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

Health Department Alert - Rabies Vaccination Recommended for Pets

On July 9, 2013, the Village of Skokie Health Department received confirmation from the Illinois State Public Health Laboratory regarding a bat found in Skokie which tested positive for rabies.

The Skokie Health Department suggests that if you were exposed to or bitten by a bat to contact your doctor. All residents should keep their dogs, cats and ferrets on a leash when out of their homes. If your animal does not have a current rabies vaccination, please have the pet immediately inoculated with the rabies vaccine.

You are advised not to handle any bats, skunks or other wild animals. If any bats or skunks are found down or dead on your property or roadway, please call the Skokie Animal Control at 847/933-8484.

EIGHTH ANNUAL CHICAGO SISTER CITIES INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL COMES TO DALEY PLAZA AUGUST 5–9

Festival Honors the Heritage of Chicago's 28 Sister Cities



Celebrating the cultural vibrancy of Chicago's robust relationships with cities around the world, Chicago Sister Cities International (CSCI) presents the eighth annual Chicago Sister Cities International Festival. A rich variety of authentic ethnic food, merchandise and entertainment will enliven the downtown Loop with the tastes, sights and sounds of Chicago's diverse neighborhoods born from cities throughout the global community.

The Chicago Sister Cities International Festival takes place Monday through Friday, August 5–9, 2013 from 10:30 a.m.–5:30 p.m. on Richard J. Daley Plaza. Live musical and dance performances take place from 12 noon–1 p.m. each day. The festival is free and open to the public.

Since its inception in 1960, CSCI has been building the cultural, social and economic connections between Chicago and the world that continue to enrich the city's ethnic roots. By branching out to a present total of 28 sister cities around the world since its first partnership with Warsaw, Poland, CSCI represents Chicago as a global city to the world with the largest program of its kind in the United States. Each year since 2006, the Chicago Sister Cities International Festival has created an international village filled with food, music, dance and merchants in an annual recognition of these accomplishments.

On Wednesday, August 7, the festival will celebrate "Chicago Consular Corps Day" in honor of the 80 countries that make up Chicago's Consular Corps and to commemorate the all-inclusive international relationships that CSCI creates around the world.


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Presence Our Lady of the Resurrection Medical Center Offers August Health Programs

Diabetes screenings will be given Thursday, August 1, from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. No fasting is required for this blood draw that will test for HbA1C, glycohemoglobin. The screening is for anyone who wants to know their blood sugar average during the past two-to-three months. Test results will be mailed. There is a \$10 fee, payable at the screening. Advance registration is required by calling 877.737.INFO.

The Diabetes Support Group will meet Tuesday, August 6, from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. This free support group aims to provide mutual support and education. For more information, call 773.794.8329.

Free blood pressure screenings will be offered Wednesday, August 7, from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m., in the hospital's main lobby. A health care professional will perform screenings and answer questions about blood pressure readings. Registration is not required.

A free Healthy Aging Program will be held Friday, August 9, from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. This program for individuals aged 55 and older consists of social time, health topics and guest lectures. Meltem Randle, R.N., critical care nurse educator, will speak about sepsis, a potentially life-threatening complication of an infection. Registration is not required.

The Arthritis Support Group will meet Thursday, August 22, from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., in the seventh floor Centennial Conference Center. These free sessions aim to provide mutual support and education. Registration is not required.

NORWOOD CROSSING TO HOST LIFE LINE HEALTH SCREENINGS ON JULY 31

Being proactive about health care is a personal responsibility that each of us owes to ourselves to help assure our continued well-being. For the second consecutive year, Norwood Crossing is hosting a health event. Life Line Screening, a leading provider of community-based preventive health screenings, will offer their affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings from 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m., on July 31, in the Norwegian Heritage Room at Norwood Crossing, 6016-20 N. Nina Ave. in Chicago.

Five screenings will be offered that scan for potential problems related to: blocked arteries which is a leading cause of stroke; abdominal aortic aneurysms which can lead to a ruptured aorta; hardening of the arteries in the legs which is a strong predictor of heart disease; atrial fibrillation or irregular heart beat which is closely tied to stroke risk; and a bone density screening, for men and women, used to assess the risk of osteoporosis.

Register for a Wellness package which includes four vascular tests and osteoporosis screening at a cost of \$159 (\$149 with the Life Line Screening discount). All five screenings take 60 - 90 minutes to complete. Life Line Screening tests over one million people a year, and has saved about 60,000 lives during that period.

LOCAL AUTHOR COMPLETES THIRD **BOOK—"ROADSIDE HISTORY OF ILLINOIS"**

Stan Banash, a.k.a. "Tex," a resident of Chicago's Norwood Park community, recently completed his third book, Roadside History of Illinois (Mountain Press, 2013). The book covers the history of the state from the Ice Age to the present, offering vacationers a series of short trips mostly along old U.S. highways, state highways and county roads that provide a glimpse into numerous historic sites as well as the history of nearly 250 significant cities, towns and villages in seven geographical regions. Among the book's features are more than 125 images, regional maps, an Illinois Chronology, a list of Illinois Facts, the lyrics to the seldom heard State Song, "Illinois," and a list of Illinois Originals, in addition to a Bibliography and Index. The book also includes a Special Introduction by the late Dee Brown, author of the internationally acclaimed book, Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee, and was praised in back cover blurbs by former U.S. Sen. Adlai E. Stevenson III and Illinois State Archives Deputy Director Wayne C. Temple. As the Preface notes, Roadside History of Illinois is "designed to help both visitors and residents discover and savor the historical, cultural, and natural opulence of this great state."

Banash, who was raised in suburban Niles and graduated from Niles Township High School in Skokie, served in the Air Force and then obtained his Bachelor of Philosophy degree in political science from Northwestern University and a Master of Arts degree in Urban Studies from Roosevelt University. His two earlier books were: Best of Dee Brown's West (Clear Light, 1998) and Dee Brown's Civil War Anthology (Clear Light, 1998). He also has reviewed numerous books for Wild West magazine, The Tombstone Epitaph, Western Historical Quarterly, Journal of the West, and Roundup magazine. Active in his local community, Banash held several elected offices with the Edison Park Chamber of Commerce, including serving as its president for six years from 1988-1994. Later he chaired Chicago's first 41st Ward Zoning Advisory Board, established by former Ald. Brian Doherty, from 1993-2011, and served as sheriff of the Chicago Corral—The Westerners for five years from 1996-2001. He also is a member of the Western Writers of America, Western History Association, and Westerners International. He currently serves as part-time director of public relations for Norwood Crossing, a long-term care retirement community in Chicago's Norwood Park.

In 1987, he wrote the speech that Chicago Cubs Billy Williams delivered at his induction ceremony into the Baseball Hall of Fame, in Cooperstown, New York.

Banash can easily be spotted in his local community dressed daily in western clothes, carrying the spirit of the Old West wherever he goes. He and his wife, Laura, live in a rustic, California redwood style home, with a yard surrounded by a split rail fence and landscaped with native plants from the western plains. Combined, the couple have seven adult children and 12 grandchildren.

A MID-SUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM: MADE IN CHICAGO: WORLD CLASS JAZZ RETURNS TO JAY PRITZKER PAVILION IN MILLENNIUM PARK

Six-Concert Series, Thursdays, July 25-Aug. 29 Includes Opening Night of 35th Annual Chicago Jazz Festival

It's always a joyous occasion when jazz music takes center stage at the Jay Pritzker Pavilion in Millennium Park with the return of the Made in Chicago: World Class Jazz series on Thursday, July 25. Opening night will include a tribute to the late Helen C. Doria, a celebration of the woman responsible for creating the series in 2005.

Doria was Millennium Park's first executive director and instrumental in setting the tone for what has become one of the nation's most fully-utilized and culturally rich public spaces. She was dedicated to ensuring that the Park be inclusive, reaching across cultural, geographic and economic boundaries – a people's park.

Doria was also an advocate for Chicago's jazz community. Working with the Jazz Institute of Chicago and the Chicago Park District to establish the JazzCity neighborhood concert series – as well as creating this jazz series for Millennium Park and through her work with Chicago Jazz Partnership, she supported the creativity and careers of countless jazz artists, including the leader of the opening night concert, Dee Alexander.

Alexander, a vibrant member of Chicago's jazz community and a vocalist and composer has performed at Millennium Park in many contexts. Her 2007 Made in Chicago tribute to Nina Simone and Dinah Washington was cancelled due to severe weather, but rescheduled because Helen Doria believed strongly that the project should be heard. The concert became an important launching pad for Alexander's career, which has taken her around the world with many projects including this year's series opener: Funkin' with Acoustic Soul: Tribute to James Brown and Jimi Hendrix.

All concerts begin at 6:30 p.m. with a short set by young, aspiring musicians from Chicago-area high schools as part of the Jazz Institute of Chicago's Jazz Links Student Ensembles and Gallery 37 After School Matters Jazz Ensemble.

The Made in Chicago: World Class Jazz finale on August 29 will also open the Chicago Jazz Festival in style, celebrating the music of Jack DeJohnette as well as his 71st birthday with his aptly named "Special Legends Edition Chicago".

Made in Chicago: World Class Jazz is presented by the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events and programmed in partnership with the Jazz Institute of Chicago. Grant support provided by The Boeing Company, The Chicago Community Trust and The Joyce Foundation.

Millennium Park is located on Michigan Avenue, bordered by Randolph St. to the north, Columbus Dr. to the east and Monroe St. to the south. Convenient parking is located in the Millennium Park Garage (entrance on Columbus at Monroe or Randolph), Millennium Lakeside and Grant Park North.

The Marriott Theatre is currently doing Joe DiPietro and Jimmy Robert's sketch musical of "I Love You, You're Perfect Now Change" and has a cast of four very talented performers – Kelly Anne Clark, Alex Goodrich, Johanna McKenzie Miller and Bernie Yvon. The musical is under the direction of Matt Raftery.

After a spell-binding production of "South Pacific," which closed recently I was a bit disappointed with this sketch revue that deals with dating, romance, marriage and other topics.

My problem was not with the direction or the cast but the songs like "Tear Jerk," or "Single Man Draught," as they were nothing memorable.

Goodrich is a class act and a gifted comedian. I always kid him as he stands over 6 feet tall and I'm 5'2". Yvon is always a standout as is Kelly Anne Clark and Johanna McKenzie Miller.

Village Cooking Corner

TWO BEAN CASSEROLE

1 lb fresh green beans

1 (15.5 oz can) Eden's Butter Beans- no salt added ½ of a Vidalia Sweet Onion, chopped

½ of an (8 oz) no salt added Hunt's Tomato Sauce 1 can of Hunt's Stewed Tomatoes

Salt and Pepper to taste 1/4 cup Parsley - chopped 2 Tbsp. Dried Oregano 1 Garlic Clove, chopped 2 Tbsp. Olive Oil

Wash and cut the fresh green beans in half. Chop onion and garlic and saute until soft not browned. Add the green beans and the stewed tomatoes and tomato sauce and simmer for about 20 minutes. Place in a 10 x 7 casserole baking dish. Rinse the butter beans and mix with green beans in the casserole dish. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, parsley and oregano and add the Olive Oil. Place in a preheated 350F oven for approximately 1-1/2 hours. Add small amount of water if needed.

For variety, instead of the butter beans you may use 2 small zucchini that have been cut in rounds and potatoes cut in small pieces and follow the same procedure of seasoning and baking as above. This is a great side dish for chicken, steak or fish regardless of the season.

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When Harry Met Sally: A Real Lesson in Preventing Family Discord

The American Declaration of Independence begins "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal..." While this may hold true for people and their rights, all Trusts are definitely not created equal.

Seemingly small differences in wording can make a big difference in reality. For example, one Trust may have a "No Contest" clause while another Trust might not. A No Contest clause provides that if someone unsuccessfully contests the validity of the Trust, negative consequences ensue. Typically, the clause will provide that the unsuccessful contestant is disinherited or treated as though he or she died before the person who

created the Trust. Such a clause can effectively convince people that it is not worth challenging your Trust.

Let's look at what happened when Harry met Sally. They hit it off immediately and soon decided to marry - it was a second marriage for both of them. They each had children from their prior marriages, Sally had an 11-year-old son, Billy, and Harry had two daughters, Susan 13 years old and Michelle 15 years old. When they married, Sally entered the relationship with several million dollars and Harry entered it with more modest means. When Sally prepared her estate plan, a Living Trust, she wanted to share her wealth equally among all three children and left them equal parts of her estate. After a loving, caring relationship that lasted many decades, Harry passed away. When Sally passed away several years later, Billy now in his 50s, contested her Trust. He did not want to share his mother's wealth with his step-sisters. Billy's contest ended up costing Sally's estate hundreds of thousands of dollars in attorney fees, court costs and legal expert fees. When the dust finally settled, all the children ended up sharing a much-reduced pie - a very unfortunate result. Worse, the emotional scars from the litigation never healed and the children have no relationship as the result of Billy's actions.

Unfortunately, Sally could have avoided the battle that tore her and Harry's family apart. If she had included a No Contest clause in her Trust, Billy probably would not have contested his mother's estate plan and risk his share of her millions.

Consider using a No Contest clause, especially in the following situations:

- Substantial wealth
- Remarriage, especially later in life
- Unequal distribution among your children
- Unusual distributions

While No Contest clauses are not valid in every state, they can be a great way to reduce the risk that your wishes will be challenged. Be sure to seek the advice of an attorney who focuses his or her practice in estate planning when preparing your estate plan. How Does a "Heat Wave" Affect Your Plants?

Once again this year our Chicago weather has changed from the cool of Spring to the heat of Summer almost overnight. This sudden and rapid change from cold to hot impacts the growth of your flowering annuals in ways of which you may not be aware. The average gardener often does not understand the role that tempera-URHAUSEN ture plays in the performance of his/her plants. What we will focus on today is the impact which temperature has on blooming.

For all plants there is an ideal temperature range consisting of a night time low and a day time high which is optimal for producing blooms and flowers. Having a heat wave the night time low is usually not cool enough, and the day time high is often exceeded. When this occurs, most plants tend to slow down, just like people do, when it is hot. Some plants will either go out of bloom completely or decrease the number of blooms significantly. This is the survival mechanism of the plant kicking in. The plant will shut down blooming to concentrate on just staying alive. Dianthus and snapdragons are some example of plants that often times go out of bloom when the real heat hits. This does not mean that the plant is dead. Continue to water, and when the weather cools the blooms and flowers will magically reappear. In other plants the number of blooms will not decrease, however the size of the flowers will shrink. New Guinea Impatiens and nonstop Begonias will often follow this pattern. Again, keep up the watering and continue feeding the plants every two weeks, and all will be fine when the weather cools down. During a heat wave all a gardener can really do is just wait for the cooler more moderate weather to return.

- When walking or jogging with your pet, try to avoid asphalt as your pet's paw pads can burn. Instead, stick to concrete, dirt or grass, as those surfaces are less hot.
- Never leave your pet in a car unattended, even with the air conditioning running. If the air conditioning fails, your pet could easily over-heat in as little as a few minutes.
- Don't give sports drinks or electrolyte supplements to pets. Dogs cool off by panting and they do not sweat like people. Supplements like sports drinks can actually harm animals and make pets sick.

Most importantly, be familiar with your pet and know when they aren't acting right. Lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea and dark red gums are all signs of heat related distress. If your pet is panting uncontrollably or collapses, take the animal to your veterinarian or nearest emergency veterinary hospital immediately.

CHICAGO DEPARTMENT OF STREETS AND SANITATION CREWS INOCULATE 17,500 ASH TREES IN FIRST TEN WEEKS OF TREATMENT SEASON

City completes 50 percent of its goal to treat 35,000 trees in 2013

The Chicago Department of Streets and Sanitation today announced crews have successfully treated the first 17,500 ash trees as part of the City's aggressive forestry plan to combat the emerald ash borer insect.

"The emerald ash borer threatens nearly 20 percent of Chicago's parkway trees which enhance the beauty of our city and offer countless environmental benefits to our communities," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "Protecting these valuable assets not only supports a healthy environment, but can prevent the costly removal and replacement of thousands of trees."

As outlined in Mayor Emanuel's 2013 budget, the City is investing approximately \$2 million in an emerald ash borer program, compared to \$110,000 in 2012. The average cost to inoculate a tree is \$46, compared with \$1,000 to remove and replace a tree.

For the first time ever, the City has a dedicated workforce tasked with inoculating ash trees. The City has hired and trained 26 general laborers to implement the first year of the multi-year plan to combat the insect which threatens approximately 85,000 of the City's parkway trees. In 2013, 35,000 ash trees will be treated, compared to the 18,000 total parkway trees that have been inoculated in Chicago since the treatment became available in 2009.

Emerald ash borer inoculation crews are targeting areas of known infestation to slow the progression of the insect and manage tree mortality. Forestry crews began treating in early May and will continue through September, when treatment is believed to be most effective.

The ash trees are being inoculated with Emamectin Benzoate which has been proven to kill 99 percent of emerald ash borer insects within a tree. Emamectin Benzoate protects the tree for up to three years.

The emerald ash borer is an exotic beetle native to Asia that was discovered in southeastern Michigan in 2002. The beetle has killed more than 30 million ash trees in southeastern Michigan alone, with millions more dying in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and other infested states.

CHICAGO'S DIVVY BIKE SHARE SYSTEM OFF TO A FAST START



25,000 Bike Trips Taken, 88,000 Miles Ridden in First Two Weeks of Operation;

Installation of New Stations to Begin Next Week, Ramping Up to 300 this Summer

In just the first two weeks of the Divvy bike share system in operation, Chicagoans and visitors to the city have taken more than 25,000 trips and have collectively ridden an estimated 88,000 miles, the equivalent of pedaling around the earth three and a half times.

Divvy staff will begin to install new stations next week, ramping up from the current 70 stations and 700 bikes to 300 stations and 3,000 bikes by the end of this summer. By next spring, Divvy will be in 400 neighborhood locations with 4,000 bikes.

"Chicagoans and our visitors have embraced Divvy as a new transportation option, and we are now ready to expand the system so more people can

safely and efficiently travel around the city's neighborhoods," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "In just two weeks, Divvy has made a significant impact on the way people move around Chicago."

Each Divvy station has a touchscreen kiosk, station map, and a

docking system that releases bikes using a Member key or ride code. Customers can purchase \$75 Annual Memberships or \$7 24-Hour Passes, which allow riders unlimited trips in that period. The first 30 minutes of every trip are included in the cost of the Membership or Pass, and incremental fees apply to trips that exceed 30 minutes.


Annual Members use a personal key used to quickly unlock bikes from any station. More than 2,500 Chicagoans have already signed up for Divvy Annual Memberships at DivvyBikes.com.

Of the more than 25,000 bike trips made from June 28th through July 11th, more than 6,000 were made by annual members, and 19,000 were from customers who purchased 24-Hour Passes. With 3,000 trips made on Saturday, July 6th, each Divvy bike averaged more than four trips that day.

The system is dubbed "Divvy" to reflect the nature of bike share, where members "divide and share" the use of the bikes. The bicycles' distinctive "Chicago Blue" paint is the same color as the stripes on the Chicago city flag, and will provide a high level of visibility on the street.
