Redmoon and the Chicago Park District celebrate the 5th year of spectacles in the parks with the Joyous Outdoor Event (J.O.E). CUB TO GIVE FREE UTILITY-BILL 'CHECK-UPS' IN EVANSTON, SHOW PEOPLE HOW TO CUT THEIR PHONE, ENERGY COSTS

The Citizens Utility Board (CUB) will hold free "Utility Bill Checkups" and give out money-saving light bulbs to show Evanston residents how to save potentially hundreds of dollars on their telephone and energy bills at an event in September.

This free event is part of a campaign kicked off by CUB and Evanston Mayor Elizabeth Tisdahl in August to help residents cut their power bills through CUB Energy Saver, an online service that builds a money-saving plan for homes. Consumers should bring their telephone, natural gas, and electric bills for a free, one-on-one consultation with a CUB expert who will search for ways to lower their utility costs. The event is: 10 a.m. to noon AND 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 7 at The Levy Center, 300 Dodge Ave., Evanston

"As Evanston families wrestle with the economy and CUB fights to protect consumers in more than \$1 billion in legal battles with Illinois utilities, people just want to save money," CUB Executive Director David Kolata said. "There are a lot of ways to trim your utility costs, and CUB knows all about them. You just can't find a free service like this anywhere else."

CUB has been saving consumers hundreds of dollars a year on their phone bills, and it has become one of Illinois' best resources for energy-efficiency programs, including CUB Energy Saver (www.CUBEnergySaver.com), which so far has been showing Illinois families how to cut their utility bills by an average of about \$200 a year. "A New Height of Political Arrogance" Doherty Blasts Senate Appointment

Alderman Brian Doherty, republican candidate for state senate in the 10th District, blasted his democratic opponent John Mulroe's recent appointment to the vacant 10th district senate seat as "a new height in political arrogance."

On August 7th, a handful of democratic committeemen appointed Mulroe to serve out the final months of Sen. James DeLeo's term just 81 days before the November 2nd election. The picture that has developed from this episode is being seen as an attempt by political insiders to manipulate the election process, strikingly familiar to the Blagojevich-Burris fiasco.

Doherty went on to say, "The timing of this appointment is a slap in the face to voters. The senate president and the Chicago ward bosses are desperate to hang on to a senate seat they feel slipping from their hands so they propped up their candidate. I'm also sure my opponent is very pleased to be collecting another government paycheck, making him a quadruple-dipper. This is a new height of political arrogance."

The politics behind this appointment are quite glaring when the details are examined more closely. Here is what the appointment means for taxpayers:

Win or lose, the senate replacement will only work six (6) days in Springfield during veto session. All six days fall after the November 2nd election.

The senate replacement will be paid nearly \$30,000 in salary including a per diem for this brief period of service; roughly \$5,000 per veto session day.

The senate appointment puts Mulroe on four different government payrolls: 1. Cook County (1996 - present)

2. City of Chicago (1994 - present)

3. Chicago Park District (1997 - present)

4. State of Illinois (August 7, 2010 - present)

Though the political spin from the Mulroe camp has already begun in attempt to break away from his back-room deal and patronage jobs, Doherty feels this clearly illustrates the strong differences between the two candidates. "While my opponent tries to spin this, it rings very hollow when you account for no legislative work before the election and the fact that the voters had no say. My campaign is about ending these kinds of insider deals. This style of politics is what put our state into a financial disaster and now my opponent wholeheartedly embraces it. I will bring an independent mindset and straightforward honest dialogue to Springfield," concluded Doherty.

"Godspell" **Provision Theatre Company** 1001 West Roosevelt St, Chicago, IL

"Godspell" is opening Provision Theatre's 2010-2011 season. Stephen Schwartz has done the lyrics and music for the show that has a book by Michael Tebelak and is based on The Gospel According to St. Matthew. The show ran 2,631 performances off-Broadway and 1,128 in London back in 1971.

If audiences are expecting a show such as "Jesus Christ Superstar" or "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," you'll be very disappointed. This is a small scale musical based on the Bible.

I support and like the mission of the Provision Theatre Company but I must admit I was disappointed with this production.

I was very impressed with Justin Berkobien's performance as John the Baptist and also Syler Thomas as Jesus. The ensemble cast I found a little uneven although not all were in that group as some spoke and sang better than others. Tim Gregory is a first rate director but this is not of his better ones.

Tim Gregory, the show's artistic director, has set the show in a country barn or warehouse where the characters seek refuge from a storm outside. In the original back in 1971 a group of students meet in a school playground to tell the story of the last days of Jesus' life in song and story.

My favorite songs in the musical were "Day by Day," "Save the People" and "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord."

Provision is a small equity theatre that does normally beautiful work on a limited budget. Their production of "The Hiding Place" was exceptional as was "Cotton Patch Gospel," "Smoke on the Mountain" and several other shows in the past.

Their next production will be a sequel to "Smoke on the Mountain."

With the exception of Berkobien who is an equity actor who has done shows for Marriott, Noble Fool, Drury Lane Water Tower and Oakbrook, the rest of the cast is professional but non-equity.

Support this wonderful theatre company and don't let one production discourage you. Some will love the production while others like me will have reservations. The show runs two hours and ten minutes with intermission.

Magdeburg, Germany on September 17, 1730. Von Steuben's military career began at an early age, when he entered the Prussian army and served with Distinction in the Seven Year's War. He later became the aid of Frederick the Great of Prussia, who was recognized as the military genius of his time. Von Steuben became expert in the drilling and training of troops. Because of this exceptional ability, Benjamin Franklin and Count St. Germain, French Minister of War persuaded Von Steuben to volunteer his military expertise to the American Revolutionists.

Von Steuben sailed for America and arrived at Portsmouth, NH in 1778 to aid the young nation in its fight for independence. He offered his services to General Washington without rank or pay, arriving at Valley Forge in the late winter of



1730-1794

1777-78. He found the soldiers in deplorable condition, without uniforms, weapons or food. Appointed by Congress to be inspector General of the Army, Von Steuben set about training the unorganized band of ragged soldiers. He infused in them a sense of discipline and converted them into an excellent fighting force, training them to bear arms, march, form columns and to execute maneuvers with precision. He gave confidence to the officers and men, enabling them to continue on to victory at Yorktown.

As "Drill Instructor" of the Continental Army, Von Steuben wrote "Regulations of the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States." Although his Manual has been modified, it still remains in the basic guide for the discipline and drill of the Army.

On June 28, 1778, Von Steuben's training was put to test when the American troops encountered the British Army near Monmouth Courthouse in the town of Freehold, Monmouth County, New Jersey. What early threatened to become a disastrous defeat for the Colonial forces was turned into a glorious victory by General Von Steuben. The retreating troops of General Lee were brought to a halt by Von Steuben and reformed under heavy fire. The retreating men knew how to conduct themselves and wheeled into line with the precision of veterans. What seemed to be a certain defeat turned into a patriot victory and a turning point in the war. This battle was followed by victories in Stony Point, Yorktown and other places.

Steuben was remarkable for the generosity and fineness of his nature, spending his entire income, beyond what was essential to his own simple needs, in purchasing clothing and rations for his men. In recognition of his services Congress granted him an annuity and New York State presented him with a large tract of land. He became an American citizen and lived in New York until his death in 1794. He was laid to rest in a hero's grave on his estate in Steuben County where the inscription on a bronze plaque sums up the contribution that he had made to the new nation "Indispensable to the Achievement of American Independence."

Steuben's military services in America are likewise very adequately indicated in General John McCauley Palmer's biography on Steuben by his most praiseworthy statement:

"...in the course of my researches I was soon convinced that the military services of two men, and two men only, can be regarded as indispensable to achievement of American independence. These two men were Washington and Steuben. When I say that their military services were indispensable, I mean that each of them contributed something essential to final victory, that could not have been contributed by any other man in the American Army."

"Lost German Chicago"

The DANK-Haus in historic Lincoln Square presents "Lost German Chicago" in its newly created museum space. The exhibition features art, artifacts and memorabilia from within Chicago's German American community. The items record what has been lost in the Chicago German community while archiving and preserving that which has been entrusted to DANK. Highlights include: exquisite wood carvings dedicated by the Germania Club by the Oscar Mayer family, relics from the Deutsches Haus at the Columbian Exposition, Hessen Verein standards, items from dozens of restaurants including the original Red Star Inn, Schulien's Math Igler's Casino, the Golden Ox, memories of St. Boniface Church, Deli Meyer, FC Hansa, the Schiller Liedertafel, Schoenhofen Brewery, Lincoln Park Turner Hall and many more.

The exhibition runs through October 2011. Free and open to the public.

Guerin Prep Opens New School Year "Under Construction"

Construction fences will greet the students of Guerin College Preparatory High School when schools open for the 2010-2011 year as various improvements are under way, including the renovation of the school's competition gymnasium in the Holy Cross building on Guerin Prep's 22-acre campus.

The school year begins Aug. 23 with approximately 540 students, including 127 freshmen and 15 transfer students. The Mass of the Holy Spirit starts the day, an all-school picnic will bring the first day to a close.

Also, the school welcomes its first Guerin Prep graduate, Vince Nardiello, to the faculty. Vince, a recent graduate of Dominican University with a B.A. in history, will teach social science. He has been a member of the Guerin Prep football coaching staff since he graduated from Guerin Prep in 2006.

Also on Monday, Guerin Prep will begin to provide its own bus service for students living in the western suburbs. For the coming semester the bus will pick up at the River Grove Metra Station, St. Vincent Ferrer in River Forest and Sacred Heart School in Melrose Park. Each semester the route will be determined by the needs of Guerin Prep families.

"Under Construction"

Following the sale of four acres of property earlier this year, Guerin Prep has sought to implement a long-range plan adopted by its board of directors in 2007. The master plan calls for the enhancement and expansion of the four core components of Guerin Prep's mission- academics, athletics, arts and financial aid, and since the sale Guerin Prep already has acted on two of these areas.

A tuition freeze for the 2010-2011 school year was announced at the time of the sale, thus offering every Guerin Prep family tuition assistance for the coming school year.

The second project was the renovation of the girls' softball field and the surrounding fence and gate areas, completed in time for the spring softball sea-

Since then, the school has also upgraded the football and baseball fields and has installed a safety fence for the football stadium field area. Parking lot repair, resurfacing and restriping is also being completed in time for the start of the school year.

Inside the building, new science lab desk tops and chairs have been installed and new risers have been added to a new chorus room. A students' commons study area is in the final stages of development. In addition, new tables have been ordered for the school cafeteria.

Next on the agenda are major improvements in the Holy Cross building, including refurbishing of the gym, a new fitness center and a new concessions and kitchen area.

Eventually, a new entry way will be created leading into the gymnasium.

"We want to move from being a good school to a great school," explained Principal Tony Tinerella in addressing the faculty and staff about the improvements during faculty meetings this week. "This is a great start."

Search for a New President

Guerin Prep is currently searching for a new president for the school, following the retirement of Terry Malik this June. Malik served as president since March 2008. A search committee formed by the board of directors will begin interviewing candidates for the position Aug. 30.

While the search committee does its work, the Board of Directors has named





Funding is Critical to Estate Planning



Everyone knows that *planning* is part of estate planning. When Ted and Emily met with their attorney, they discussed their family's needs and the legacy they wanted to leave. Ted and Emily and the attorney created an estate plan designed to achieve their goals via a Revocable Living Trust as the way to get there. After the documents were prepared, they set up the appointment to sign or "execute" the Trust and other documents, including the Property Power of Attorney, the Health Care Power of Attorney, and a Pour Over Will. After that, they were done, right?

That's what Ted and Emily thought. But, when Ted died, Emily found out how wrong they were. A Trust only controls the assets tilted into it, otherwise known as "funding the Trust." When Ted passed away, it was discovered that the Trust was still unfunded. This meant some assets were held in joint tenancy and passed to the surviving joint tenant, Emily. While other assets passed by beneficiary designation. Ted had still more assets in his own name. Those assets had to go through *probate*, the public and sometimes difficult process by which title is passed from a person who has died, through intestacy if there is no Will, or, in Ted's case via his Pour Over Will to the Trust.

Funding is the process of transferring title of assets into your Trust. Emily learned that planning is not enough; *funding* is also critical to an estate plan. An unfunded trust is the equivalent of a treasure chest without any gold in it. As part of your estate plan, a good estate planning attorney will instruct you on what and how assets get transferred into your Trust, or may include funding in the fee. Ownership of most assets should be transferred into your Trust. Exceptions are:

Retirement accounts, such as IRAs, 401(k)s, 403(b)s, etc. Doing so would have negative income tax consequences. In some circumstances you may want to change the *beneficiary designation* of these accounts to your Trust.

Custodial accounts, such as UTMA and UGMA accounts.

Life insurance. However, sometimes it is advisable to put this in a special irrevocable Trust in order to reduce estate taxes.

Motor vehicles. Depending on the state, it may be better to leave these outside the Trust.

Checking account. Sometimes people want to leave a small amount in a checking account for day-to-day transactions, especially if they want to protect their privacy and not disclose the existence of the Trust.

Most lenders require you to remove your home from your Trust before refinancing. If this becomes necessary, your estate planning attorney can prepare a deed from your Trust to you as an individual. Sometimes this is necessary if the lender plans to bundle and sell your loan. If you remove the home from the Trust, remember you can and should put it back in the Trust immediately after the loan closes. Failure to do so may unnecessarily add probate expenses or may even disrupt the plan you so carefully put together.

As with most things, it's important to see things through to the finish. In Estate Planning, that means making sure your Trust is properly funded. Planning and funding are both necessary for your estate plan to achieve your goals.
