



## Fall Beautiful Fall - Time To Prepare For Winter

The chill of the first cool nights of fall serves as a warning that the growing season is coming to an end. By all means, enjoy your flowers for as long as the weather permits. We can even stubbornly try to protect and cover animals from the onset of cooler temperatures. However, hard frosts will eventually take their toll. At this time I strongly urge gardeners to clean up all dead flowers and vegetable plants. This is the first step towards having a great garden next year.

Then I would suggest adding a two to three inch layer of an organic material to the soil. If you have a compost pile, this would be a good time to work in this material.

Another option is to work the leaves from your yard into the soil. Adding these materials will have several benefits. First, the organic matter will have a chance to further decompose during the long, wet fall and winter. As the organic material naturally breaks down, this will add nutrients to the soil for next years plants.

Second, really digging and working up the soil in the fall aerates and loosens it and prevents the ground from becoming too hard. This is very important because a loose soil allows plants to develop healthy roots systems.


None of this work is very glamourous, however conditioning and preparing soil is one of the most important keys to having success as a gardener. Next spring your flower and vegetable plants will benefit from growing in a nutrient rich, loose soil.

# Mayor Emanuel To Introduce Amnesty Program That Will Waive Penalties And Fees For Outstanding Debt Along With Payment Plan Options For Motorists

#### Payment Plan Options And Amnesty Program Component Of The City's Scofflaw Enforcement Strategy

Mayor Emanuel announced today that he will introduce an amnesty program for the penalties and interest associated with outstanding debt to City Council this September. As part of the 2016 budget process, the Mayor wants to provide individuals who owe debt to the City with an opportunity to pay what they owe without the added penalties for delinquent payment. He will also introduce a plan to allow motorists to enter into payment plan options sooner and online.

"In preparing the 2016 budget, I've heard from many residents and aldermen seeking an amnesty program for outstanding debt along with simplified payment plan options for motorists," said Mayor Emanuel. "The amnesty plan is part and parcel of the City's stronger scofflaw enforcement strategy that ensures those who owe debt to the City are paying their fair share."

Under the proposed amnesty program, any individual or business that owes the City money for parking tickets and other violations and taxes from before 2012 will be granted amnesty for the penalties and interest previous tickets or violations have accrued. Individuals will still pay the ticket or fine value, but will receive amnesty from the penalties and interests associated with failure to pay.

Amnesty will only apply to those individuals and businesses who pay their eligible outstanding debt between November 1, 2015 and December 15, 2015. Any of this debt paid after December 15, 2015 will again be subject to the additional penalties and interest associated with this delinquent debt.

"Everyone is aware the City is facing some financial challenges this year that we must solve. The simplified payment plan options and amnesty program are tools to help ensure the City can recoup outstanding debt while providing much needed relief for individuals and business." Alderman Jason Ervin. 28th Ward

"I've heard from many residents and business owners telling me about the burdens they are experiencing related to fines, penalties, and business related taxes. The want to pay, but with the penalties and interest, it makes it very difficult. This amnesty program will provide businesses and the public an opportunity to get fines and penalties removed from eligible debts owed and pay the baseline penalties. The Mayor and City Council want to help in these difficult times as we have to make very difficult decisions. The amnesty program will provide that sought after relief." Alderman Willie Cochran, 20th Ward

Along with providing an amnesty program for the penalties and interests associated with eligible debt, Mayor Emanuel will propose an ordinance amendment to allow all vehicle owners to enter into the City's payment plan prior to the fines and fees doubling on parking tickets. Currently, payment plans are only available to vehicle owners once the fines associated with the violation are doubled.

Additionally, the City will simplify payment plan options for motorists by adding the option to sign up for payment plans online.

"Providing online payment plans to all motorists are fair and easy steps for the City to take to help motorists pay their tickets on time and quickly. Chicagoans have asked for simplified payment plans, and I'm eager to see them utilize these options." Alderman Ariel Reboyras, 30th Ward

The payment plan options and amnesty program are components of the Mayor's overall enforcement effort to ensure individuals and businesses pay their delinquent debt owed to the City. As part of scofflaw enforcement, the City recently announced plans to further crack down on business with unpaid and delinquent tickets, including pursuing a process for business license revocation for any business with significant amounts of outstanding debt.

## Governor Appoints New Commander Of Illinois Air National Guard

### Brig. Gen. Ronald E. Paul Will Serve As The Full-Time Illinois Guard Assistant Adjutant General – Air

Paul graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1988, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in International Affairs. He served in the U.S. Air Force in various operational units including in Europe, Tactical Air Command/Air Combat Command, Air Force Materiel Command, and Pacific

Air Forces. He transitioned into the Illinois Air National Guard's 183rd Fighter Wing in 2001.

"Brigadier General Paul is the right officer to lead the Illinois Air National Guard as it continues to go from strong to stronger. He has proven his ability to lead and provide the strategic direction for the Illinois Air National Guard as it continuously prepares for both our state and federal missions. I am grateful to have Ron serve alongside me," Hayes said.

Paul has deployed in support of Operations Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, Provide Comfort, and Deny Flight. He was also the senior U.S. Military officer in charge of the initial F-16 aircraft maintenance training in Poland.

Maj. Gen. Cobetto, who has served admirably as the Assistant Adjutant General-Air since December 2011, will retire this fall after more than 30 years of service.

"For three decades, Major General Cobetto has dedicated his life to the Airmen of Illinois Air National Guard and to serving the citizens of Illinois," said Rauner. "On behalf of all Illinoisans, we extend our deepest appreciation to Major General Cobetto for his service and we wish him abundant success in his future endeavors."

# Students Prepare for Success in STEM Fields

Science, Technology, Engineering & Math

Resurrection encourages students to explore opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM). In recent years, growth in STEM jobs is approximately three times as fast as non-STEM job growth and wages are approximately 26% higher for workers in STEM fields, according to the organization Girlstart, which works to empower girls in STEM fields.

While women fill close to 50% of all jobs in the US economy, they hold less than 25% of STEM jobs and are underrepresented in STEM undergraduate degrees, particularly engineering. At Resurrection, girls are joining the Technology Club, taking the Principles of Engineering course, learning coding and robotics, studying advanced math and science and exploring future areas of study in STEM fields.

According to the study Generation STEM conducted by the Girl Scout Research Institute, "seventy-four percent of high school girls across the country are interested in the fields and subjects of STEM." They also found that "girls are interested in the process of learning, asking questions, and problem solving." At Resurrection, the all-girl environment encourages students to step outside of gender stereotypes and have greater confidence and positive attitudes toward science and technology. Researchers have found that girls from single-gender schools pursue careers in math, science, and technology four times more often than do girls from co-ed schools. Resurrection alumna Gina Partipilo '14 stated, "It was great that I was encouraged to pursue advanced and AP level math and science classes at Resurrection." She is currently studying Chemical Biomolecular Engineering at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

2010 Resurrection alumnae Jessica Choate is a broadcast meteorologist at WCIA 3 in Champaign, Illinois and a researcher in the Atmospheric Sciences Graduate Department at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. She teaches undergraduate lab classes in atmospheric sciences at the University, as well as researches nocturnal elevated mesoscale convective systems.

"Resurrection College Prep High School not only provided me with the education to successfully pursue my dreams as a meteorologist, but it also gave me the confidence to excel in a male-dominated field," said Choate.

During the summer of 2015, Choate traveled throughout the Great Plains driving and operating large radar trucks (DOWs) to chase storms, as well as flying in government aircraft (NOAA P-3) near storms to collect aerosol data. At the news station, she prepares forecasts for central Illinois and presents her forecasts in online videos, radio and for WCIA 3 news broadcasts throughout the day.

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## What To Do After A Loved One Dies

The death of someone near and dear can be a stressful time. Your life is disrupted by the loss and your grief. Often, it can be a confusing time, both emotionally and logistically.

Who has what responsibilities? Here's a quick look at different roles involved at someone's death:

Executor—The Executor or Executrix, also known as the Personal Representative, has the duty of safeguarding and collecting and managing assets which the decedent owned at death, in accordance with the Will. He or she will make distributions as directed in the Will. The Executor also has responsibility for filing the estate tax return, if necessary.

Trustee—The Trustee is the person in charge of managing and distributing any assets held under a Trust. The decedent may have had one or more trusts that he or she established during lifetime. The Trustee must follow the Trust document, which provides the terms by which the assets are to be held and distributed. Often, the Trustee must work with the Executor for a coordination of efforts regarding assets.

Agent under Property Power of Attorney—The person who was acting under the Property Power of Attorney, called the Agent, no longer has authority

once the Principal has died.

Agent under Health Care Power of Attorney—The Agent may have authority to allow for organ donation or cremation.

Guardian—A guardian is a person nominated in the Will to care for the decedent's minor children. While it is up to the court to decide who will get custody of the children, the decedent's choice of guardian will be given due weight.

The first step, of course, is for the family to make any funeral arrangements. Immediately after death, the Executor or Trustee will need to make sure any assets are safe. For example, if the decedent lived alone, it would be wise to change the locks on the door to prevent someone with an errant key from gaining access.

Next, the Executor / Trustee should consult with an attorney who focuses on estate planning and administration. The attorney will help guide you through the next steps to be taken, which will include gathering the assets and following the terms of the documents. This step need not be done immediately, but an appointment should be made within two weeks after the death occurs. In the interim, it is important that you do not re-title any assets of the decedent and that you make no distributions to any beneficiary, including yourself.

It reminded me that I had done a Public Safety Announcement on this subject in 2005,when I was Recording Secretary of the 19th Police District Advisory Committee, working with then Sgt. William Looney, who has since then been promoted to Capt.. and I saved a copy of it. It bears repeating to help prevent further mishaps.

A lot of people think that children only fall from highrises or in poor neighborhoods. Not so! Most children fall from two or three-story buildings, and these accidents happen in poor, middle-class as well as in wealthy neighbor-

hoods. This summer, almost every week, an average of three Chicago-area kids will be hospitalized after falling from a window. YOU CAN HELP SAVE A CHILD'S LIFE AND/OR PREVENT SERIOUS INJURIES by following these simple steps:

- Never open windows more than four inches;
- Open windows from the top down, if possible;Move furniture away from windows;
- Install window stops or releasable childsafety window guards. And remember: Screens keep bugs out, not kids in!

# Second-Annual Fair Property Tax Appeal Workshop "Sells Out" Again

On Wednesday, September 9, the Fair Allocation in Runways (FAiR) Coalition will host its second annual Property Tax Appeal Workshop from 7:00-9:00 p.m. at Beyenka Hall at St. Monica Parish in Chicago, 5115 N. Mont Clare Ave. Like last year, this year's workshop quickly filled to capacity with people eager to appeal based on the impact of planes since the October 2013 flight pattern changes at O'Hare were made without any real community input. "We have almost double the space this year and all 200 spots are taken," said Colleen Mulcrone, FAiR Leadership Team member. "People are completely fed up with the impact the noise, pollution and sheer number of planes is having on their homes and property values. Add to that the double-digit increase so many of us saw in our assessments without any reduction in the number of flights over our heads, and you have a lot of people demanding bettr from the city and the county. They deserve better." At the workshop, FAiR will distribute a Citizen's Property Tax Appeal Support Package. This Package will aid taxpayers in filing tax appeals by providing necessary documentation to substantiate their appeal. In addition, FAiR will make a PDF version of the packet available after the workshop on its website at www.fairchicago.org.

The workshop will walk residents through filling out the appropriate forms for an appeal based on plane noise, pollution and frequency as well as provide data from Chicago Department of Aviation reports and the FAiR-member created chicagonoisecomplaint.com as supporting evidence. The event will also feature FAiR members who successfully won tax appeals in 2014 based solely on increased plane noise and traffic discussing their experience with the process. Everyone who attends will receive a copy of FAiR's 2015 Property Tax Appeal Support Packet which can be submitted as evidence with the tax appeal. The 9/9 event focuses on Cook County; DuPage County has a different process and FAiR will be looking at what resources will best support residents of DuPage County for an appeal based on plane noise. The deadline for Jefferson Township Appeals is Monday, 9/14.

## RTA Presents Proposed 2016 Community Planning Program of Projects

The Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) today presented the eight proposed recipients of planning assistance or funding through the 2016 Community Planning Program, which includes five regional municipalities, one county division of transportation and CTA and Pace. The 2016 program is scheduled to allocate \$880,000 in federal, RTA and local funds to successful projects. This is the 18th annual Community Planning Project award year; over this time, the regional transit oversight agency has allocated nearly \$20 million in federal, RTA and local funds for 180 projects throughout the region through this program.

Applicants whose projects are being recommended for inclusion in the program include: Village of Olympia Fields; Village of Calumet Park; City of Des Plaines; City of Chicago; Village of Morton Grove; DuPage County Division of Transportation; CTA and Pace.

In May, the RTA invited local governments


in its six-county region and the Service Boards - CTA, Metra and Pace - to apply for funding and planning assistance for projects that benefit local communities and the regional transit system.

Eligible projects must be located on the regional transit system and be either implementation focused, such as zoning code updates or improving access to transit, or planning focused, such as a transit-oriented development (TOD) plan. Projects must also advance the implementation of the GO TO 2040 Plan and Regional Transit Strategic Plan.

Public comments on the proposed recipient projects can be submitted on the RTA website until October 2. The final program of projects will be presented at the October meeting of the RTA Board of Directors. Successful applicants are expected to be notified in November.



## Mayor Emanuel Unveils Annexes To Relieve Overcrowding At Two Elementary Schools

#### New Annexes To Alleviate Overcrowding And Expand Classroom Space In Chicago Public Schools

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today unveiled new annexes designed to address overcrowding at two CPS schools, Wildwood World Magnet School and Abraham Lincoln Elementary School. Following input from the communities, these annexes have been designed to both expand and update existing space in order maximize teaching and learning for students beginning this school year.

"We have a responsibility to our students to provide them with the resources of a 21st century education," said Mayor Emanuel. "After many years of our school leaders and communities finding creative solutions to overcrowding, these investments expand school facilities so that students will not have to choose between a library or a lunchroom, and will therefore be better able to concentrate on their studies."

The \$14.4 million annex project at Wildwood includes a 34,000 square foot, three-story addition to the school, including: 12 classrooms; a computer lab; art room; library; administrative suite and lunchroom. The \$20 million addition to Lincoln includes 19 new classrooms, modernized cafeteria and kitchen, a rooftop play lot, ADA accommodations and other improvements to existing facilities. Both projects were announced in 2014, and completed by the Public Building Commission (PBC) this summer

"Despite our challenging financial situation, it is crucial for the District to continue investing in resources that will allow our students to reach their potential," said CPS CEO Forrest Claypool. "The annexes at Lincoln and Wildwood Elementary Schools have created much-needed additional space, allowing our teachers to innovate while providing students with the space and resources they need to be successful."

Mayor Emanuel was joined by CPS leadership, elected officials at both Lincoln Elementary School in Lincoln Park and Wildwood in the Forest Glen community for ribbon cuttings ceremonies to unveil these projects to their respective communities. These schools were previously operating at more than 130 percent or more above the recommended operating capacity. These improvements will allow for a better learning environment for our children to focus and excel in the classroom.

"The hard work and care put into this wonderful new addition to Wildwood are obvious, and I ex-

tend my thanks and congratulations to the staff, parents and volunteers for their investment in our city's children," said State Senator Ira I. Silverstein, D-Chicago, 8th District. "Their energies will result in student enthusiasm and learning, and I am proud to recognize these achievements for Wildwood's future."

Under the leadership of Mayor Emanuel, CPS has made critical investments to expand high-quality school options and to eliminate overcrowding for students across the city. Mayor Emanuel and CPS have also completed a \$15.7 million addition at Oriole Park Elementary School, which installed 15 additional classrooms, a lunchroom, library, computer lab, science lab, and an administrative suite. Oriole Park, located in the Norwood Park community, has also received renovations to transform an existing administrative suite into a classroom and the existing lunchroom into an art room for immediate use this school year.

"A vital part of a quality education is making sure our students are equipped with the means and tools to succeed. Reducing overcrowding at Wildwood will help ensure these students are given the individual attention and focus they need to live up to their full potential," said State Rep. John C. D'Amico, D-Chicago. "I'm privileged to have been able to see this development from start to finish. We need to continue to support our students, so we enable them to learn and grow in and out of the classroom to achieve their dreams."

Built by Public Building Commission (PBC) on behalf of Chicago Public Schools (CPS), these projects incorporate the Commission's commitment to economic sustainability, and the commitment to employing residents of the community for these projects. Contract provisions on PBC projects require that at least 50 percent of the labor force be City of Chicago residents and the participation of both minority and women-owned businesses.

Since taking office in 2011, Mayor Emanuel and CPS have addressed overcrowding at 36 local schools, including Addams, Bell, Columbia Explorers, Dever, Dirksen, Durkin Park, Edison Park, Gallistel, Hale, Lincoln, Little Village, Lock, Onahan, Pasteur, Peck, South Loop, Smyser and Stevenson. Mayor Emanuel and CPS will again address overcrowding with projects in the works at Canty, Edwards and Jamieson).

# Village Cooking Corner

#### **OKTOBERFEST IN A POT**

Germans can't think of an Oktoberfest without Sauerkraut – the two just go hand-in-hand. Also please note that Germans spell Oktober with a "k" and not a "c," but spelling it either way is OK in the good old USA. (I like to say, "We are German-Americans). What I love about this recipe is that it is a one-pot meal and that it tastes better the next day, as it is the case with all dishes made with Sauerkraut. German grammar also demands that all nouns are spelled with a capital letter.

While I learned to cook Sauerkraut from my Mom, this recipe comes from our good Austrian friend Loretta, who served it to members of the Austrian Mixed Chorus after one of our rehearsals. It was a special treat for us. So here's what you will need: A glass or bag of Sauerkraut, some Spaetzle or a pasta of your choice like Kluski, Macaroni, Rotini or Spaghetti, smoked Bratwurst, Polish Kielbasa or your favorite Wieners, some bacon, a good-size onion and caraway seeds and a couple of bay leaves if you like their taste. If the Sauerkraut is very sour, rinse it with cold water and drain it.

Add the seasonings and bring to a boil; lower heat to a simmer and cook for about half an hour. In the meantime, cut up some bacon into small pieces and fry it. Add the chopped onion and cook and stir ituntil it is slightly browned. If you don't want to use the bacon, use a bit of olive oil instead. Cook the pasta in a separate pot until it is "al dente." Cut up the sausage of your choice into bite-size pieces and add it to the Sauerkraut along with the pasta. Stir it all together and heat it up (it should not be watery), then taste it. It might need some salt, or try a sprinkle of Vegeta, which is an all-purpose vegetable seasoning imported from Croatia which a lot of our people have become fond of using. Go easy with the stuff as you can always add more. For a "gourmet touch" add a nice fruity German wine if liquid is needed and simmer gently. Taste for doneness and flavoring. If you are a bacon lover, you can fry up several strips of bacon, drain them on paper towels and cut them up into small pieces to top off your dish. Serve it with rye, crispy white bread or pretzel rolls. Refrigerate leftovers or freeze a portion of it to enjoy on another day when you're too busy to cook. Loretta suggests that you use equal parts of Sauerkraut and pasta prepared "just the way you like it." Guten Appetit!

Oh, one final thought: You might wonder why they call it Oktoberfest if it's usually held in September. Years ago I was told that because it's usually held outdoors, if they would wait until Oktober, it would be too cold. You might also have seen advertisements for "Oktoberfest in August." Seems like people just cannot get enough of these festivities.
