### Slots Are Still Available For Chicago Park District Day Camp

Thousands of spaces are still available for the Chicago Park District's day camp program, which began Tuesday, July 5.

"Park District day camp is an affordable option that gives children the opportunity to learn, participate in recreation and make lasting memories that define their childhood," Mayor Emanuel said. "From field trips to reading at least 30 minutes per day, it's the best deal in town when it comes to summer activities for youth. I encourage everyone to take advantage of what the Chicago Park District has to offer your child this summer."

Standard day camps run six weeks, from July 5 - August 12, typically from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. or 10 a.m. - 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Many parks offer early morning and late-day sessions as well. Fees vary depending on location, offerings and hours. No child will be turned away for inability to pay.

As part of the summer camp curriculum, campers will embark on an enriching journey through Chicago's 77 neighborhoods. The camp

theme, Explore the Spirit of Chicago - My Neighborhood, Our City, will offer new and unique ways for campers to enjoy their summer experience at their local parks, and explore our city through a series of exciting indoor and outdoor activities.

#### Financial Assistance

Financial assistance and family discounts are available. Applicants that do not qualify for financial assistance may inquire about the payment plan option at their local park.

#### Summer Food Service Program

In accordance with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) federal regulations, the Chicago Park District will participate in the Summer Food Service Program in conjunction with summer day camp. Lunches and/or snacks will be provided for enrolled children at most camps.

## New Fire Department Promotions, including Highest Ranking African-American Woman

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Fire Department Commissioner Jose Santiago commemorated the promotion and appointment of 121 firefighters during a ceremony at Navy Pier today.

The promotions announced today include Rosalind A. Jones to District Chief of District 5. She is the first woman in the history of the department to achieve the rank of District Chief. CFD 5th District covers a large section of the city’s South Side.

“Where there is danger and confusion, the Chicago Fire Department brings care and compassion – but also command and courage,” said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. “Today, we recognize the outstanding work of those who serve the department and thank them for their selfless dedication to our city.”

Under the Emanuel Administration, nearly 800 firefighters have graduated from the Fire Academy, and 120 candidates are

being trained at the Academy today. The appointments announced today include deputy fire commissioners, assistant deputy fire commissioner, district chief, and deputy district chief.

Also at today’s ceremony, the Fire Commissioner presented Lieutenant Harold Turrentine with the Commissioner’s Award of Excellence for his leadership in commanding the CFD elite Honor Guard for the past 15 years. Lieutenant Turrentine is retiring from the department.

“The brave men and women who serve in the Chicago Fire Department put duty above danger. And by doing so, they represent the very highest values of the city of Chicago,” said Fire Commissioner Jose Santiago. “With the promotion of several outstanding firefighters, I look forward to continuing our work together to ensure every resident feels safe knowing that CFD is always ready to serve and protect them.”

## Save The Park Trees From Hot Coals

The Park District would like to remind park patrons to not dump hot coals at the base of the trees. Each year, countless numbers of trees are damaged in our parks when patrons unknowingly dump hot coals at their bases.

“Red metal cans are provided to protect park patrons as well as the trees from the damage that can be caused from coals that are incorrectly disposed of in the park,” said Mike Kelly, Chicago Park District General Superintendent and CEO. “Hot coals burn the base of trees, killing the roots and eventually killing the tree. We have lost countless numbers of trees because of this.”

The Chicago Park District is reminding

park patrons this busy holiday weekend and the remainder of the summer season to follow a few simple safety precautions when grilling in a park:

- Only grill in designated grilling areas that have red, metal “hot coal cans”.
- Please stay away from playgrounds or trees. Only grill in open grassy areas.
- When finished grilling, please dispose of hot coals in the provided red, metal “hot coal cans”. DO NOT dump the hot coals at the base of tree trunks or near any playgrounds.
- Please dispose of trash and recyclables in appropriate blue recycling containers or green trash containers located in every park in the District.

## City Marks July 1 Change in Smoking Age to Protect Health of Chicago Youth

July 1, 2016 will mark an early Independence Day for thousands of Chicago youth, due to changes in Chicago’s tobacco laws that will allow them to face a future with less addiction, illness, and early death. Beginning on July 1, the minimum age to purchase tobacco products in Chicago will increase from 18 to age 21.

“Thanks to our ongoing efforts to shield our children from the harms of tobacco products, youth smoking in Chicago is on the decline, helping people to lead healthier lives and live longer” said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. “We have consistently fought to protect our youth from being targeted by Big Tobacco so they can become Chicago’s first tobacco-free generation.”

Recognizing that 90 percent of smokers start the habit before the age of 21, and that the 18-20 age range is a critical time for new smokers, these reforms seek to protect young people who are more vulnerable to nicotine addiction, and are also targeted by the tobacco industry with marketing and products designed to lure youth.

“Because their brains are still developing, adolescents are especially vulnerable to addiction to tobacco and related products. By delaying the age that youth are exposed to these products until that critical development has taken place, we increase the chance they are able to resist addiction to tobacco,” said Dr. Julie Morita, Commissioner of the Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH). “Keeping our youth away from tobacco until they are 21 is likely to extend their lives and boost the overall quality of their health.”

The City Council approved the Mayor’s most recent set of tobacco reforms in mid-March, and since then City agencies and aldermen have been working with licensed tobacco retailers to educate them about the new laws, including the requirement that all those who purchase tobacco products be at least 21 years of age.

## President Preckwinkle Launches New Cook County Website Focused on Services

A major update to Cook County's main website, unveiled today, will enable visitors to [www.cookcountyil.gov](http://www.cookcountyil.gov) to more easily connect with the County services they need, said County Board President Toni Preckwinkle.

"Government websites have a reputation for not being very user friendly," Preckwinkle said. "With our new website we put the user first."

The old school way of designing government websites was to build an online copy of what existed in the physical world - a page for each office, agency and elected official. The new County website still has these pages, but its focus is on the services the County provides. With sections focused on residents, businesses and numerous subcategories, Cook County aims to simplify the process and connect residents as quickly and easily as possible.

The new website is based on the open-sourced Drupal platform, which is used extensively in the federal and state websites. It is designed to scale for any sized screen, which means it works just as well on a smartphone as it does on a desktop computer.

Cook County used Smart Chicago's Civic User Testing Group (CUT Group) to test different ways of organizing the site during the design phase. The results should reduce the amount of searching visitors need to do to find what they want.

The content management system that County employees use to populate the site is also designed to be user friendly, which lets the employees of each department maintain their own areas and make quick updates.

## FAiR Responds to the Fly Quiet Rotation test period: The FAA has confirmed what we've known all along

With noise complaints approaching half a million per month and membership growing daily, the FAiR Allocation in Runways Coalition (FAiR) is watching closely as the new Fly Quiet nighttime rotation program is unrolled and applauds all of the parties who have worked hard to get this underway. As FAiR has long contended, all the runways at O'Hare can and should be used within their capacity constraints and this includes the diagonal 14/32 runways. Once labeled as "fatally flawed" and "a safety threat to airline passengers" by CDA Commissioner Ginger Evans, one of these runways is now an essential part of the FAA approved rotation plan, proving the inaccuracy of her claims. FAiR has long pointed out that the FAA, not the CDA, controls the airspace, and is the final word for which runway configuration can be safely utilized. The final word in this case is that the 14/32 diagonal runways are safe to operate, and should remain operational both now and in the future.

"We're grateful for the FAA approval of what FAiR has contended all along that the 14/32s are safe and essential to balanced, effective noise abatement. At this point we have serious questions about how the feedback process will engage citizens," said Dan Dwyer, of the FAiR leadership team. "FAiR has a healthy email list of people very interested in this program who reside under the flight paths, but the city has never been proactive about partnering with us. What geographic areas will they target? Should communities and residents rely on ONCC reps to communicate what's going on? Will they use the email addresses and/or mailing addresses of everyone who has complained on the city's website?"

"This is a start but needs to go much, much further," added FAiR member, Helen Rosenberg. "We hear daily from people who are selling their houses because the city won't fix this noise and pollution crisis in any meaningful way that asks the CDA and airlines to compromise as much as they have demanded from residents. Remember, when this conversation began, the city had no intention of even talking to us. It was ONLY because of FAiR and its members who demanded it. A year ago it took citizen pressure and action in the Illinois General Assembly to even begin the conversation. The CDA, ONCC, and Mayor Emanuel weren't the proactive parties they now profess to be."

While FAiR looks forward to the results of the night rotation much more is expected to be done to make the communities impacted by O'Hare livable. Without continued and aggressive noise mitigation strategies both day and night, the disproportionate burden carried by the city and suburbs around the airport will only increase and drive more citizens out of unlivable communities.

## Property Tax Bills Have August 1 Due Date Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas says

Cook County's Second Installment property tax bills for tax year 2015 are being mailed to nearly 1.8 million owners of homes, businesses and land with a due date of August 1, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Pappas said owners of taxable property should pay before the due date to avoid interest of 1.5 percent per month for late payment. On-time payments can be made:

## Mayor Emanuel Announces Tree Trimming Backlog Reduced By 80 Percent, On Track To Eliminate By Year's End

**Efforts to Protect the City's Urban Canopy are in full swing with continued tree trimming; EAB inoculations and residential tree planting**

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced that the Department of Streets and Sanitation (DSS) has reduced the City's tree trimming request backlog by nearly 80 percent with crews on pace to completely eliminate the backlog by the end of 2016. The Bureau of Forestry has been tackling the backlog utilizing new management efficiencies including grid routing. In addition, DSS has begun seasonal Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) inoculation and residential tree planting programs.

"Being more efficient allows the City to provide more effective services across the board," said Mayor Emanuel. "By ensuring tree trim requests are answered as quickly as possible, we are saving money for our taxpayers, improving the quality of life in our neighborhoods and protecting the health and vibrancy of the urban canopy for years to come."

Today, there are approximately 6,000 open residential tree trimming requests, all of which were submitted within the 2016 calendar year. In 2014, DSS had 28,000 open requests dating back to 2012.

"To help us in our efforts, the Mayor has provided the Bureau of Forestry with additional annual resources that has supported more forestry crews, the first-ever Emerald Ash Borer seasonal workforce, and resources to plant thousands of new trees in communities throughout the City—all of which allow us to beautify neighborhoods and invest in communities," added Williams.

The Mayor also made budget investments in both 2015 and 2016 for weekend forestry work, which has also helped reduce the tree trimming request backlog.

As previously announced, later this year 10 additional crews will be redirected to the Bureau of Forestry thanks to operational savings realized in the Department's grid refuse collection system. The crews will address ongoing tree trimming requests and help completely eliminate the backlog by the end of 2016.

DSS has also begun inoculations on viable Ash trees to help fight against Emerald Ash Borer, (EAB) an exotic beetle that has obliterated tens of thousands of Ash trees across the country.

The City first kicked-off its multi-year plan to protect viable trees against the EAB in 2013. Over the past three years, the Bureau of Forestry has treated more than 61,000 trees. Crews began assessing those trees for retreatment in June, and will continue working through September when treatment is believed to be most effective.

Roughly 30,000 Ash trees will be treated this year, with an additional 30,000 anticipated for 2017.

Trees being treated will be tagged with purple markers to track the treatment cycle and create awareness in the community.

More than 26,000 new trees have been planted by the City and the Park District since Mayor Emanuel took office.

This year, the Bureau of Forestry will plant an additional 3,000 new trees. The Chicago Department of Transportation will also plant nearly 1,000 trees through its Green Streets and other infrastructure projects.

The City is focusing tree planting in neighborhoods and community areas that have seen significant tree removals over the years and are utilizing a diverse set of tree species to help reduce the chances of Chicago being impacted by another invasive insect in the future.

## CBP Announces Global Entry Enrollment Event At Oshkosh 2016

Customs and Border Protection (CBP), Office of Field Operations (OFO) announced today that a Global Entry enrollment event will be held at this year's EAA AIRVENTURE Oshkosh 2016 Air Show. During this enrollment event, CBP will conduct interviews for conditionally approved Global Entry applicants.

Global Entry is a voluntary expedited clearance initiative for pre-approved low risk international travelers, who are processed by biometric identification using a designated kiosk, rather than waiting in line for entry processing by a CBP officer when entering the U. S. at a participating CBP airport. The kiosks facilitate entry by reducing wait and processing times.

To become a conditionally approved Global Entry applicant, individuals must apply online, undergo a background investigation and complete an in-person interview with a CBP officer. If no disqualifying information is found, travelers receive the benefit of expedited processing. The \$100 application fee allows for five years of membership and travelers can use the Global Entry kiosks located at 47 U.S. airports and 13 pre-clearance locations around the world.

"The goal of this enrollment event is to provide a convenient, easy-access, local venue for the thousands of aviation enthusiasts and travelers that will be at

this year's EAA," said Director of Field Operations William Ferrara. "This is an amazing event and great opportunity for those flying in from around the country to complete their Global Entry interviews with CBP."

During the enrollment event, the temporary Enrollment Center will open on Monday, July 25, 2016 and close on Sunday, July 31, 2016 with daily Enrollment Center hours from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., CT. The temporary enrollment center is located inside the Federal Pavilion.

Travelers interested in applying for Global Entry need to apply online utilizing the Global Online Enrollment System GOES. With the enrollment event quickly approaching, any applicant wishing to take advantage of this opportunity, needs to start the application process immediately. CBP strongly suggest that applications are submitted no later than June 15, as the application vetting process typically takes two weeks for conditional approval.

Global Entry also provides access to the TSA Pre✓™ initiative which offers expedited screening through domestic airport security checkpoints. Benefits of TSA Pre✓™ include being able to leave shoes, light outerwear and belts on, and not having to remove laptops from carrying cases.

## Mayor Emanuel, Chicago Park District Begin Lakefront Trail Improvements

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and the Chicago Park District joined members of the Active Transportation Alliance and the Chicago Area Runners Association today to kick off a series of improvements along the Chicago Lakefront Trail. Resurfacing and paving the trail is a major investment under Mayor Emanuel's Building on Burnham plan, a comprehensive vision to invest in Chicago's parks and open spaces.

"We are working towards making the lakefront safer, more accessible, and more enjoyable for more Chicagoans," Mayor Emanuel said. "This is the first step before we begin trail separation, which is another piece of Building on Burnham."

Resurfacing the Lakefront Trail will remove cracks and replace the faded striping with new striping and trail markings.

"Our park trails are heavily utilized and it is crucial to maintain these areas because they are not only used for recreation, but as transit options for many," said Jesse Ruiz, Chicago Park District Board President.

This summer, the Park District will resurface seven (7) miles of the Chicago

Lakefront Trail starting at Ardmore Avenue and moving south to Diversey Avenue. The next segment will go to south to Oak Street Beach from Diversey Avenue. As the project progresses, portions of the trail will be closed briefly to lay asphalt and allow it to properly settle. Trail separation work on the south side will begin in the coming months.

Improving the lakefront trail is a key component in Building on Burnham, the Mayor's comprehensive plan to invest in the Lakefront, the Chicago River, natural areas and recreational opportunities in neighborhoods across the city. This plan follows the Mayor's successful expansion of Chicago's park system in his first mayoral term, which has already added 750 acres of new parkland, 256 new playgrounds and more than \$800 million in capital investment from neighborhoods and private sources.

The Chicago Park District currently manages more than 65 protected natural areas, encompassing more than 1,400 acres. Building on Burnham will underscore the expansion of natural areas, setting a goal of 2,020 acres of protected natural areas in the City of Chicago by 2020.

"Company" is a musical that is concluding the 2015-2016 season for Writers Theatre. The show is being directed by William Brown and has a book by George Furth. Music and lyrics are by Stephen Sondheim.

Thom Miller plays Bobby who is a thirty-five year old bachelor who is still single and who is still trying to hae a serious relationship without having a serious commitment. Mr. Miller's strong singing voice is perfect for the Sondheim songs.

Bobby's friends are all couples who are in serious stages of their marriages. Mr. Miller has a demanding role and does a superb job.

Cast members making up the other couples include the amazing Lia Mortensen, one of Chicago's finest actresses and one from whom you'll be hearing a lot - playing Joanne, Chelsea Morgan as Kathy, Blair Robertson as Jenny, Alexis J. 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# Archbishop Cupich Ordained Thirteen Men As Permanent Deacons At Holy Name Cathedral

The newly ordained deacons completed a comprehensive four-year program through the Institute for Diaconal Studies (IDS) at the University of Saint Mary of the Lake / Mundelein Seminary that included the human, spiritual, intellectual and pastoral dimensions of formation, field education experiences in service to charity and evangelization and a year-long parish pastoral ministry internship. Typically, newly-ordained deacons are assigned to their home parishes, which this year include parishes in: Chicago, Beach Park/Zion, Lemont, Mount Prospect, Oak Forest, Oak Lawn, Park Ridge, Tinley Park, Wadsworth and Wauconda.

More than 93 percent of deacons are married with families and most are also employed in outside occupations. They are clergy, along with priests and bishops. The ministries that Deacons perform include the teaching mission of the Church, caring for the poor, performing baptisms and marriages, conducting funeral liturgies, presiding at wake services and assisting the priest at Mass by proclaiming the Gospel, preaching, leading intercessions, preparing the altar, distributing Holy Communion and intoning the dismissal. The Archdiocese of Chicago has the largest diaconate in the entire Catholic Church with more than 500 active deacons.

## City's Newest Lifeguards at Chicago Park District Graduation Ceremony

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Chicago Park District General Superintendent Michael P. Kelly today congratulated 353 new recruits that will guard the city's beaches and pools at a graduation ceremony held at Curie High School. The lifeguard program is part of the City's One Summer Chicago program, which recently expanded to provide 30,000 youth jobs this summer.

To be admitted into the training program, applicants must pass an initial qualifying test that includes successful execution of: a 200 yard swim against time; a 25 yard underwater swim to retrieve an object at the bottom of a 14 ft. pool, front and rear strangle holds and 20 yard chest carry.

To participate in the qualifying test for admission into the Academy, applicants must meet the following criteria: be a Chicago resident; be 16 years or older by July 1; have proper I-9 Form to verify identity and employment eligibility and demonstrate satisfactory visual, hearing and verbal skills. In addition, each candidate must hold a current American Red Cross and Chicago Park District certification for lifeguarding and first aid. Certification for these credentials is available through the Chicago Park District Lifeguard training class.

This summer, the Chicago Park District will employ over 1,000 lifeguards to promote water safety at Chicago's 26 beaches and 75 park pools.

Outdoor park pools open June 17 from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Chicago beaches, which opened on Memorial Day, have hours of 11 a.m. - 7 p.m. daily.

## Do You Know Who Your Designated Beneficiaries Are?

It's likely you already have a comprehensive estate plan in place and probably spent hours contemplating the decisions you made in your plan. You also placed a great deal of thought towards the distribution of your estate assets, your choice for executor of your Will, Trustee of your Trust, and guardian for your minor children. You covered everything right? Well maybe not. All too often, people forget one important aspect of estate planning – beneficiary designations.

### What Are Beneficiary Designations?

Although you may not realize it, beneficiary designations govern many of your most valuable assets. Life insurance policies, retirement plans, and investment and bank accounts, as well as mutual funds and brokerage accounts all may have beneficiary designations. In some states, even personal property, such as your vehicle, may carry a beneficiary designation. These designations dictate who will inherit the asset in the

event of your death notwithstanding a provision to the contrary in your last Will and testament or a Trust agreement.

### The Forgotten Beneficiary

The problem with beneficiary designations is that we often forget about them. Frequently, a beneficiary designation is filled out as an afterthought without giving any consideration to how the designation fits into an overall estate plan. For example, when you opened your bank account you likely filled in a designated beneficiary; but do you even remember doing so? Do you remember who you designated? Or, when you filled out that stack of paperwork you were handed after being hired for your current job, you likely designated a beneficiary for your employer-sponsored retirement plan and life insurance policy. Again, do you remember designating a beneficiary? The answer is probably "no." People fill out beneficiary designations all the time without giving the choice of beneficiary much thought. Unfortunately, the consequences can wreak havoc with your overall estate plan in two important ways:

- **Failing to change your beneficiary designations** – just as your comprehensive estate plan should be updated when certain events in your life occur, your beneficiary designations should be as updated well. For example, if you filled out your retirement plan and life insurance beneficiaries ten years ago and named your boyfriend/girlfriend as your beneficiary, it could be a problem if you are now with someone else. Conversely, you might have named your mother as a beneficiary on your mutual fund account but have now married. Either way, someone you would not want to inherit your assets stands to do so in the event of your death because you failed to change your beneficiary designations upon the occurrence of a life event that should have triggered a review of your beneficiaries.
- **Missing beneficiary designations** – missing beneficiary designations are also problematic. Maybe you never got around to filling out the beneficiary designations for your retirement account or maybe your original beneficiary has since died and you failed to designate a successor or contingent beneficiary. Either way, if there is no living named beneficiary, the assets controlled by the beneficiary designation will not go as intended. The assets will go as laid out in the underlying contract. For example, the life insurance policy, custodial agreement, or other contract might provide that the assets go to the surviving spouse, to blood relatives, or to the estate of the deceased. Someone you did not intend might receive the assets instead of people you would have preferred. Additionally, traditional IRA and retirement plan assets are tax-deferred, meaning they are taxed when distributed. If there is no designated beneficiary, the assets must be distributed more quickly than otherwise, and, therefore, taxed more quickly.

### Don't Let This Happen to You!

As you can see, beneficiary designations play an important, yet often forgotten, role in any comprehensive estate plan. With that in mind, take some time to review who your designated beneficiaries are. Then, make a point to review those designations periodically and every time a life event calls for a review of your estate plan. If you have questions or concerns regarding your beneficiary designations, be sure to consult with an experienced estate planning attorney in your area to make sure the plan you've carefully put in place will always reflect your planning goals.

## Village Cooking Corner

### ROCK CORNISH HENS ALA PINEAPPLE

4 Cornish Hens  
2 Slices bread, toasted lightly  
1 tsp. salt (or to taste)  
1 tsp. coarse ground pepper  
1/4 stick unsalted butter

1 tsp. mint, chopped if fresh or crushed if dried  
2 cans Dole Pineapple-orange juice (or just plain pineapple juice)  
6 celery stalks (whole)

Wash Cornish hens and pat dry. Mix toasted cubed slices of bread with 1 stick of melted butter. Combine salt, pepper, mint and one of the cans of pineapple-orange juice. Add to bread mixture. Chop one of the celery stalks finely and add to bread mixture. Stuff the Cornish hens with the bread mixture. Tie the legs of the Cornish hens. Grease a baking casserole dish and line the baking pan with the rest of the celery stalks. Place the Cornish Hens on the celery stalks. Combine the 2nd 6 oz. can of pineapple orange juice with 1 cup of water and pour over the hens. Seal the baking pan with foil wrap and bake in a preheated oven of 350 degrees. Remove foil wrap the last 15 minutes to brown the hens. Hens are baked when you are able to easily move the leg away from the Cornish hen's body. Serve the Cornish hens on a bed of rice surrounded with mandarin orange slices and fresh pineapple. Serve a baby greens salad with a light vinaigrette dressing on the salad. Bon Appetit! This meal will delight your guests.

## Snowballs in July?

The popular perennial flowering shrub, known as the Hydrangea, begins blooming at the start of July. The blooms are either shaped like a large snowball, technically known as a mophead, or like a cone. White is the most popular color. This is why hydrangea flowers are sometimes called "snowballs"... they are white in color and shaped like a ball. However, there are some blue, pink, and red varieties available now which will survive our cold Chicagoland winters.

There are a few reasons why white is the most popular color. First, most of the old fashion varieties that are hardy in Chicago only came in white. Second, the new colorful hydrangeas often require an acidic soil, something we don't have in Chicago because our soil is quite alkaline. In some of the newer varieties like "Endless Summer" and "all Summer Beauty" acid in the soil changes the color of the flower from pink to blue. In the Chicagoland area, one must add sulfur to the soil to make it more acidic to produce more vibrant colors. These varieties seem to do best in the southeastern part of America where the soil is naturally more acidic.

Hydrangeas can be divided into three size categories. First there are the 3' tall varieties. This size is the most popular. Second, there are the tall varieties that can easily grow to 6'. Third, there are the climbing hydrangeas which they say will grow to 85' tall. Personally, the climbing hydrangeas make a nice climbing plant, but I have never seen one anywhere near to 75' tall.

Hydrangeas prefer growing conditions which range from full sun to part shade. If the plant is in too much shade, then it will not bloom. In my experience, hydrangeas need at least half a day of sun to really bloom well. People might argue with me, but that has been my experience. Some even promote hydrangeas as shade plants and I just do not agree.

The flowers of hydrangeas can be picked in bloom and put in a vase with water. The flower heads can also be picked and allowed to dry out, and then used in dried flower arrangements. When fall approaches, some people leave the dried flower heads on the plant for interest in the garden during winter.

If you want to grow a hydrangea your best chance for success will be to grow one of the old fashion white varieties. I recommend the variety "Annabelle." This is a white, mophead or snowball type flowering variety which grows about 3' tall and 4' wide. "Annabelle" is very hardy during cold Chicagoland winters, and is very easy to grow. Unless you really want to exert a lot of time and effort growing a hydrangea, I do not recommend any of the newer blue and pink varieties. From talking to many gardeners, I have not heard many success stories. So, give yourself the best chance for success by growing an "Annabelle" hydrangea.



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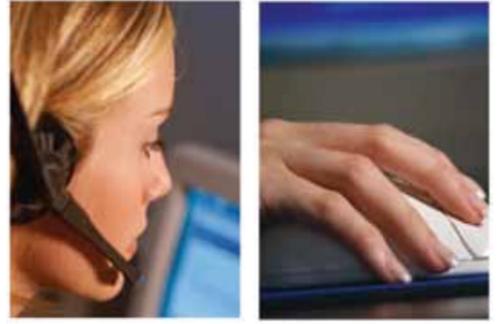
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
