Chicago's Memorial Day Parade

Wreath Laying Ceremony begins @ 11am; Parade begins @ 12 Noon. State St. from Lake St. to Van Buren

Chicago's Memorial Day Parade honors all men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our country.

The Wreath Laying Ceremony will begin at 11am on Daley Plaza (Dearborn and Washington Streets). The parade will then step off at noon and proceed south on State Street from Lake Street to Van Buren Street.

During the Wreath Laying Ceremony and Parade, the City of Chicago honors fallen heroes and Gold Star family members who have lost a loved one in the United States Armed Forces to combat operations or while on active duty. Approved by Congress beginning in 1947, Gold Star Lapel Pins and the Next of Kin Lapel Pins are presented to families not as an award, but as symbols of honor worn by family members in remembrance of their fallen loved ones and their ultimate sacrifice.

Memorial Day History

Legal Holiday, observed annually on the last Monday in May in most of the United States, in honor of the nation's armed services personnel killed in wartime. The holiday, originally called Decoration Day, is traditionally marked by parades, memorial speeches and ceremonies, and the decoration of graves with flowers and flags, hence the original name. Memorial Day was first observed on May 30, 1868 on the order of General John Alexander Logan for the purpose of decorating the graves of the American Civil War dead. It was observed on May 30th until 1971, when most states changed to a newly established federal schedule of holiday observance.

Four Generations Of The Haben Family And Staff Decorate Veterans' Graves At Local Cemeteries

Four generations of the Haben Family and the staff of Haben Funeral Home in Skokie have been decorating the graves of war veterans buried at the three church-based cemeteries in Skokie for many years. Over 500 flags are placed on the graves of our war veterans each Memorial Day weekend. The flags are provided by Skokie Post No. 320 of the American Legion. The manpower is provided by John Haben, a third generation funeral director at Haben Funeral Home and Crematory, his family and staff. Veterans' records have been kept by the funeral home for over 85 years. Ray Haben, founder of Haben Funeral Home, began the volunteer project many years ago. He served in the U.S. Army during WWI, was a longtime member of Skokie Post No. 320 of the American Legion, the Skokie Valley Post No. 3854 Veterans of Foreign Wars and a past member and Past Commander of the Morton Grove Post No. 134 of the American Legion. Bill Haben served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War and was also a member of the Skokie American Legion Post and Skokie Valley V.F.W.. Gary J. Haben, recently retired U.S. Navy Captain after 29 years of service to his Country, is the third generation of the Haben Family to have served our Country during wartime. "It's an honor to recognize our past military heroes who so selflessly served our Country for the preservation of our freedom. We willingly and gratefully dedicate our time to remember these courageous men and women", says John Haben. The Art of Summer Grilling

Keep the grill clean with a complete top to bottom scrubbing. Start by removing the grill grates and wiping down the interior of the grill with a paper towel; or mildly abrasive sponge in order to remove any built up grease and residue. By removing grease and residue on a frequent basis you are significantly reducing the likelihood of severe flare-ups so it definitely doesn't hurt to do a full scrubbing every few months.

Start with a clean grill: Removing remnants of last night's dinner and thoroughly, cleaning your grill will decrease the chance of flare ups

and over-charring food. Using a grill brush, thoroughly clean the grates and remove food remnants. Empty drip pans and ash catchers to start with a clean slate!

Apply non-stick spray or a light coat of olive oil on the grates before turning on the grill: a well-oiled surface will keep food from sticking!

Use a meat thermometer and take the guess work out. Using a thermometer will make you less likely to OVERCOOK your meat and will give you the courage to go ahead and pull it off the grill!! No more serving "rubber chicken!"

Grant Park Music Festival's 85th Season Begins June 12

Summer in Chicago begins in six weeks with opening night of the Grant Park Music Festival on Wednesday, June 12, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. in the Jay Pritzker Pavilion in Millennium Park. Artistic Director and Principal Conductor Carlos Kalmar will lead the award-winning Grant Park Orchestra, with Chorus Director Christopher Bell and the Grant Park Chorus, in a ten-week season that runs through August 17. Most concerts are Wednesdays and Fridays at 6:30 p.m. and Saturdays at 7:30 p.m. (exceptions include Thursday, July 4 at 6:30 with no concert on July 3; and July 10, July 12 and July 13 at 8 p.m.).

One Night Member Passes, starting at \$26, will go on sale Wednesday, May 1 at 10 a.m. Patrons can call 312.742.7647 or go online at gpmf.org and select their own seat down front in the member section of the Jay Pritzker Pavilion.

The City of Chicago has implemented a security perimeter and bag check for all concerts and events that take place at the Jay Pritzker Pavilion. For most Grant Park Music Festival concerts, bag checks will be limited to matters of security, with firearms, knives and other weapons being prohibited to ensure the public's safety. However, for the Independence Day Salute on July 4, patrons will not be able to bring alcohol into the Park. Beer and wine will still be available for purchase at concession tents inside the Park.

On Fridays at 5:30 p.m. before the Grant Park Orchestra takes the stage, audiences are treated to concerts by students from local music schools and summer music programs at the front of the Great Lawn at the Jay Pritzker Pavilion. In June, the Festival's Young Artists Showcase program will include performances by Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestras' Steel Orchestra (June 14), a Chicago Suzuki Violin Playdown as part of Make Music Chicago (June 21) and After School Matters (June 28).

Open lunchtime rehearsals of the Grant Park Orchestra and Chorus return June 11 - August 16 and typically take place Tuesdays through Fridays from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m. Audiences are welcome to sit in the Pavilion Seating Bowl during rehearsals, and Festival docents will be on site to talk about the week's concerts during rehearsal breaks.

Ten of this summer's concerts, including June 12 (Opening Night), 19 and 21; July 4, 17, 19, 26 and 31; and August 14 and 16 will be broadcast on 98.7WFMT, Chicago's classical and fine arts radio station, and also online at wfmt.com/listen.

Food vendors also offer tacos, pizza, ice cream, lemonade, hotdogs, churros, sandwiches and weekly specials.

Gardeners will find healthy perennials, annuals, shrubs and interesting decor accents to add to their flea market garden.

Maybe you are moving to a new home or first apartment and need a few decorative or functional items. Shoppers will find wall art, pottery, weird statues, electronics, vintage toys, galvanized metal, dishes, cookware, dining sets, maybe even a kitchen sink?

New furniture is costly and often what is affordable is not solid quality wood. Take a look at the retro, mid-century, antique and even hand-made pallet furniture and you will notice the superior quality of older items. Likewise, "lightly pre-loved" items in excellent condition can be purchased for a fraction of the original retail price.

One up and coming shopper personality is the Millennial. According to a recent article by Hollywood Reporter, as well as Wolff's Flea Market own observations, this age group

(22-37) is developing their unique style by shopping secondhand venues. The Millennial is environmentally conscious, interested in sustainability, and aware of shopping local. The concept of hunting for reclaimed and repurposed furniture, household goods, kitschy decor and eclectic clothing pieces fits right in with the flea market model.

Another growing category reflects the current status of the retail industry. Store returns and seasonal overstock are in large over-abundance and many big box stores have a system of collaborating with auctioneers to sell these items in bulk. Vendors purchase and resell at a deep discount.

Ok, maybe you really don't collect anything. But do you like to read? Do you like to save money? Why pay \$15 for a new book you will read one time and put away on the shelf? Buy a gently read book for \$1 and you have already saved \$14! The same goes for movies, music and most everything else that is first-quality-second-hand.

Here are a few more numbers from Donald Wolff, "We are now open for our 28th season, and calculate that 5 million customers have walked up and down our aisles since we opened in 1991. And, if you walk the entire market, you will have walked 4 miles."

Says David Wolff, "We are well known in the flea market/antique/collectible world, and hope to continue to expose the rest of Chicagoland to the unique and useful goods our vendors offer."

Assistant Majority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives Will Davis and Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi released the following statement:

We have agreed with Chairman Michael Zalewski of the House Revenue & Finance Committee to continue negotiations next week on SB 1379. This bill, which will modernize property tax data collection, is critical to providing accuracy, transparency, and predictability for commercial property owners and market participants.

SB 1379 is the single most important step we can take to reform our property tax system. This bill will put Cook County and Illinois on par with other leading business centers in the U.S. by allowing the Assessor's Office to access actual financial data, not incomplete third-party information, to use in the assessment process. Other large markets, against whom we compete for jobs and talent, already conduct their assessments this way.

Commercial property stakeholders have asked for more clarity within the language of the bill to clearly define the data collection methods. We expect these negotiations to produce a final version of our bill that the General Assembly can pass before May 31. We have been working on this bill together because of the urgent need for accurate assessments in the south suburbs and across Cook County. We must begin collecting this data this summer in order to use it in next year's assessments in the Southland.

We have incorporated extensive stakeholder feedback from prior discussions, although we have received no new suggested language since late March.

This bill should be enacted this session because:

- Southland assessments must be conducted in 2020. The Assessor's Office can operationalize this legislation immediately so that the data collected can be applied to assessments of southern Cook County next year. The Southland notably suffers from incomplete third-party data that the Assessor's Office currently relies on for its work.

- Illinoisans deserve property tax reform. While the Governor and other State leaders work to reform our income tax system to make it more fair, the public increasingly demands that the property tax system be more fair, too. The best way to do that is to pass this bill into law.

- It will provide predictability for Chicago property owners before the city is re-assessed in 2021. Data collected in 2019 under this legislation will be published in the first quarter of 2020. This will give Chicago property owners insight into market averages that will inform the Assessor's commercial valuation model. Without this legislation, investors and market participants

will only be able to guess which inputs the Assessor's office will use.

- We are ready to address the definitional issues provided by stakeholders. Committee members received a letter from concerned parties regarding the meaning of certain terms in the bill, scope of data elements required, and the delineation of covered properties. We are ready to address these points next week.

We appreciate the efforts of Chairman Michael Zalewski to work with us and with stakeholders to pass this critical property tax reform. We remain grateful to Senator Toi Hutchinson, Senator Don Harmon, and Senator Kimberly Lightford for moving this through the Senate with a bipartisan supermajority vote. We also thank our broad coalition of supporters for their unwavering support of property tax reform, including Mayor-Elect Lori Lightfoot, the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Illinois Assessor's Association, as well as unions, real estate operators, and community organizations throughout Illinois.

Millions of Illinoisans are counting on us to get on with the urgent task of fixing our broken property tax system. This bill is the place to start.

Lakefront Trail Separation Construction Continues From Montrose to Ardmere

Mayor Rahm Emanuel last year joined Chicago Park District Superintendent Michael P. Kelly to break ground on the next segment of the Lakefront Trail Separation project to create separate bike and pedestrian paths from Montrose to Ardmere.

"The Lakefront Trail Separation project creates a more enjoyable experience for the thousands of people that use the path each day, and it will ensure that our children will inherit an even more vibrant, more prosperous and more inclusive Chicago than ever before," said Mayor Emanuel. "Breaking ground from Montrose to Ardmere is an important step as we continue to make the lakefront more accessible and more enjoyable for the pedestrians and cyclists living in, and visiting our city."

The Lakefront Trail Separation was designed to alleviate areas of congestion by creating two distinct paths: a bike trail and a separate pedestrian trail for those on foot. Initial funding was provided by the Chicago Park District and completion of the project was made possible by a generous donation from Ken Griffin, Founder and Chief Executive Officer of Citadel.

"The Chicago Park District is pleased to continue working toward making one of Chicago's greatest assets even better," said General Superintendent and CEO Michael P. Kelly. "This separation project will enhance the lakefront experience for

residents and tourists alike."

Chicago's Lakefront Trail is one of the busiest in the United States. Used by cyclists, joggers and people enjoying the scenery, it is estimated that more than 100,000 people per day use the trail during summer weekends according to a recent study by Chicago Area Runners Association (CARA) and the Active Transportation Alliance (ATA).

The sections from 31st Street to 41st Street, Oak Street to Ohio Street and Fullerton Avenue to North Avenue are complete, with continued construction on the rest of the trail this year. Chicago's entire 18-mile Lakefront Trail, which runs from Ardmere Avenue on the north to 71st Street on the south, will be separated for cyclists and pedestrians, and is expected to be complete in 2018.

Once complete, the entire 18-mile trail will have separate paths for cyclists and pedestrians. The standard bike trail will measure 12 feet in width and the pedestrian trail will measure 20 feet in width with 14 feet of asphalt or concrete and 3 feet of compacted stone mix on both sides. In some cases due to site constraints, these standard designs could not be achieved so the dimensions have been altered as necessary; however trail separation will still have been achieved.

The Lakefront Trail Separation project is a key component

of Building on Burnham, Mayor Emanuel's comprehensive plan to invest in the Lakefront, the Chicago River, natural areas and recreational opportunities in neighborhoods across the city. To date, 985 acres of parks have been acquired and 5.5 miles of waterfront access have been developed under the Building on Burnham plan.

The lakefront, which spans 26 miles across the city, will continue to see many investments under Mayor Emanuel. Investments to park assets, including those already made to the 31st Street Beach Harbor and Steelworkers' Park at 87th Street, will continue in neighborhoods across the city. Projects include improvements to Leone Beach Park in Rogers Park, triathlon training amenities at Ohio Street Beach and the upcoming revitalization of North Avenue Beach with plans underway for a new Boardwalk and amenities. Theater on the Lake was recently transformed from a summer programming site to a year-round performance and special events venue. The historic 1920s structure is now a 19,000 square foot lakefront venue with a performance area for theater and music, a restaurant, two private event spaces and an outdoor patio. The TOTL Summer will return to its home on the lakefront this summer for the Chicago Park District's Night Out in the Parks.

Mayor Emanuel Announces Next Phase Of Chicago Smart Lighting Program

City Will Install 40,000 More New LED Streetlights by End of Summer on Southwest, Near West and North Sides; Program on Schedule for Completion in Four Years

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced the start of the next phase of Chicago's streetlight modernization program, which includes the installation of an additional 40,000 new LED streetlights in neighborhoods across the City. In this next phase, the Chicago Smart Lighting Program (CSLP) will install new LED lights on residential streets, alleys and viaducts in portions of the far South Side, Near West Side and North Side. Installations in the current phase will be continuing through August when the City expects to reach the halfway point of the four-year project.

"This project has been a win-win for Chicagoans as it delivers one of the largest lighting modernization programs in the country and addresses one of the top reasons residents contact 311," Mayor Emanuel said. "As we begin this next phase, the program will reach more neighborhoods and provide more residents with reliable and energy-efficient nighttime lighting."

Last month, the Mayor was joined by ComEd in announcing that the City taxpayers will save an estimated \$100 million over the next ten years thanks to the energy efficiency of the new lights, which

consume 50-75 percent less electricity than outdated High Pressure Sodium street lights. In addition, the modernization is earning the City rebates from ComEd for installing new energy efficient lights. The City has received more than \$12 million in rebates to date, and expects to earn a total of \$35 million in rebates over the four-year program. The modernization is being implemented by the Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) in coordination with the Chicago Infrastructure Trust (CIT) and the Department of Innovation and Technology.

Chicagoans can track the installation of new street lights on an interactive map at the CSLP website: <http://chicagosmartlighting.org>. The map is updated weekly to show where installation is anticipated and already completed.

During the installation process, brief closures may be required on residential streets and alleys as crews move through each area. Parking restrictions, if needed, will be posted prior to installation.

"Spring and summer will be a busy time for the Chicago Smart Lighting Program as crews will be installing thousands of new

LED lights in neighborhoods across the city," CDOT Commissioner Rebekah Scheinfeld said. "We have been working diligently to keep the program on-track and are pleased that this new phase will allow even more Chicagoans to experience the clear, white light of the new LED streetlights."

The CSLP will replace 270,000, or 85 percent,

of Chicago's streetlights with high-quality LED fixtures. The program also includes creation of a citywide lighting management system for the new LED lights. When it becomes operational, the system will alert the City when lights need service. The public is advised to continue to contact 311 to report outages until the smart lighting system is operational.

Statement From Mayor Emanuel On The Discussion Of A Third Chicago-Area Airport

"The significant modernization programs underway at O'Hare and Midway will keep passengers connected and fuel new economic opportunities for the region for years to come. In fact, when the O'Hare expansion is complete, it will be the equivalent of adding a third airport to the area. O'Hare is already number one and our modernization will secure it and the Chicago area's aviation future. If the state has an extra \$150 million to spend, schools, mass transit, libraries and parks could wisely use those resources."

D'Amico Measure Protects Families from Skyrocketing Health Insurance Costs

State Rep. John D'Amico, D-Chicago, is fighting to make health care more affordable by passing legislation to protect working families from excessive health insurance rate hikes.

"Working families deserve affordable, high-quality health insurance in order to meet their health care needs," D'Amico said. "We need to ensure that insurance companies are putting patient care ahead of profits."

D'Amico recently passed House Bill 471 to prevent excessive and unfair health insurance rate hikes by requiring proposed rate hikes to be reviewed by the Illinois Department of Insurance. The department would have the authority to prohibit rate increases that are deemed unfair or unreasonable. According to the Chicago Tribune, states with laws similar to House Bill 471 have lower health insurance prices than states without them.

"No family or person should have to sacrifice doctor visits, prescriptions, or lifesaving care because of out of control health insurance costs," said D'Amico. "This legislation will protect working families and help them keep their health insurance plans."

Veteran's Pension

Memorial Day is the time of year when we remember the men and women who died while serving our country in the U.S. military. It also gives those of us in the estate planning and elder law world an opportunity to remind folks about a benefit provided by the VA for our living, elder veterans and the surviving spouses of deceased veterans.

Veterans Pension, as its known, is a monthly cash benefit paid by the VA as Supplemental Income for Wartime Veterans and is specifically designed to assist (a) low-income veterans, or, (b) veterans with higher income who spend a large portion of their income on medical needs. Importantly, Veterans Pension is NOT a retirement benefit paid to those persons who retired military or worked for the VA. Sometimes veterans are confused by the term "pension", believing that the benefit is reserved for those persons. On the contrary, the qualifying eligibility requirements are as follows:

1. The Veteran or his or her surviving spouse must have at least 90 days of active duty service;
2. The Veteran or his or her surviving spouse must have served at least one day during a "wartime period" (broadly defined by the VA); The Veteran need not have served 'in theater', but only have served (a) 90 days active and (b) 1 day during the "wartime period";
3. The Veteran or spouse must be (a) age 65 or older or (b) totally or permanently disabled or (c) patient in a nursing home receiving skilled nursing care or (d) receiving SSI or SSDI

If the Veteran or surviving spouse meets the above requirements, then the Veteran must show that his or her monthly expenses paid to health care costs (family caregiver, out-of-home caregiver, assisted living, skilled nursing) require most or all of the veteran's income. There are additional asset requirements that require review and separate analysis. (An elder lawyer who works in the area of VA pension benefit eligibility can assist with this analysis).

If the veteran or spouse meets the above criteria, then the cash benefit will be paid. The benefits can be very substantial:

Veteran	\$1,128/month	Surviving Spouse	\$757/month
Veteran who is also Housebound	\$1,378/month	Surviving Spouse who is also Housebound	\$925/month
Veteran who requires the "aid and attendance" of another requires	\$1,881/month	Surviving Spouse who "aid and attendance" the of another	\$1,211/month

Veteran's Pension is one of the most important benefits available to "wartime veterans" and their surviving spouses, particularly in the area of paying for in-home care. Veteran's Pension is one of the very few sources of funds to pay for family caregiving; commonly a family member may wish to contribute to a loved one's care but it may not be financially feasible without the Veteran's Pension benefit to assist. Elder Lawyers work in this area to assist veterans with more complex and difficult pension benefit applications. The Army sent Angelo for basic training to Camp Grant near Rockford, Illinois, and then to Camp Howze in Gainesville, Texas for infantry training. He qualified as a rifle sharpshooter and was then sent to Shreveport, Louisiana for advanced training. Angelo was sent to New York City in May 1944 and boarded a troop ship for England. He arrived in England nearly two weeks later and received additional training in preparation for the invasion of Europe.

Angelo and his unit landed on June 7, 1944, at Omaha Beach - the day after the D-day landing. There were over 2,400 American casualties at Omaha Beach and Angelo saw the dead and wounded all over the beach. Angelo's unit immediately went to the line and engaged in fierce fighting for the next week until breaking the German line at Normandy.

In July 1944, Operation Cobra began and more than 2,000 Allied aircraft rained 500 lbs bombs on the German line near St. Lo. The town was pulverized and nearly every building. Some of the Allied bombs missed their mark and fell among Allied ground forces. More than 600 American soldiers were killed or wounded in this friendly fire incident - the worst of the war. Angelo suffered a severe concussion during the incident and was hospitalized for several weeks in a field hospital at St. Lo.

Angelo was separated from his unit due to his injury. Upon released from the field hospital, he was assigned to General Patton's 3rd Army. The 3rd Army was on the march to liberate Paris. Angelo participated in heavy fighting through the month of August and entered Paris as part of the liberation of the city from four years of German occupation.

After the Liberation of Paris, Angelo continued with the 3rd Army on General Patton's March to the Rhine and into Germany. Angelo fought in the Battle of the Bulge from December 16 to 25, 1944 More than 10,000 Allied soldiers died in the battle and more than 47,000 were wounded.

Angelo continued with the 3rd Army fighting across Germany until the end of the war in Europe on May 5, 1945

Angelo was awarded 2 overseas service bars and served over a year in combat. Angelo went with General Patton's 3rd Army to Ardennes for the Battle of the Bulge from December 16 to 25, 1944 with 10,276 dead and 47,493 wounded, then on to Central Europe from March 22nd to May 11th 1945.

After VE Day, Angelo was sent to Paris and then to Marseilles. He boarded a ship to New York in late August 1945, and arrived in early September. He took a train from New York to Chicago and finally returned home after more than two and a half years in the Army.

Like thousands of other veterans, Angelo got to work. He got married, started a restaurant in the city, and started a family. After retiring from owning a restaurant, he went back to work as maître'd at Carson's Ribs on Harlem Avenue - and worked well into his 80s.

Angelo was awarded the European, African, and Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with 1 Bronze Battle Star for Central Europe, the American Campaign Medal, and the Good Conduct Medal.

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
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
