pappas said. "This program is one way to ease their worries."

The State of Illinois issues the loans, which do not have to be repaid until the property

is sold or the homeowner dies. An interest rate of 6 percent per year is charged by the state. The maximum loan is \$5,000 per year. To qualify, homeowners must be at least 65 years old by June 1 of the year in which the application is made.

To apply:

- Download the application from [cookcountytreasurer.com](http://cookcountytreasurer.com)
- Submit the completed application and copies of the required documents to the Treasurer's Office
- The deadline is March 1, 2019. Applications after that date cannot be accepted
- Homeowners must reapply every year

## Commissioner Gainer Hosting Workshops To Help Residents Save Money on Taxes

Cook County Commissioner Bridget Gainer is hosting multiple workshops throughout the City's North and Northwest Sides to help residents save money on their tax bills.

Every homeowner in Cook County is entitled to the Homeowners Exemption, and senior citizens 65 years or older are entitled to the Senior Citizen Exemption. Additionally, senior citizens with combined household incomes less than \$65,000 are eligible for more savings through the Senior Freeze Exemption.

To get help applying for these different exemptions, Commissioner Gainer's staff will be at the following Ward offices. Attendees must bring a photo ID.

## Apply for Senior Citizen Property Tax Exemptions by February 6

Evanston residents 65 years or older should apply for senior citizen property tax exemptions by Wednesday, February 6.

Renewal forms were mailed and should have been received in early January. Local seniors are encouraged to call the Property Tax Assessment Review Office at 847-448-8168 for help with the forms.

### Eligibility for Senior Citizen Exemptions

There are two senior tax exemptions:

1. The Senior Exemption, available to all seniors regardless of income, reduces property taxes by about \$700. It is available for any owner-occupied residential property if the owner was born in 1953 or earlier.

2. The Senior Freeze provides seniors with additional savings if the combined income of all members of the household is less than \$65,000, and if the senior has been an owner-occupant of the property since January 1, 2017.

The recently mailed senior applications are for 2018 property taxes, which are paid in calendar year 2019. The savings from the exemptions will appear on second installment tax bills that will likely be mailed in late June of 2019.

### Maximum Income for Senior Freeze Higher than in Previous Years

Between 2009 and 2017, seniors with annual household income of \$55,000 or less qualified for the Senior Freeze. Last year, the maximum income rose to \$65,000, and

it remains at that level this year. Seniors whose income was previously too high for the Senior Freeze are advised to check to see if they now qualify.

### New Senior Citizens

Homeowners who were born in 1953 turned 65 in 2018, and thus are likely to be eligible for the senior exemptions for the first time. Taxpayers who recently turned 65 will probably not receive senior renewal forms in the mail and are encouraged to call the Property Tax Assessment Review Office at 847-448-8168 for information about the senior exemptions. ### Homes Formerly Occupied by Senior Citizens

If a senior was living at a property on January 1, 2018, the property should be eligible for the 2018 senior exemptions (paid in 2019), even if the senior citizen ceased living at the property later in 2018. But special application forms have to be completed for properties eligible for the senior exemption under such circumstances. Owners of homes previously occupied by senior citizens should call the Property Tax Assessment Review Office at 847-448-8168 for further information.

## D'Amico Encourages Residents to Use Drones Safely

State Rep. John D'Amico, D-Chicago, is encouraging residents who received a drone during the holiday season, as well as long-time owners of drones, to stay current on federal, state and municipal drone safety guidelines.

"While drones are fun to fly, they can also be dangerous," D'Amico said. "I urge residents to become familiar with all safety guidelines before they operate their drones or give them to their children."

D'Amico advises residents to meet the following guidelines to comply with safety regulations, including registering your drone, only purchasing drones weighing less than 55 pounds, and never flying near or over public events, stadiums, airports and emergency response efforts.

"Owning a drone can be exciting, but it also entails new responsibilities," D'Amico said. "We must ensure that our community enjoys the technology advances drones provide while staying safe at the same time."

Many residents who request the TeenLink list are unable to do physical outdoor yardwork themselves, are unable to afford the cost of a professional contractor or only need assistance once in a while. The TeenLink list provides contact information for Skokie teens including the name, phone number, email address and address of the teen, days of availability, type of work they are willing to do and their expected rate of pay. ## C.A.R.E. To Debut Pet Food Pantry

**The C.A.R.E. Adoption Center in Skokie will launch a twice-monthly Pet Food Pantry to provide food aid for area dog & cat owners in need.**

In a move to support area pet-owning families in need, including furloughed government employees, Community Animal Rescue Effort will launch a Pet Food Pantry.

The C.A.R.E. Pet Food Pantry will debut Friday, Jan. 18, from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm at the C.A.R.E. Adoption Center, at 4927 Main Street, Skokie. Subsequent Pet Food Pantry hours will run on the first and third Fridays of each month, always from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm.

The C.A.R.E. Pet Food Pantry's goal is to provide emergency food support for cats and dogs of residents of Skokie and surrounding communities. Program participants will receive dog and/or cat food that has been donated by area pet supply businesses. In addition to food, the C.A.R.E. Pet Food Pantry may also offer various pet supplies (leashes, bowls, toys, etc.) as available.

"We want to help families keep pets in their homes rather than giving them up to a rescue group," says Angela Love, the C.A.R.E. Kennel Director and a longtime volunteer at the Irving Park Food Pantry.



### C.A.R.E. Pet Food Pantry guidelines are as follows:

- C.A.R.E. will provide food assistance (one time per client per month) to pet owners.
- Pet owners must provide a document proving their pets have been spayed or neutered (veterinary record or adoption paperwork). If a pet cannot be spayed or neutered due to a medical issue, we ask clients to provide a letter from their vet on the animal hospital's stationery.
- Only one person per household may apply for assistance. An ID will be needed at time of application.
- C.A.R.E. asks that clients agree to treat their pets humanely and provide medical assistance as needed.
- We ask that clients refrain from adopting additional pets while involved in the C.A.R.E. program.
- The amount of food clients receive will depend on the number and size of their pets.



• Since our food comes from donated sources, C.A.R.E. cannot guarantee availability of particular brands.

• C.A.R.E. does not provide shelter or medical assistance, but can provide clients with a list of low-cost spay and neuter clinics.

## Area Blood Supply Dips to Dangerously Low Levels

Although January is marked as 'National Blood Donor Month,' this weekend's snowfall, coupled with an already dwindling blood supply at area hospitals, have officials with Vitalant urging Chicagoans to go out and donate as soon as possible. Vitalant operates 17 donation centers located throughout the city and suburbs that are open every day this week.

Severe weather and icy roads lead to more accidents and an increased need for blood. If a major accident or tragedy would occur somewhere in the Chicagoland area, officials with Vitalant (formerly LifeSource) are concerned there might not be an adequate supply of O-Negative blood to treat those most severely injured.

All blood types are needed, however, there's always a special need for type O blood. In emergency situations, when a patient's blood type isn't known, doctors reach for type O blood to sustain life until the patient can be stabilized.

It's the blood already on the shelf that helps in an emergency. That's why it's crucial for Vitalant to maintain a safe and ready supply at all times. It takes about 24 to 36 hours to process, test and distribute each blood donation before it is delivered to hospitals.

"It's extremely important that people donate blood, especially during this time of year when blood donations are at their lowest, not only here in the Chicago area, but across the entire country," said Vitalant Regional Director Eva Quinley. The actual donation is safe, easy and takes less than 15 minutes.

## Frozen Pipes: Village of Skokie

The severe cold winter weather is here again. Some Village of Skokie residences and businesses have previously experienced frozen water services at this time of year. When water services become frozen, it often results in the unavailability of water to a home or building for days or a longer period of time.

Residents are advised to take all necessary precautions to prevent their water services from freezing. Precautions include reducing drafts in basements and crawl spaces, keeping areas sufficiently heated, keeping open cabinet doors in the kitchen and bathrooms and keeping one faucet on the premises run slowly on a continual basis during cold spells.

A sign that your interior piping may be frozen is evident when there is a reduced trickle of water from your faucet. Do NOT attempt to thaw a frozen pipe yourself using an open flame, but contact a qualified plumbing contractor to do the work.

## Roadside History of Illinois

This is the twenty-fifth in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, *Roadside History of Illinois* (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.



### Hull House and the University of Illinois at Chicago

Jane Addams and Helen Gates Starr, both Illinois natives, founded Hull-House in 1889. It was Chicago's first "settlement house," created to house social workers within the community they served. In this neighborhood of poor immigrants, Addams, Starr, and their associates provided educational, social, and cultural opportunities for struggling local residents and newcomers. The house soon expanded into a complex of some 14 buildings, including a summer camp called the Bowen Country Club.

Jane Addams was born in Cedarville, a few miles north of Freeport, on September 6, 1860; Starr was born in 1859 in Laona Township, in far northern Winnebago County. Both women attended Rockford Female Seminary, where they met. The two friends traveled widely in Europe, where they visited Toynbee Hall, the original settlement house in London, and returned to America with visions of a better life for the poor.

Addams and Starr moved to Chicago in January 1889, occupying the former home of Charles J. Hull on Halsted Street, in which Hull allowed them to live rent-free. The two women and their associates established a kindergarten, homemakers' clubs, and social activities in the house and invited unions and social-service organizations to meet there. In addition, Addams and Starr dedicated themselves to political reform, leading the fight for child-labor and compulsory-education laws at the state and national levels. Addams was also a prolific writer and lecturer, authoring 11 books and numerous articles and delivering speeches worldwide.

When World War I broke out, Addams, a dedicated pacifist, gave anti-war speeches across the country. In 1915 she helped estab-

lish the Woman's Peace Party and organized and presided over the International Congress of Women at the Hague, Netherlands. Four years later she founded the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, which she led for 10 years. She also helped found the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The international impact of her contributions earned her the Nobel Peace Prize in 1931. Jane Addams served with Hull House until her death on May 21, 1935, and was buried in Cedarville Cemetery.

The site of the Hull House complex was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1965 and a Chicago Landmark in 1974. Today, the original Hull-House and the residents' dining hall are the only two buildings that still stand after years of expansion by the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC). The university acquired much of the Hull-House property in 1963 to build its campus, and over the ensuing decades the school proceeded to tear down most of the Hull-House structures, along with large swaths of the Little Italy and Maxwell Street neighborhoods, to make way for new facilities.

After UIC moved in and dismantled the original complex, the nonprofit umbrella organization Jane Addams Hull House Association (not affiliated with the Hull-House Museum) took over Hull-House's social-welfare functions, providing services at various locations throughout Chicago. In 2012, however, the association filed for bankruptcy and closed its doors, ending 123 years of helping Chicago's needy.

Hull-House at 800 S. Halsted Street still serves the community as a museum and cultural center, and is open to the public for tours.

### New Artistic Sculpture Serves As Northern Gateway To Rogers Park; Dedication This Saturday

"Quantum Dee" is the new pyramid-like sculpture that stands at Rogers Park's northern entry point in Juneway Beach Park (Sheridan and the Lake, just south of Evanston).

The dedication was held at the base of the sculpture Saturday, January 19th. Sculpture artist Davis McCarty and Commissioner Mark Kelly of the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE) joined us at the dedication.

## National Wildlife Federation The Real Reason for Groundhog Day

Punxsutawney Phil, America's most famous weather forecaster, will have love, not weather, on his mind when he emerges from his hole on February 2. Researchers tracked 32 groundhogs for more than four years and concluded that the real reason for the early February appearance is a version of the dating game, groundhog style.

Male groundhogs wake up after three months of hibernation to check out the available pool of ladies within their territory. They select a female with whom they spend the night, and this sleepover acts as a first date, allowing the groundhogs time to get to know each other before the official start of mating season the following month. During these meet and greet sessions, contact is confined to rubbing noses - there's no going "all the way."

After scoping out two or three females, the male groundhog returns to his burrow to sleep again until March, dreaming of the hotties he has just met. When he awakes and revisits each of the females, the earlier slumber parties allow the woodchucks to skip the small talk and get right down to the business of breeding.





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# Village Cooking Corner

**HERE ARE SOME EASY, BUT VERY TASTY, IDEAS FOR YOUR SUPER BOWL GATHERINGS.**  
(Any of the serving sizes mentioned may be increased by doubling, tripling, etc. to accommodate your guest list).

## Stuffed Eggs (4 servings)

4 eggs  
1 t prepared mustard  
2 T margarine  
wine vinegar  
pinch of sugar  
black olives

2 anchovy fillets  
salt and pepper  
4 tomatoes  
tarragon  
chives  
anchovy fillets for garnishing



Hard-boil eggs, peel and cut in half lengthwise. Scoop out yolks and mix with the finely chopped anchovy fillets, prepared mustard, salt, pepper and soft margarine and fill this mixture into egg halves. Cut tomatoes in half and season with wine vinegar, tarragon, salt, pepper and a pinch of sugar. Place eggs on tomato halves and garnish with chopped chives. Serve on plate decorated with olives that have anchovy fillets wrapped around them.

## Kraut Salad (8 servings)

1 small head of cabbage  
salt and pepper  
vinegar  
1 onion, chopped  
1 clove garlic  
chopped herbs (any combination to suit your taste)  
4 strips smoked bacon



Cut cabbage in fine strips, season with salt, pepper and vinegar and place in a large, shallow container; weigh down with a water-filled dish for 2 to 3 hours. Then combine cabbage, chopped onion, garlic, herbs and the bacon which has been cut in thin strips and crisped. Mix the crisp bacon and its drippings into the cabbage salad; toss and serve lukewarm.

Alternate 8 buttered slices of square pumpnickel with 7 slices sharp cheddar cheese; wrap in wax paper and place in refrigerator for some time, weighing the package down to make slices stick together. Unwrap, cut in cubes and garnish with olives, grapes or anything suitable. Note: You can use a variety of cheeses to fit your taste and garnish with anything from anchovies to pickles to nuts.



## Spicy Chow Mein

*From the Kitchen of Prashant Shukla (Fresh Indian Cheese cubes cooked with Spinach in a medley of herbs and spices)*

Ingredients:

3 TBS vegetable oil	2 TBS soy sauce
10 oz. of chow mein	2 TBS ketchup
egg noodles cooked per instruction on package	2 TBS vinegar
1 cup shredded carrots	1 TBS red chili sauce
1 cup shredded cabbage	3 cloves of garlic – minced
1 cup sliced green beans	1 inch ginger - minced
1 medium size sliced onion	Salt to taste
6 dry whole red chilies	¼ cup chopped cilantro
	1 sliced scallion/green onion
	1 TSP toasted sesame seeds



### Method:

Heat oil in wok over medium heat in wok  
Sauté ginger & garlic & red chilies for couple minutes on low heat  
Add carrots, cabbage, sliced green beans, onion and saute for 3 minutes  
Next add soy sauce, ketchup, vinegar red chili sauce and noodles  
Stir well with 2 forks so that the vegetables and noodles are coated well with the sauce  
Cook for a minute then plate the Spicy Chow Mein. Garnish with cilantro, scallions and sesame seeds

The first garden club in the United States started in 1891 in the state of Georgia. In 1913, the federation, Garden Club of America, was established with local clubs forming in communities across the United States. These clubs engaged in civic improvement efforts (including campaigns against billboards) since many streets and public spaces, at that time, were often unpleasant.

A Norwood Park club has been in existence since, at least, 1937 back when garden clubs were provinces of women. In the 1960's, as so in other times, the club tried to cultivate a general social status akin to clubs in Evanston and Winnetka with maybe a little less gravitas. Flower growing competitions were sponsored, plant cuttings exchanged, garden walks organized and attention paid to public areas.

The current club leans toward appreciating the outdoors, gardening, learning about sustainability of plants, especially native plants, insects and pollinators and, promoting public space beautification.
