


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ARMED FORCES DAY

Norwood Pk. Historical Society Hosts "Chicago from the Sky: A Region Transformed"

The presentation "Chicago from the Sky: A Region Transformed" will be held at the Norwood Park Historical Society on May 22 at 7 p.m. All are welcome to attend for free.

The Norwood Park Historical Society will welcome Lawrence Okrent, author of The Chicago from the Sky: A Region Transformed on May 22 at 7 p.m. This presentation—held at Chicago's oldest home, the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House—is free and open to the public. The event will take place in the Historical Society's main event room at 5624 N. Newark Ave., Chicago.

During the most recent 25 years of its history, Chicago has undergone unprecedented change—Millennium Park, Navy Pier, the Museum Campus, airport expansion—and a surprising list of public and private development projects too numerous to recount. A pictorial, annotated record of this astonishing story is presented in Chicago From the Sky: A Region Transformed, by the noted photographer and urban historian, Lawrence Okrent. In the course of his 43-year career as an urban planning and zoning consultant, Okrent has had direct professional involvement in many of the projects documented in his book, offering a personal perspective on the extraordinary achievements of this remarkable period. Now in its second printing, Chicago From the Sky: A Region Transformed is a must-have

for every Chicago-themed library.

Lawrence Okrent is a Chicago-based planning and zoning consultant. He is an active participant in the local real estate and development community since 1970. Okrent is the president of Okrent Associates, the firm he established in 1979, which specializes in land planning and zoning.

Since he had enrolled as a graduate student at Northwestern University in 1966, he is an Illinois resident. Okrent has created a portfolio of more than 25,000 aerial photographs of Chicago and the surrounding region.

The Norwood Park Historical Society, a not-for-profit organization, owns and is headquartered in the Noble-Seymour-Crippen House, the oldest surviving house in Chicago (1833). The Society works with the community to preserve its rich history and architectural integrity and to make the dreams and experiences of our predecessors come to life. Visits are available on Saturdays, from noon to 4 p.m., or by appointment.

Evanston Purchases New Boat to Enhance Lakefront Aquatic Programs

The Evanston City Council approved the purchase of a 17' utility boat by the city's Recreation Division to enhance some of its lakefront summertime aquatic programs. The boat, a Boston Whaler, includes a trailer and cost \$31,340. The Recreation Division currently has two other power boats that will continue to be used for lakefront aquatic programs.

By adding a third boat, more people will be able to participate in the aquatic programs each session. Tubing and water skiing are the most popular aquatic activities. With an additional boat to rotate into service, the usage of any one boat will decrease, which will decrease the amount of maintenance downtime for each boat and lessen the impact of downtime on the program.

"As our programs and camps become more and more popular, we must be flexible to accommodate that increased interest. The Youth Aquatics Camp is one of the most exciting and popular camps and currently has as a significant waiting list," said Doug Gaynor, Director of the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department. "Water skiing, tubing, fishing, canoeing and swimming are just a few of the activities that the campers can experience. We are excited and pleased that the City Council has approved this new boat, as it will enable us to include many more youth from the waiting list into these camp sessions. In addition, the many teens and adults who participate in Aquatics Camp programs also will benefit from this new acquisition."

Thanks to the addition of the Boston Whaler, a new tubing program will be offered and the adult, teen and parent/child aquatic camps will be able to expand, thereby adding to the department's revenue and offerings of new creative programming. Staff projects that the expansion of the aquatic programs will serve approximately 80 additional participants.

You may also establish guidelines for the use of the inheritance and protect it from things like divorce, creditors, remarriage, and unwise spending of your heirs.

Once these measures are put in place, you will be able to relax and enjoy the lights of Paris, the beaches of Hawaii, or even the oasis of the Sahara the way they were meant to be enjoyed: worry-free!

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Newspapers and other media have editorialized and commented on the movie "42," which I recently saw. The movie depicts Jackie Robinson and the amount of venom and hatred that he had to endure while "breaking the color barrier" as a ballplayer in the major leagues. Unfortunately, the movie leaves audiences with the misconception that Branch Rickey was solely responsible for Jackie Robinson entering major league baseball. This is untrue, and the story, which is seldom told, needs to be aired at this time. I heard it directly from Albert B. "Happy" Chandler, commissioner of baseball from 1945-1950, and previously a U.S. senator and governor of Kentucky, who made it happen. This is how it was explained to me.

Branch Rickey wanted to bring up the very talented Jackie Robinson to the major leagues and spoke to Chandler about it. At that time, there were 16 major league teams (eight in the American League and eight in the National League). The owners voted on Rickey's proposal to bring Jackie Robinson up, and the outcome was fifteen owners opposed the move, while Rickey was the only one to vote in favor of it. With this lopsided vote, the only one that could override that vote was the commissioner himself. Chandler met with Rickey in what Chandler called "the cabin" a large cabin-like structure behind his home in Versailles, Kentucky. At their meeting, Chandler sat behind his desk and Rickey sat facing Chandler but alongside the desk and to Chandler's left. They discussed Robinson's talent. Chandler told Rickey that he (Chandler) could not face his Maker if he did not give a ballplayer with the talent and skill as demonstrated by Jackie Robinson a chance in the major leagues. If Rickey would support Chandler in this decision, he would overrule the other 15 owners and allow Robinson to "break the color barrier" and become the best professional ballplayer that he could be. Robinson deserved the chance, according to Chandler. The decision was made by Chandler to override the owners of other teams, Rickey supported him, Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers, and history was made, forever changing the racial composition of baseball teams.

I can attest to this because, in 1984, I visited with Commissioner Chandler at his home in Versailles, Kentucky. We toured the main house where we discussed baseball, and then he took me out the back door to a cabin-like structure (it seemed as big as the house we had just left) where he directed me to one end of the main floor living room. In the corner was a desk and a chair alongside. He asked me to sit in the chair alongside the desk, and he sat in the chair behind the desk. He then told me that I was sitting where Branch Rickey sat, and he was sitting where he sat when he made the decision to override the baseball owners and have Rickey bring Jackie Robinson into the major leagues. He then pointed out other details about the decision as noted in the preceding paragraph. That is how it happened. Had Chandler not made the decision at that time, Jackie Robinson would not have made it to the major leagues, at least not then. While Robinson deserves credit for tolerating totally unacceptable abuse and behavior from fans and many players, Rickey deserves credit for standing by his man and Chandler deserves credit for making it all happen.

In 1987, I had the opportunity to write the Baseball Hall of Fame induction speech for former Chicago Cubs baseball player Billy Williams. It was done with Williams' oversight and input, as well. I knew the story of Chandler, Rickey and Robinson, but many didn't—not even Billy. If some did, they rarely, if ever, talked about the role that Commissioner Chandler played in it. Since Williams' induction year was the 40th anniversary of Robinson "breaking the color barrier," I decided to weave the story into the speech. It was delivered in Cooperstown and when Billy told the story, it was the first time, according to Chandler, that the story was brought into the open. Chandler was very grateful to Billy for telling the real story, and I'm sure the crowd got some added insight into how Robinson's entry really happened.

While the information in the movie cannot be changed, it is my hope that this letter will help set the record straight as to how this event really transpired.

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

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
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
