Synopsis of History of the Chicago Air and Water Show- Wings Above the Waves

By Gerry and Janet Souter The Chicago Air and Water Show: A History of Wings above the Waves" tells how a simple water show in 1959 with a budget of \$88 grew into the greatest free public air and water spectacle in the country. In 1911, early in the history of flight, Chicagoans were treated to the world's largest International Aviation Meet that entertained millions

for nine days. World aviation records were set by the planes of the Wright brothers and Glenn Curtiss. The world's greatest aviators came to own their piece of the sky above Grant Park and Lake Michigan.



In 1959, the young Queen of England arrived by Royal Yacht to land in Chicago near Buckingham Fountain escorted by a fleet of destroyers and squadrons of jet fighters amid a sky full of exploding fireworks. That same year Chicago hosted the Pan Am Games and the city was crowded with sporting events and Athletes of all the Americas. These great events overshadowed a small local "day at the beach" for Park District families held on a borrowed barge with a diving board, with kids climbing greased poles and diving for watermelons. Three years later, the

U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds scorched down the lakefront and hammered up into their classic diamond formation above the heads of startled Chicagoans. From there the show grew and the crowds came as did the stunt pilots and parachutists, the water skiers and power boats.

In the History of the Chicago Air and Water Show, memorable anecdotes are peppered throughout: cars designed to drive straight into the lake; King Neptune rising out of the Chicago River; the year they released pigeons at the opening ceremony with disastrous results; the thunder of Air Force, Navy and Marine jet fighters beating against the skyline and the bodies of three million spectators. Skydancing daredevils in custom-built stunt planes fill the skies above North Avenue Beach with smoke trails as power-boats, water skis, hang-gliders and parachutists show the faces of skill and daring. This book presents the show from the inside-out, featuring the players and the teamwork that has made this spectacle possible for the past 50 years.

GARAGE & YARD SALES PERMIT INFORMATION for the CITY OF CHICAGO

THE PERMIT PROCESS Since October of 1996, a permit is required for all garage sales, yard sales, apartment sales and similar occasional sales of household goods that are conducted on residential property within the City of Chicago. The action was taken by the ChicagoCity Council to eliminate the many sales operating week after week that actually were unlicensed retail operations. Issued by the Department of Streets and Sanitation, or an agent appointed by the department, these permits are free and must be displayed during the sale period.

Each household is entitled to two permits per year, with a third sale authorized only if the occupants are moving permanently from their residence. If more than one household is joining in a single sale, each household needs its own permit, even if the sale is at the address of only one participating household.

The ordinance also prohibits any signs advertising these sales on light poles or other property except at the site of the sale itself. These sales are limited to three consecutive days between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and sunset. In case of rain, the sale can be held during the next three days after the permit period, but is still limited to three total days.

Violators face fines ranging from \$50 to \$500, with each day representing a separate offense. Charitable organizations, synagogues, churches, and schools are exempt from the ordinance.

If you are a resident of the 50th Ward, you may obtain your permit by visiting Alderman Stone's Lincoln Avenue Ward office. A driver's license, state I.D., or utility bill is required when filling out the permit application, to show proof of residency.

FREE MEDICAL PICTURE ID PROGRAM COMES TO ALDERMAN STONE'S OFFICE

The Chicago Medical ID program offers a free medical identification card to Chicago residents of all ages who want their medical information and vital statistics readily available.

The front of the identification card includes: Name, address, date of birth, emergency contact, phone number, and photo.

The reverse side of the card includes: Primary Care Physician name and phone number, medical conditions (if any), blood pressure status, and any medical allergies.

West Nile Virus Update

The North Shore Mosquito Abatement District (NSMAD) reported a pool of mosquitoes from Evanston has tested positive for West Nile Virus. This is the first positive pool identified in Evanston in 2010. So far this year in Illinois there have been 28 positive pools statewide with no human cases reported. The North Shore Mosquito Abatement District has not scheduled any spraying at this time.

Protect yourself:

- Eliminate mosquitoes that cause West Nile Virus from your property;
- Dump water out of bird bath's, children's toys, pet dishes and rain gutters;
- Remove old tires, empty planters, and other containers that hold water;
- Wear long sleeves and long pants at dusk and dawn; and
- Read instructions on repellent labels before using.

- Dead birds seen in Evanston

The NSMAD serves the community in the interest of public health by working to reduce and control the regional mosquito population: so as to reduce the possibility of mosquito borne diseases and minimize the exposure to mosquitoes.



You are eligible to donate if you are 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and are healthy. The Health Department especially encourages people with Otype blood to donate, as they are "universal donors" whose blood can be used with any other blood type. Each pint of blood donated can help up to three people, and you can donate once every 56 days. If you donate the maximum of six times a year, up to 18 people can benefit.

Blood donations in the Village of Skokie are at a ten year low, with just 323 pints donated from May to December, 2009. This is a 43% decrease from the same time period during 2008, and creates the potential for a regional shortage of blood.







When "The Wedding Singer" opens in September it will open at a temporary space at 1010 West Madison for the next fourteen months or more while they search for a new permanent space. "Wedding Singer" is a musical that will run until October 31st. It will have its Chicago premiere to be directed and choreographed by Kevin Bellre.

If you enjoy comedies and sophistication you'll enjoy this comedy directed by Jim Schneider with scenic design by Bob Knuth with a stellar cast of twelve excellent actors. You have until September 5th to see this show.

It had a long run in New York, was made into a major motion picture and eventually a musical called "High Society" that featured the Tony-Academy Award song "True Love," a boat Dexter owned and designed.

Dexter is played by Kevin Anderson, a non-equity professional not to be confused with the Equity actor of the same name who is a Chicagoan. Dexter is the ex-husband of Tracy Lord played by Laura McClain.

Tracy is about to be married to George Kittredge played by Luke Renn who is a high-class snob. When Tracy's philandering father temporarily is missing they ask Uncle Willie played by Peter Esposito to play the father who does turn up to complicate matters.

Two society reporters who are sent to take pictures of the house and wedding are Jhenai Mootz as Liz and Josh Hambrock as Mike. Both are bored with their assignment. Mike and Tracy get drunk and have an innocent midnight swim which causes Kittredge who is prim and proper to have second thoughts.

The handsome Doug Pawlik plays Sandy Lord the older brother who has invited the two reporters to the house for the wedding. You'll be hearing a lot from this actor.

Closing out the cast is Thomas Schutt as Thomas the Butler. His performance will remind you of many actors who played butlers in the movies.

Major Broadway musicals in New York or touring are expensive shows. "Shrek the Musical" has a cast of twenty-six singers, dancers and actors and you won't be disappointed with any performance.

Alan Mingo, Jr., is the cool donkey friend of the ogre and does a knockout job with his performance. Haven Burton is beautiful as Princess Fiona and her singing is beautiful. Todd Buonopane as Lord Farquaad is a stitch and I only hope his knees hold out on matinee days. You have to see the show to see why.

Tax Saving Benefits of a Life Insurance Trust

Most people have heard of a Living Trust, but not many have heard of an "ILIT" or Irrevocable Life Insurance Trust. This type of specialized trust is structured to hold life insurance policies on your life. This article discusses how an ILIT works and the estate tax planning advantages it offers. Learn more about the benefits of this type of trust and whether an ILIT is right for you.

Tax Saving Benefits of a Life Insurance Trust

Many people have Revocable Living Trusts. They allow for the management of assets during their inca-

pacity, avoid the necessity of probate at death, and usually save money in the post-death administration process. However, some people have an additional specialized trust, an Irrevocable Life Insurance Trust or "ILIT."

What's an ILIT? It's a trust that is used to hold any type of life insurance policy on your life, including term, universal, or whole life. In other words, the Trust is the owner and beneficiary of the policy or policies on your life. The trust is irrevocable, which means that it cannot be changed or undone by you after you set it up. Because of the manner in which the ILIT is structured, the life insurance death benefit is not included as part of your estate that is subject to estate tax. Typically your spouse is the Trustee or manager of the Trust. Usually, your spouse and children would be the beneficiaries of the Trust. During your life, the Trustee could use any cash value in the policies for the benefit of the beneficiaries. After you are gone, the ILIT can provide the funds necessary for your family to put their financial lives back together. After both you and your spouse have passed, the Trust can continue to provide for your children as you see fit. If your children are too young, a trusted friend can be Trustee until your children are of a suitable age (chosen by you) to manage the assets themselves. The Trust can even be designed to protect your spouse and children from their creditors.

Is an ILIT right for me? Unless you plan on dying before January 1,2011, there will be a federal estate tax on your entire estate to the extent it exceeds \$1 million. Your estate may also be subject to state estate or inheritance tax. In calculating the value of your estate, the government includes everything you own, no matter where it is or what it is. It includes your house, car, jewelry, stocks and bonds, etc. It even includes the death benefit of any insurance on your life. Even though the life insurance may not have had much value while you were alive, the full death benefit would be included in calculating the value of your estate. For example, if you had a house worth \$400,000, investments worth \$200,000, a car worth \$30,000, and a 401(k) with \$370,000, that would add up to \$1 million. If you died in 2011, you could pass that tax-free. However, if you also had a \$1 million life insurance policy, your estate would have a total value of \$2 million and it would incur estate taxes of \$435,000.

By having your ILIT own any insurance policies on your life, they would not be included in calculating the value of your estate. In other words, your estate would avoid having to pay the \$435,000 in estate taxes outlined in the situation above!

Your ILIT could even own policies on the life of your spouse. However, in that case, your spouse could not be a beneficiary or Trustee of your ILIT. In the alternative, your spouse could have his or her own ILIT with you and your children as the beneficiaries.

Remember, a normal revocable trust does not provide the advantages of an ILIT. Be sure to contact a qualified estate-planning attorney; who focuses his or her practice in estate planning and who can help you decide if an ILIT is the right solution for you and your family.

Social Security Board of Trustees: Long-Range **Financing Outlook Remains Unchanged**

The Social Security Board of Trustees today released its annual report on the financial health of the Social Security Trust Funds and the long-range outlook remains unchanged. The combined assets of the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, and Disability Insurance (OASDI) Trust Funds will be exhausted in 2037, the same as projected last year. The Trustees also project that program costs will exceed tax revenues in 2010 and 2011, be less than tax revenues in 2012 through 2014, and then permanently exceed tax revenues beginning 2015, one year earlier than estimated in last year's report. The worsening of the short-range outlook for the Social Security Trust Funds is due in large part to the recent economic downturn.

n the 2010 Annual Report to Congress, the Trustees announced:

· The projected point at which the combined Trust Funds will be exhausted comes in 2037 – the same as the estimate in last year's report. At that time, there will be sufficient tax revenue coming in to pay about 78 percent of bene-

• The projected point at which tax revenues will fall below program costs comes in 2010. Tax revenues will again exceed program costs in 2012 through 2014 before permanently falling below program costs in 2015 – one year sooner than the estimate in last year's report.

• The projected actuarial deficit over the 75-year long-range period is 1.92 percent of taxable payroll – 0.08 percentage point smaller than in last year's

· Over the 75-year period, the Trust Funds would require additional revenue equivalent to \$5.4 trillion in present value dollars to pay all scheduled bene-

"The impact of the current economic downturn continues to be felt by the Social Security Trust Funds," said Michael J. Astrue, Commissioner of Social Security. "The fact that the costs for the program will likely exceed tax revenue this year is not a cause for panic but it does send a strong message that it's time for us to make the tough choices that we know we need to make. I applaud President Obama for his creation of the Deficit Commission so we can start the national discussion needed to ensure that Social Security remains a foundation of economic security for our children and grandchildren."

Other highlights of the Trustees Report include:

· Income including interest to the combined OASDI Trust Funds amounted to \$807 billion (\$667 billion in net contributions, \$22 billion from taxation of benefits and \$118 billion in interest) in 2009.

· Total expenditures from the combined OASDI Trust Funds amounted to \$686 billion in 2009.

• The assets of the combined OASDI Trust Funds increased by about \$122 billion in 2009 to a total of \$2.5 trillion.

· During 2009, an estimated 156 million people had earnings covered by Social Security and paid payroll taxes.

· Social Security paid benefits of \$675 billion in calendar year 2009. There were about 53 million beneficiaries at the end of the calendar year.

• The cost of \$6.2 billion to administer the program in 2009 was a very low 0.9 percent of total expenditures.

· The combined Trust Fund assets earned interest at an effective annual rate of 4.9 percent in 2009.

The Board of Trustees is comprised of six members. Four serve by virtue of their positions with the federal government: Timothy F. Geithner, Secretary of the Treasury and Managing Trustee; Michael J. Astrue, Commissioner of Social Security; Kathleen Sebelius, Secretary of Health and Human Services; and Hilda L. Solis, Secretary of Labor. The two public trustee positions are currently vacant. President Obama nominated two individuals to serve as public trustees, and the Senate Finance Committee held hearings on July 29 for both trustee nominees. Their confirmations are pending.

BE WARY OF SCAMS

These days, everyone needs to be cautious of scams -- Internet, mail, and even phone scams - which can damage your credit score and pocketbook. Any time someone asks for your personal information, you should be wary. Particularly cruel are swindles that target Social Security beneficiaries.

Recently, Social Security became aware of a scam targeting beneficiaries in the Southern California area. Scammers telephoned beneficiaries to tell them they were due a "stimulus payment." The scammer offered to deposit the payment to each beneficiary's account once the personal and bank account information was provided. The scammer then contacted Social Security by telephone to request the benefits be deposited into a new account—the scammer's account, to steal the payments. In a similar version of this criminal ploy, the scammer calls the beneficiary to "confirm" the beneficiary's personal and financial information.

As a rule of thumb, Social Security will not call you for your personal information such as your Social Security number or banking information. If someone contacts you and asks for this kind of information, do not give it.

You should never provide your Social Security number or other personal information over the telephone unless you initiated the contact, or are confident of the person to whom you are speaking. If in doubt, do not release information without first verifying the validity of the call by contacting the local Social Security office or Social Security's toll-free number at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778).

Another way to protect yourself is to keep your Social Security card and other important documents locked away in a safe place. Do not give personal information to just anyone. Also, check your Social Security earnings record. You can request a Social Security Statement online at www.socialsecurity.gov/statement. When you receive your Statement in the mail, you can verify the accuracy of the reported earnings and request correction if necessary.

If you've fallen victim to fraud or identity theft, be sure to file a report with the local police or the police department where the identity theft took place, and keep a copy of the police report as proof of the crime. Be alert when dealing with people who want your personal information, such as your bank account number, date of birth, and Social Security number. By using a little caution, you can protect yourself from scams.
