Indian Land Dancing Mosaic

Alderman Toni Preckwinkle had the honor of joining Mayor Richard M. Daley and 48th Ward Alderman Mary Ann Smith at the dedication ceremony of "Indian Land Dancing," a 3,400 square foot bricolage located on the walls of the Foster Avenue underpass of Lake Shore Drive.

The work is Chicago"s largest direct-application mosaic and the only piece of public art in the City that was designed by Native Americans. Hundreds of ceramic and mirror tiles, paintings and photographs created the images now on display at the Foster underpass.

"First of all, as a former history teacher, it is always a pleasure to celebrate history, especially that of Native Americans in Chicago. The work is absolutely beautiful. Mayor Daley, Alderman Smith, Chicago Public Art Group and Alternative Inc. should all be commended for facilitating the transformation of public space into sacred space," said Alderman Preckwinkle at the dedication.

The mural was part of a Summer Initiative Apprenticeship program, developed by Alternatives Inc. through funding in part by After School Matters. In addition to 30 teen apprentices, Chicago Public Art Group artists Tracy Van Duinen, Todd Osborne and Cynthia Weiss worked with native artists from several tribes and representatives of Chicago-area Indian organizations to develop the themes and images used in the work.



The Polish Genealogical Society of America (PGSA) will hold its 31st annual conference September 18-19, 2009, at the Marriott Schaumburg, 50 N. Martingale Road, Schaumburg, IL 60173.

Entitled "Unraveling the Mysteries," the conference features many well-known genealogical experts.

Don Litzer, former librarian at the Allen County Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, will speak on the mysteries of PERSI and resources at the Allen County Library.

Kahlile Mehr, Head of the Slavic/Eastern Collection at the LDS Family History Library in Salt Lake City, will bring attendees up-to-date on the online databases of the Polish State Archives, East European internet sites and Polish online maps.

Dr. Michael J. Mikos, professor of foreign languages and linguistics at University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee, will lecture on visiting Poland and explain more about the partitions of Poland.

Cynthia Piech, board member and treasurer of the PGSA, will talk on folk costumes of various regions of Poland.

Craig Pfannkuche, president of Memory Trail Research, Inc. and genealogical archivist at the Chicago and Northwestern Historical Society, will explain what's new with Cook County Records, how to research "bad guys" in your family tree and doing family history research in cemeteries.

Urban Wildlife Coalition: Coexisting with Urban Wildlife

Surrounded by tall buildings, cropped lawns, minvans, and cell phone towers, it's easy to forget we humans are just one small segment of a larger ecosystem – one that supports wondrous varieties of flora and fauna. Our urban environment seems dominated by homo sapiens, but it's important to remember that we are deeply connected to all those that live in our community – maples, oaks, and aspen; raccoons, squirrels, and robins – and to be respectful neighbors. Inevitably, conflicts will arise, but far too often our human-led "solutions" to problems with urban plants and animals result in unanticipated, long-term, far-reaching repercussions, disruptions that can be catastrophic to nature's balance.

Those of us fortunate enough to live near tranquil natural areas find sanctuary just steps from our front door and the privilege to reconnect with the "wild" world, while enjoying the perks of urban living. Urban Wildlife Coalition is a community-based organization founded to help preserve our treasured city wildlife and to suggest ways we can live in harmony with the non-human living things that also call Chicagoland home.

A few guidelines to living peacefully with our "wild" neighbors:

Realize they are a lot like us. Deer eating your plants? Raccoon trapped in your attic? It's easy to think of these animals as "pests," critters bent on annoying us, when really, they are very much like us, motivated by hunger and thirst and the desire to shelter and protect their families.

Determine what is truly a threat or problem. Seeing more deer, coyotes, or bats in our neighborhood is not cause for alarm. Like human populations, animal populations ebb and flow. Moreover, as we continue to destroy natural animal habitats, it is no surprise that those creatures most able to adapt will venture into our backyards, even our homes, to find food and shelter. Take time to find out... how likely is it really that an urban animal is dangerous? In the greater scheme, how serious is a little garden damage?

Consider humane, non-lethal action first. If we believe humans are more intelligent than other animals, then let's act that way. When presented with a wildlife problem or conflict, let us avoid shooting first and asking questions later. Generally, the humane solution is easy and more effective over time. Learn how to prevent, deter, or remove unwanted guests without inflicting unnecessary pain or anguish. These are living beings that happen to share our community, not enemies that need to be eliminated.





DANK-Haus Opens "Lost German Chicago"

The DANK-Haus in historic Lincoln Square will present "Lost German Chicago" in its newly created museum space. The exhibition features art, artifacts and memorabilia from within Chicago's German American community. The items record what has been lost in the Chicago German community while archiving and preserving that which has been entrusted to DANK. Highlights include: exquisite wood carvings dedicated by the Germania Club by the Oscar Mayer family, relics from the Deutsches Haus at the Columbian Exposition, Hessen Verein standards, items from dozens of restaurants including the original Red Star Inn, Schulien's Math Igler's Casino, the Golden Ox, memories of St. Boniface Church, Deli Meyer, FC Hansa, the Schiller Liedertafel, Schoenhofen Brewery, Lincoln Park Turner Hall and many more.

The exhibition opens on Friday, October 2 and runs through October 2011. The public is invited to Opening Night, Friday October 2, 2009 at 7:30 pm, group entry every 30 minutes until 11:30 pm. Free and open to the public.

When the inhabitants of Gilligan's Island went out for their three-hour tour aboard the S. S. Minnow, chances are they were not prepared for what was about to befall them. Of course, Thurston and Eunice "Lovey" Howell (being the money-savvy individuals they were) probably had a comprehensive estate plan, complete with a Revocable Living Trust. But what about the rest of them? If they had never been rescued—or worse yet, died at sea—would Mary Ann's fam-

ily be stuck in probate court attempting to divide her property even today?

It's easy to discuss life after disaster when we're dealing with fictional characters, but what if it were you? Before you take a trip, you need to ask yourself some important questions: What measures have I taken to protect my legacy if something were to happen to me? Who would make medical decisions for me if I were incapacitated? Is my family aware of my wishes regarding my kids, health, and finances?

You may have booked your flight, reserved your hotel and arranged for a private tour of the Louvre, but if you haven't made legal provisions for yourself and your family, you haven't planned well enough. A postcard of the Champs-Élysées will not be enough to remind your loved ones of your individuality, your values, and your legacy.

So let's take a leaf out of the Howells' book. Here's what you should have in place before you pack your bags: First of all, you should have a Will. A Will designates guardians for your minor children, as well as divides and distributes your assets among your beneficiaries.

In addition to a Will, you should establish a General Durable Power of Attorney and a Health Care Directive. These documents name an "agent" who will take charge of your financial affairs and medical decisions if you are unable to do so.

Finally, you should set up a Revocable Living Trust. Among the many benefits of a Living Trust is the fact that your loved ones will not have to deal with the possible delays and costs of probate. Furthermore, you will be able to designate not only to whom your assets are given, but when, and how. You may also establish guidelines for the use of the inheritance and protect it from things like divorce, creditors, remarriage, and unwise spending of your heirs.

Once these measures are put in place, you will be able to relax and enjoy the lights of Paris, the beaches of Hawaii, or even the oasis of the Sahara the way they were meant to be enjoyed: worry-free!

Social Security: SPOUSES CAN APPLY ONLINE, TOO

Social Security Public Affairs Specialist for the Metropolitan Chicago Area You probably already know that when it comes time to apply for retirement, you can do it online at www.socialsecurity.gov/applyonline. But did you know that spouses can apply online, too?

That's right. If you are a spouse applying for benefits based on your husband's or wife's record, you can do it online from the convenience of your own home. It's so easy!

Wonder whether you may qualify to apply for spouse's benefits? If you are a spouse who has not worked or who has worked for very low wages, you could be entitled to a benefit equal to as much as one-half of your retired spouse's full benefit. Even if you are divorced, you may be eligible for benefits based on the employment record of your former spouse.

To get benefits on your spouse's record, you must be at least age 62 or have a qualifying child in your care — a child who is under age 16 or who receives Social Security disability benefits.

The amount of your spousal benefit depends on your age at retirement. If you begin receiving benefits before full retirement age, your benefits will be permanently reduced in most cases.

You also may be eligible for a retirement benefit based on your own earnings. If that benefit is higher than the spousal benefit, Social Security would pay you the higher benefit. We compare which of the two benefits would be more beneficial to you, and discuss the options you have.

If you have reached your full retirement age and are eligible for a spouse's benefit as well as your own retirement benefit, you may choose to receive the spouse's benefits only in order to continue accruing delayed retirement credits on your own Social Security record. You may then file for benefits at a later date and receive a higher monthly benefit based on the effect of delayed retirement credits.

Remember that if you are a spouse who is taking care of a minor child (16 or under) or a child who is disabled and gets Social Security benefits on your or your spouse's record, you can receive a benefit, regardless of your retirement age.

Canine Distemper

In the next series of columns we will discuss some of the routine vaccinations given to your pets and which diseases they protect against.

One of the most important vaccinations to give to your dog is the distemper vaccination. Due to it's name people quite often believe that somehow this vaccination relates to the dog's temperament and is a means to keep it from becoming aggressive. It has no association with controlling the demeanor of the dog, but rather protects it against a very serious and deadly disease.

Distemper is caused by a virus which affects the respiratory, gastrointestinal and central nervous systems. It is very contagious, incurable and often fatal. It has a worldwide distribution and was a leading cause of death in unvaccinated puppies, which are most susceptible to the infection. In the 1960s a vaccination preventing distemper was introduced which caused a dramatic reduction in cases in pet dogs. Due to widespread vaccination programs utilized currently the incidence of distemper has been greatly reduced.

Distemper still is a serious risk to all unvaccinated dogs. Young puppies between 3 and 6 months of age are the most susceptible to infection and are more likely to die than infected adults. Non-vaccinated older dogs are also highly susceptible to infection.

The virus exists in the environment, especially in unvaccinated dogs and wild animals such as raccoons, skunks and foxes. The infection is spread by airborne viral particles passed in bodily secretions, especially those from the respiratory tract.

Symptoms of the disease usually begin as a fever and eventually develop into gastrointestinal and respiratory signs, such as runny nose, conjunctivitis, diarrhea, vomiting and pneumonia. As the disease progresses neurological signs develop including seizures, incoordination, staggering, twitching, spasms and paralysis.

There is no specific treatment for the viral infection, just supportive care. Most dogs die from the disease and those that survive may have permanent central nervous system damage.

The best way to avoid this deadly disease is through vaccination. Puppies should be put on a vaccination schedule outlined by your veterinarian. You should keep to this schedule as puppies are at the greatest risk to develop the disease. The protection provided by the vaccinations begins to wane over time so booster vaccinations are essential to maintain immunity to distemper at effective levels. Depending upon the vaccinations used by your veterinarian boosters are given yearly or every three years.

Do not take any chances with this disease. Distemper is a real threat that exists for your pets. It is easily prevented by properly vaccinating your dogs and maintaining their booster vaccinations. Make sure your dog is up to date on their vaccines.
