



Property Tax Bills Are Due November 3, Pappas Says

Property tax bills for the second installment of tax year 2007 being mailed to property owners are due November 3, 2008, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Owners of Cook County's 1.7 million homes and other parcels of property can pay electronically from a checking or savings account at cookcountytreasurer.com, Pappas said.

Pappas advised owners to have their 14-digit Property Index Number available when they make on-line payments.

Owners should write the PIN on payment checks and need the bill and stub in making other forms of payment:

In person, at more than 300 Chase Bank locations, including at 68 Dominick's stores.

In person, by direct debit at 217 participating community banks. By return mail, postmarked no later than November 3, 2008.

Callers to 312.443.5100 also should have the PIN to get the bill amount in English, Polish or Spanish.

Offenders will be fined \$75 for texting while driving and \$200 when it results in a crash.

Area Aldermen Hold Meeting Regarding School Overcrowding

Aldermen Margaret Laurino (39th Ward), Brian Doherty (41st Ward) and Patrick Levar (45th Ward) held a meeting on Tuesday, September 23, 2008 at Alderman Laurino's ward office concerning overcrowding in our public schools. Present at the meeting were Aldermen Doherty, Laurino, and Levar; Arne Duncan, CEO, Chicago Public Schools; Mr. Joseph Kallas, Area Instructional Officer, Cluster 1, Area 1, (CPS) and Mr. James DeSpensa, School Demographic and Planning Officer (CPS).

This meeting was coordinated by Alderman Laurino as a follow up to a previous meeting of August 12, 2008 which was held with local Chicago Public School principals to discuss the issue of overcrowding in our local public schools.

The statistics bear out that there is a critical need for additions to the northwest side Chicago Public elementary schools. Of particular concern are Edgebrook School, 6525 N. Hiawatha, and Sauganash School, 6040 N. Kilpatrick. The enrollment at Edgebrook School has increased 31% since 2003. Sauganash School is currently educating 506 students in a building designed for 345 students. A great concern for these particular schools is that they are nearing 100% capacity with mobiles. If this were to happen, it could lead to a closed enrollment policy which would cause undue hardship for many families.

Arne Duncan, CEO (CPS), and his staff readily agreed that our overcrowding issue should be a top priority for the Chicago Public Schools. The problem lies in the lack of capital funds for building. Complicating matters is the fact that our schools are not located in areas which would qualify them for T.I.F. (Tax Increment Financing), which puts us at a disadvantage. Mr. Duncan agreed to review his 2009 Capital Funding Budget in an attempt to find any capital funds to begin these much needed additions.

The Chicago Public Schools have previously worked with Alderman Doherty and his constituents to reinstate Edison School, 6220 N. Olcott, as an attendance area school in an effort to help ease the overcrowding issues in some sections of the 41st Ward.

Alderman Doherty, Alderman Laurino and Alderman Levar would like to thank Mr. Arne Duncan and his staff for taking the time to attend what they feel was a very productive meeting. They would also like to thank the local school principals for their valuable input, and the Local School Councils involved for their continued support of our Chicago Public Schools, which have made historic and unprecedented educational achievements over the past 10 years.

In addition, Aldermen Doherty and Levar would like to thank Alderman Laurino for coordinating these meetings and for the use of her office as a central meeting point.



Urban Wildlife Coalition Choosing a Humane Wildlife Removal Company

The last two editions of this newspaper featured tips for preventing unwanted wildlife from making your home, their home and suggestions for how to get critters to leave once they take residence. More often than not, we can resolve conflicts with wildlife on our own. But in some cases, it becomes necessary to call in the pros. Be sure you are making the right choice and that the wildlife removal company you select is humane. With guidance from the Humane Society of the United States, below are seven tips for choosing a wildlife control company.

Make sure the company will provide an on-site inspection and a written quote. The on-site inspection fee should apply toward the work that is contracted. During the inspection, ask that the company identify the animal and where it is gaining access to your home. Ask them to provide photos if it's not clear to you.

Request specific details about how the problem will be resolved and how the animal(s) will be treated. Will the animal be killed or relocated, and if so why? Are there young animals that will be orphaned or abandoned? Will the method resolve the problem over the long term?

Insist upon the use of guaranteed exclusion strategies (e.g. one-way doors and/or hands-on removal and reunion of families, leading to their release onsite).

Make sure that the company provides a full range of animal proofing/exclusion services that carry at least a one-year guarantee against reentry.

Do not sign a contract with an open-ended clause allowing a company to charge for removal of all animals trapped on the property. Some service providers claim this is a way of preventing other wildlife problems, but it is unethical and will not solve long-term problems.

Contact a local wildlife rehabilitator (visit www.urbanwildlifecoalition.org for a list of humane, certified, wildlife rehabbers) for referrals to wildlife removal companies.

Request a written assurance from the company that its practices are in compliance with federal, state, and local laws and regulations and that the company carries commercial liability insurance.

Next year will be the debut season for the "Zahara" zinnia series. The plant trials received some seeds in advance in order to grow the plants used in this summer's trials. The seed will not be commercially available until the fall of 2008. This demonstrates how valuable the plant trials are in this instance. By having "Zahara" zinnias at plant trials one year in advance of their introduction, growers can analyze how good or bad they grow. The performance of the plants and flowers of the "Zahara" zinnias was as good as the existing "Profusion" series. Therefore we have already ordered seed and will offer "Zahara Yellow" next year.

At Urhausen Greenhouses we pride ourselves on always having the "hot" new plants. As a grower, I have to evaluate these plants one year in advance because I know customers will be asking about them. Any good breeder will flood the media with news releases of the new plants they have bred. So, I know garden writers in magazines and newspapers will mention "Zahara" zinnias in articles this winter and spring. This means that customers will be asking questions about them. Now, I can inform them that the plants will perform in our area. If not for plant trials, I could either not grow the plants at all, or I could grow them and tell people that I really don't know how well they will perform. Both of these options are unacceptable.

THE JOY OF JEWELRY



Mysterious, Magical Opals Opals, one of October's birthstones, are unique

among gems because of the extraordinary way in which they brilliantly give off the colors of the rainbow. This magical property derives from the manner in which opals are formed from hydrated silica spheres. Light By Cynthia Sliwa interacts with the spheres of various sizes and patterns, resulting in vibrant flashes of color.

Opals are found in several distinct varieties. The most common is white or colorless; the most highly prized is called black opal, but may actually have a blue or dark grey background. A third variety is the boulder opal, a combination of the precious opal with a backing or border of ironstone, the stone in which the gemstone is found. The play of colors inside the stone is what gives opals their special appeal. All of these varieties of opal are always cut flat or into cabochons, as facets add no additional brilliance.

Fire opals are entirely different. They are vibrantly colored orange, red or yellow gemstones. These are the only opals you will find cut in faceted versions to show off their intense, translucent color, as they do not share the rainbow flashes seen in other opals.

Part of the mystery of opals is the folklore that says it is unlucky to wear opals unless they are your birthstone. One theory is that the superstition derived from a 19th Century poem by Sir Walter Scott. Others associate the stone with a string of bad luck by a Spanish king. Others say that the popularity of opals at the time of the plague in 13th Century Europe associated the stone with that frightening period of history. But the bad reputation of the opal is undeserved.

Indeed, opals have been cherished through the centuries and are believed to possess very high and positive energy. The stone was used in prophecy, and was believed to protect the eyes and strengthen the mind and memory. Some call the opal the Cupid Stone, capable of bringing one his or her heart's desire. To the extent that opals encompassed the colors of other gemstones such as rubies and emeralds, the ancient Romans attributed the qualities of those stones to opals as well, calling them the Queen of Gems.

Many of the most spectacular opals derive from Australia, although beautiful stones are also supplied from Mexico, Brazil and Oregon. Opals are a soft, porous stone, and need special care as well as protection against knocks, heat, and extended exposure to bright light in order to preserve their magical, mysterious colors.

Even if you are in peak health today, a few years later some things may have changed that require a revisiting of your treatment plan. Maybe your blood pressure needs medication. Maybe you have high cholesterol, which is capable of being controlled with adjustments to diet or medication.

Like you health, your estate plan needs a periodic checkup. Here are some factors which might lead to a change in your estate plan.

Changes in the Law

In health, the laws of physics and chemistry do not change. However, changes in the law, both small and large, may have a large impact on your estate plan. For example, tax laws change frequently and your plan may need to be revised to minimize your tax liability. Non-tax laws also change periodically, opening the doors to new opportunities that were not available when your estate plan was drafted.

Changes in Your Life

Just as with your health, circumstances change. Maybe you had changes in your family circumstances, like marriage, divorce, or the birth of children or grandchildren. Perhaps someone in your family has had health or financial changes that should be reflected in your plan.

Changes in Desires

Even if there are no changes in the law or your life, sometimes we simply change our minds. As we age, hopefully we gain wisdom and experience. Sometimes that leads us to change our estate plan. For example, if a close friend of yours goes through a messy divorce, you may be more inclined to leave assets for your children in a trust that providesprotection in the (hopefully unlikely) event of their divorce.

If you already have an estate plan in place, be sure to schedule an appointment with your estate planning attorney for a periodic review. There may be new factors and laws to consider of which you are unaware. And, just as with your health, if you notice important changes in circumstances, you should be sure to schedule that review sooner, rather than later.

If you are just starting out and do not have an estate plan, or you have moved to a new state, be sure to find a qualified estate planning attorney, who focuses his or her practice in estate planning.

<u>INVESTMENT IDEAS</u> **Don't Follow the Herd**

There's a theory on Wall Street that goes something like this: If you follow the crowd and buy the hot investment of the day, chances are you'll be scooping up shares when most others are about to sell. This natural "herd instinct" of buying when everyone is euphoric may mean you've entered the game too late and are buying at the wrong time.

Investors often jump in at the wrong time because they're worried about what others are doing instead of focusing on good old-fashioned fundamentals such as a company's earning potential and its management.

History continually shows us that when individuals choose investments without a prudent basis for doing so, they often wind up losing money that can take many years to recover. We saw this from 1998-2000, when investors drove the Nasdaq composite over 5,000 -- only to see it fall to less than 2,000 over the following year.

History has also shown that when individuals avoid investments because the popular thinking is to steer clear of them, opportunities are often overlooked. We saw this in early 1982, when interest rates were high and companies had a difficult time impressing analysts with their earning potential. That period proved to be the beginning of a bull market that lasted more than fifteen years.

Good Advice

In response to market downturns, some investors shift a greater percentage of their assets to liquid investments. Time and again, this strategy has also proven to be a mistake.

Keep in mind that, over its history, the stock market has experienced nearly twice as many bullish periods as bearish periods. And while past performance is no guarantee of future investment results, the stock market has bounced back from every major market downturn to date.

When times get tough for stocks, we generally recommend that you maintain your confidence in their long-term growth potential and use these simple strategies:

Reduce your cost by averaging down. If one of your stocks declines in value, but the underlying business still appears sound, consider buying more shares. You will reduce your overall cost basis; you do, of course, increase your losses should the stock value continue to fall.

Stay diversified. Keep your assets spread among investments which have historically performed differently under the same market conditions. Profits from appreciated investments can help offset losses from any losing investments.

Stay focused on your long-term goal. Don't try to avoid the downturn by jumping out of the market. No one can accurately predict when it will rebound. Remembering why you invested in the first place will help you stay calm during times of market uncertainty.


