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

Berrios Unveils Cook County Homeowner Plan Debacle in Evanston Shows True Leadership is Needed

Cook County Assessor candidate Joseph Berrios unveiled a four-point plan for homeowners on his newly launched website www.electjoeberrios.com. The Berrios Plan will generate more money for Cook County, provide homeowners with fair assessments at market value, add new technology to make assessments more accurate, and improve customer service. It will also call for a blue-ribbon committee to reconvene so that it can review an existing ordinance that is causing homeowners undue hardships.

One way Berrios plans to improve the Assessor's office is by working hand-inhand with township assessors. It was reported late Tuesday that in Evanston more than 1,500 building permits weren't reported to Cook County over a three-year period, leaving Evanston officials trying to figure out how much tax revenue was lost as a result.

"This is completely unfair to the rest of the homeowners who have to make up for the remaining share," Berrios said.

The Evanston Township assessor and the city's building department share responsibility for getting the permits to the county, officials said.

"Building permits are the main way the Cook County Assessor's office knows whether it should inspect a property to evaluate whether it has increased in value," Berrios said. The failure to move forward those permits means the property has been undervalued and that other residential property owners are paying more than their fair share. Most of the under-reported permits happened under the watch of former Evanston Township Assessor, and current Republican candidate for Cook County Assessor, Sharon Eckersall.

Eckersall claimed the township's permit department wouldn't turn over permits, but it was her job to make sure that happened, Berrios said.

"Candidate Eckersall can pass the blame around all she wants, but the responsibility ultimately lies at her feet," Berrios said.

The Berrios plan announced on Thursday will also:

Thoroughly examine the 'Claypool 10/25 Ordinance'

It was promised by the current Assessor that this ordinance would bring transparency and simplicity to the property tax system. Instead, it has resulted in an unfair and confusing methodology that has caused undue hardship on homeowners. Berrios will ensure that the ordinance is studied thoroughly by a blue-ribbon panel to assess viability and determine necessary changes. This study will include a "consequences" section so that the Cook County Board of Commissioners understands the potential effect of the ordinance and any revisions.

Use new technology to make land assessments more accurate

Cook County is losing millions upon millions of dollars because some properties are assessed as vacant land, yet there are homes being built on some of these properties. Through the use of a new computerized system, we will be able to review every parcel using aerial photographs. These pictures could be compared to assessment records and used to verify vacant land parcels. As Assessor, Berrios will also improve human communication between my office and township assessors, as well as the City of Chicago, to make sure that building permits are submitted to my office in a timely fashion. This will help ensure that assessments are accurate and filed promptly.

Fairly assess properties at market value

Homeowners are being unfairly hit with tremendous fair market value increases by the current Assessor during the most serious economic decline in decades. Transparency is key to understanding your assessment notice. Berrios will make sure that properties are fairly assessed and that assessment notices are easy to understand.

Improve customer service

This will happen in a variety of manners.

"As a customer, you will be treated with the respect you deserve," Berrios said. "I will make sure that phones are answered promptly, messages are returned, and that the office is open on several Saturdays each year during tax calendar crunch time." This will allow working families to visit the office without having to take time off from their jobs.

Berrios says he will also keep suburban offices open so homeowners don't have to travel downtown.

Finally, Berrios says he will rely on staff more effectively than any previous assessor. Homeowner counselors will be available to help serve you on a one-on-one basis so that you, as a property owner, understand your rights, your benefits, your taxes and your options."

Berrios has been a commissioner on the Board of Review since 1988. Prior to being elected five times to that post, he served three terms as an Illinois state representative. He is chairman of the Cook County Democratic Party and Committeeman of the 31st Ward. Berrios was the first Hispanic elected chairman of the party, a commissioner to the Board of Review and to the Illinois General Assembly.

Sauganash Community Association Responds to Potential Air and Noise Pollution Issues from O'Hare Airport Runway Expansion

Due to concerns about air and noise pollution, the Sauganash Community Association has formed a committee to coordinate a community response to runway expansion at O'Hare Airport.

The O'Hare Modernization Plan includes adding four runways, extending two runways and closing two runways. One new runway is finished (Pratt) and the remainder will be added in 2011 (Montrose), 2012 (Berteau) and 2013 (Granville). One runway has also been extended (Lawrence) and another will be extended in 2012 (Thorndale).

The extension of the Thorndale runway particularly impacts the Sauganash area. When completed, this runway will be the most used runway for late night and early morning landings as frequently as seven days a week, depending on weather conditions. For about 60 percent of the year all landings from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. will fly over Sauganash.

The Association is concerned about the impact increased air traffic will have on both quality of life and property values. Air traffic related issues include sleep deprivation and restrictions on outdoor activities, coupled with prolonged exposure to pollutants from aircraft engine exhaust. Additionally, property values in affected areas would decrease by up to 10 percent and real estate would take longer to sell.

The committee has drafted recommendations for reducing air traffic and abating noise.

Recommendations include:

Reducing the amount of night landings and takeoffs on the east sides of the Thorndale and Granville runways over Sauganash

Vectoring arrival traffic to spread it out and reduce the frequency over a given area.

Increasing use of the west side of the Thorndale runway, which flies primarily over commercial areas.

Opening the closed diagonal runways for landings from the SE at night. Requiring use of noise abatement techniques.

Keeping airfreight traffic off the east sides of the Thorndale and Granville runways.

Stanley Pokrzywa, 89, a resident of Norwood Crossing, 6016 N. Nina Ave. in Chicago and a former member of the 104th Infantry Division (Timberwolves) during World War II, will be the Grand Marshal of the Norwood Park Memorial Day Parade, May 31. Pvt. Pokrzywa fought through northern France, Belgium, Holland, and into Germany in 1943, 1944 and 1945, enduring at one time more than 195 days of continuous combat. He is the recipient of the Combat Infantryman Badge, two Bronze Stars, a Purple Heart, two Good Conduct Medals, and three European service campaign medals with three major battle stars. 





When you have a cast that includes Linda Balgord, Tyler Hanes, Paula Scrofano, James Harms, Adam Pelty, Andy Lupp, Tari Kelly, Laura E. Taylor, Melody Betts, David Lively, Gene Weygandt, and Adrian and Alexander Aguilar, who are all Broadway performers or could and should be, how can a theatre miss.

Under the direction and choreography of Marc Robin who is a gold mine in both categories how can it not be a four-star hit?

The show has a book by Bob Martin and Don McKellar with music and lyrics by Lisa Lambert and Greg Morrison with musical direction by Doug Peck.

The remainder of the cast is Cheryl Avery, Mathew Crowle, Erik Floor and Katie Spelman.

Without a doubt the show brings back the memory of Broadway musicals of years

Ms. Balgord plays the Drowsy Chaperone and while she resides in New York, she is from Wisconsin but has done several shows at the Marriott that include Fanny Brice in "Funny Girl" to successful raves and proves you don't need Streissand's nose to satisfy most audiences. 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Selecting an Estate Planning Attorney – Wisely

When you plan your estate, you are putting together your road map to your legacy. Your estate plan determines who will be entitled to your assets, how they can use them, and the protections which they and the assets you leave them may have from creditors, divorcing spouses, etc. The attorney whom you select to assist you in creating that plan is integral to its success. That is why you need to choose wisely.

When Bill and Mary were planning their estates, they went to an attorney who was a family friend,

had a general practice and dabbled in many areas of the law. Their attorney, Frank, was very nice and even gave them a discount because of their friendship. Frank drafted Wills for them that appeared to work on the surface. Bill wanted one-half of his assets to go to Mary and one-half of his assets to go to his children from his first marriage. His Will seemed to do this. However, when Bill died, it did not work out that way. Bill had \$750,000 in assets at his death. His one-half interest in the house he owned with Mary was worth \$250,000. His one-half interest in the ranch he owned with his brother, Sam, was worth \$300,000. Finally, his IRA was worth \$200,000. Unfortunately, but unbeknownst to Bill and Mary, estate planning does not just entail writing down your wishes in a Will, like Frank did for them. It takes knowledge and experience to create an effective estate.

When Bill died, they discovered that the house was held in joint tenancy, so his \$250,000 interest in the \$500,000 house passed to Mary automatically at his death. It was not controlled by his Will at all. Likewise, the ranch was held in joint tenancy with Sam. Bill's \$300,000 interest in the ranch automatically passed to Sam, even though the Will provided otherwise. Finally, the IRA had a beneficiary designation naming Bill's mother. After Bill's first marriage ended, he had changed the designation to his mother. He forgot to update the designation when he remarried. Frank, though meaning well, did not think to ask about the beneficiary designations because he did not focus in estate planning and did not have the experience to know better.

So, of his \$750,000 in assets, Bill wanted one-half, or \$375,000, to go to his kids from his first marriage and \$375,000 to Mary. Instead, Mary only got \$250,000 and his kids from his first marriage got nothing—even though that's not what his Will provided. An experienced attorney would have recommended that Bill change the house and ranch to tenancy-in-common property and would have made sure the beneficiary designation was updated. That way, Bill would have provided for his family as he had wanted.

Don't make the same mistake that Bill and Mary did. Go to a qualified estate planning attorney who focuses his or her practice in estate planning. Make sure they get continuing legal education to stay updated on the latest developments in the field of estate planning. For example, the American Academy of Estate Planning Attorneys requires its members to earn 36 hours of training in estate planning or elder law annually. Once you select a qualified estate planning attorney, have confidence that your legacy is in good hands.

There's a new queen of baby names. Isabella took the crown from last year's winner, Emma, to claim the top girl baby name of 2009. Jacob continued his remarkable run by holding onto the top boy name for the 11th year in a row over a new number two for boys, Ethan. New to the top 10 this year for boys are Jayden and Noah, and for girls, Mia.

Baby Jacob and Baby Isabella issued a joint statement thanking Americans for "their support and good taste." They also urged fans to "check out www.socialsecurity.gov to learn about a new 'twist' in the law that may help an older relative or neighbor get an average of almost \$4,000 of extra help with Medicare prescription drug costs."

A favorite feature of Social Security's baby names website is the "Change in Name Popularity" page. This year's winner for the biggest jump is Maliyah, which undoubtedly is related to the popularity of the First Family. Malia (the spelling used by the First Daughter), also is one of the top 10 fastest risers among girls names. Isla, the name of popular actress Isla Fisher (and wife of Sacha Baron Cohen – aka Borat, which thankfully has yet to make the list) was the second fastest riser among girls. On the boy's side, Cullen had the biggest increase, likely attributable to the popular character Edward Cullen in the "Twilight" novels and movies. King came in as the number three top mover for boys, but more on Elvis later.

The girl's name Marely, which interestingly had the third largest increase last year, had the biggest drop this year from number 334 to 851. Mylee had the second biggest drop; Miley (as in Cyrus) also dropped in popularity. In the wake of controversies surrounding Lindsay Lohan, Lindsay dropped from number 381 to 524. Brett, Jonas and Alvin are among the boy's names with the largest decreases. With Brett, Social Security wonders if Americans are ready to retire the name (sorry Vikings' fans, we mean Jets' fans, um Packers' fans). And despite the soaring popularity of singing trios – whether human brothers or the chipmunk variety – fewer people apparently are willing to name their sons Jonas or Alvin.

With 69 baby Baracks born in 2009, Barack continues to move up the list to number 1,993 from 2,424 in 2008, and 12,535 in 2007, but still lags well behind First Dog Bo at 782.

Many patterns of recent years continued. Religious names continue to be very popular, including the girl names Heaven at number 275 and Nevaeh (Heaven spelled backwards) at 34. Messiah was number 663 for boys. An extraordinary 3.7 percent of the Top 1000 boy names rhymed with the word "maiden" and names associated with cities, states, or countries were popular, particularly for girls.

And for all of you Elvis fans out there, here's the annual update from Social Security Commissioner Michael J. Astrue: Elvis slipped from number 713 in 2008 to 858 in 2009. Unconfirmed reports indicate he was "all shook up" by his 2009 rank, but pleased that Presley is number 268 for girls, and that King and Memphis landed at 462 and 605 for boys.

As the federal government's leading expert on baby names, Commissioner Astrue commented "I have no idea what any of this means, but nonetheless urge you to go to our website www.socialsecurity.gov to have a little fun with baby names and to see if you can help an older relative or friend qualify for \$4,000 of extra help with Medicare prescription drug costs."

The Social Security website offers lists of baby names for each year since 1880. Social Security started compiling baby name lists in 1997.

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
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
