For example, a church in Grand Crossing purchased 250 tickets to distribute free of charge to its congregation.

Circus in the Parks is part of the Chicago Park District's Night Out in the Parks initiative, which features more than 750 citywide cultural activities this summer, making more than 230 local parks safe havens and hubs of activity. The 2013 Circus in the Parks tour is presented by People's Gas.





AUTOMATED SPEED ENFORCEMENT CAMERAS **BEGIN WARNING PERIOD MONDAY**

Children's Safety Zone Program Designed to Reduce Speeding and Improve Safety As part of the Children's Safety Zone Program to increase safety, reduce speeding and fund critical safety programs, the City will begin its automated speed enforcement (ASE) program on Monday, August 26th as the first speed cameras installed near Gompers Park in the North Side Mayfair neighborhood will be activated and begin to produce warnings to speeding drivers.

"The Children's Safety Zone Program protects children and other pedestrians by reminding motorists to slow down and obey speed laws - particularly in school and park zones," said Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) Commissioner Gabe Klein.

With extensive signage on the street, a robust system to give drivers only warning tickets during the first 30-days systems are operating, in addition to one free warning the first time a motorist is eligible to receive an actual violation, CDOT expects to reduce the amount of speeding substantially, even beyond what other cities that use automated enforcement have experienced.

The cameras near Gompers Park (at 4124 W. Foster Ave. and 5119 N. Pulaski Rd.) were the first to be installed, tested and readied for operation. The City also installed numerous new speed limit and photo enforcement signs to inform drivers as they approach the ASE cameras.

The Winter of 1815-16 in Wuerttemberg was the coldest since records were kept. Harvesting was made impossible. People were starving and the little existing flour was stretched with sawdust to feed the hungry. was at its worst. His brother-in-law,

Czar Nikolaus of Russia, helped relieve the biggest misery by delivering grain to the starving people in his

relative's region. Then in 1817, when the first harvest wagon was brought in, King Wilhelm and his wife Katharina, had the glorious idea to sponsor a harvest festival. This would take place annually on the King's birthday of September 28th in the area of Cannstatter Wasen, by the river Neckar.

Starting as an agricultural festival lasting up to 5 days, in 1972 this Autumnal Fair, as it is better described, has expanded to a celebration of 16 days and includes carnival games and rides including the tallest Ferris Wheel in the world. Food, beer and wine tents are also an important site at the Volksfest since as many as 3 to 4 million people attend each year. In the center of the Festival grounds stands the symbol of "Thanksgiving", a 25 meter high pillar decked in fruit with a huge basket of more fruit on the top.

This tradition, second in size some believe only to the Oktoberfest in Munich, has not changed and will continue for years to come. Beginning 1 week before the Munich Festival, the 167th Cannstatter Wasen, or as referred to by locals, "Wasen" will take place from September 27th to October 13th in the extensive Wasen are of the Stuttgart City District of Bad Cannstatt.

Practice is every Wednesday at 7:15 at the Catholic Kolping Center on Elston Avenue in Chicago. We always welcome new singers, German-speaking or not.


Our annual concert is the only fundraiser and is solely for the purpose of defraying the cost of operating the chorus: Director's fees, rent, sheet music, etc

Deep within the isolated, undeveloped mountains of Westmoreland lies a village with a history and people unique to Jamaica. 93rd German-American Fest

General Friedrich Wilhelm Von Steuben German-American Hero

General Friedrich Wilhelm Ludolf Gerhard Augustin Von Steuben was born in Magdeburg, Germany on September 17, 1730. Von Steuben's military career began at an early age, when he entered the Prussian army and served with Distinction in the Seven Year's War. He later became the aid of Frederick the Great of Prussia, who was recognized as the military genius of his time. Von Steuben became expert in the drilling and training of troops. Because of this exceptional ability, Benjamin Franklin and Count St. Germain, French Minister of War persuaded Von Steuben to volunteer his military expertise to the American Revolutionists.

Von Steuben sailed for America and arrived at Portsmouth, NH in 1778 to aid the young nation in its fight for independence. He offered his services to

General Washington without rank or pay, arriving at Valley Forge in the late winter of 1777-78. He found the soldiers in deplorable condition, without uniforms, weapons or food. Appointed by Congress to be inspector General of the Army, Von Steuben set about training the unorganized band of ragged soldiers. He infused in them a sense of discipline and converted them into an excellent fighting force, training them to bear arms, march, form columns and to execute maneuvers with precision. He gave confidence to the officers and men, enabling them to continue on to victory at Yorktown.

As "Drill Instructor" of the Continental Army, Von Steuben wrote "Regulations of the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States." Although his Manual has been modified, it still remains in the basic guide for the discipline and drill of the Army.

On June 28, 1778, Von Steuben's training was put to test when the American troops encountered the British Army near Monmouth Courthouse in the town of Freehold, Monmouth County, New Jersey. What early threatened to become a disastrous defeat for the Colonial forces was turned into a glorious victory by General Von Steuben. The retreating troops of General Lee were brought to a halt by Von Steuben and reformed under heavy fire. The retreating men knew how to conduct themselves and wheeled into line with the precision of veterans. What seemed to be a certain defeat turned into a patriot victory and a turning point in the war. This battle was followed by victories in Stony Point, Yorktown and other places.

What Is Probate and Why Should You Care?

To paraphrase a popular book title, you may have learned everything you needed to know in kindergarten, but they probably never told you about probate.

Probate is one of those terms we generally don't become familiar with until the death of a loved one or until we consult an estate planning attorney. Simply put, though, probate (derived from Latin for "prove the will") describes a lengthy, public and often painful process in which your assets or those of a loved one which took a lifetime to accumulate can be slowly gnawed away through bureaucratic fees and other costs.

The wealthy and famous are not immune from the ravages of probate. The estate of W.C. Fields, for example,

(whose tombstone reads "On the whole, I'd rather be in Philadelphia") shrunk by 37 percent from the time his will was being administered to the time his assets were distributed. It would have been enough to drive the poor man to drink.

Fields is not alone, however. Marilyn Monroe's estate shrunk 55 percent, John D. Rockefeller's shrunk 64 percent, and even Dean Witter, who founded a financial planning firm, had his estate reduced by 25 percent. "The King," however, is Elvis Presley, whose estate shrunk by a whopping 73 percent. Heartbreak Hotel!

"Probate can be very expensive," said Robert Armstrong, president of the American Academy of Estate Planning Attorneys, based in San Diego. "As one legal scholar said, 'The cost of probate expands to consume the money available.' Some states have instituted informal probate procedures in response to the public's criticism and it had greatly reduced the time and expense of probate. However, in most cases the better choice is to avoid probate altogether."

Doesn't having a will avoid probate? "Unfortunately, a will guarantees probate," said Armstrong. "All property that is controlled by your will must go through the probate court. Once your estate enters the probate process, it's trapped in the system until the judge releases it."

Fortunately, there is an alternative. It's called a living trust.

Briefly, a living trust transfers the title of all major assets (stocks, bonds, real estate, etc.) from your name to the name of the trust. You then name yourself as the trustee and beneficiary; you "trust yourself."

The benefit of a living trust is that you have total control over the distribution of your assets. At death, a successor trustee who you name controls your property completely according to your wishes, minimizing the government's participation in the distribution of your estate.

For millions of "baby boomers" born between 1946 and 1964, effective estate planning is especially important. They may be entering a time when they want to make certain that their wealth is properly preserved and nurtured for their children. At the same time, as part of the so-called 'sandwich generation,' they may be called upon to help in the care or estate planning for elderly parents.

With so much at stake, this is no place for an amateur.
