New Electricity Supplier Sends Conflicting Letters Regarding Changeover

Verde Energy USA ("Verde"), the City of Evanston's new electricity supplier, mailed letters to residents and small businesses on Thursday, May 30 with instructions for optingin or -out of the program. Despite what any letter may have said, Evanston residents and small businesses who are current Constellation customers will be switched to Verde automatically and do not need to opt into or sign up for the service.

Unfortunately, some of those customers received two letters. The first letter explained that they would be switched to Verde unless they decided to opt out by June 20. The second letter was supposed to mailed only to customers not currently enrolled in the city's aggregation program and provided instructions about opting into the service.

Verde has told the City of Evanston that it will follow up with those customers who received duplicate mailings by sending a letter of explanation and apology. Evanston residents and small business owners currently enrolled in the city's aggregation program do not need to take any action to continue in the program.

If they have further questions, people may call the City of Evanston's 311 service (847-448-4311). Customers who are currently part of the city's aggregation program may opt out by June 20, 2013; new customers can opt-in at any time.

NATIONAL VETERANS ART MUSEUM TO PARTICIPATE IN BLUE STAR MUSEUMS

Tenth Batch of Library Baby Falcons Banded by Scientists

On May 30 at the Evanston Public Library, scientists from Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History, the Shedd Aquarium and the Brookfield Zoo banded four baby peregrine falcons; three boys and one girl. They are the tenth batch of baby falcons, which are raptors (birds of prey), to be born at the library. More than a 100 residents, bird watchers and elementary school students were in the audience to view this spectacular event. The scientists also took blood samples for DNA tracking purposes along with feather samples. When they were finished, the fledglings were successfully returned to their nest. When the scrape (falcon's nest) was cleaned out, it was learned that the babies had been dining on pigeons, redwing blackbirds and blue jays.

How to Fly the United States Flag

(From literature by the VFW National Veterans and Military Services)

- 1. The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- 2. The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.
- 3. When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.
- 4. When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to theeast in a north/south street.
- 5. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.
- 6. The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.
- 7. The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day then raised to the top of the staff.
- 8. Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.

9. The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using an all-weather flag.

10. The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

#### **Cultural Grants Program Update**

As part of the 2012 Chicago Cultural Plan process, DCASE heard from thousands of people who provided input about arts and culture in the city of Chicago. Some key feedback centered around the need for easier grant application processes, as well as increased funding for artists and unrestricted operating funds for arts and culture non-profit organizations. In response, this past March, DCASE launched a streamlined, entirely electronic application process and a restructured Cultural Grants Program including the Individual Artists Program and the CityArts Program for non-profit organizations. With nearly 700 applications submitted before the April deadline, the response was hugely successful. Through an optional post-application survey, applicants provided overwhelmingly positive feedback about the changes. Seventy-five percent of applicants rated the new electronic application process favorably with a score of 8 or higher (10 being the highest score).

We thank everyone for their input and look forward to streamlining the process even further. It is our goal to continue to improve the program in 2014 and beyond to ensure our programs best align with the needs of Chicago's arts and culture sector.

## RESURRECTION HONOR SOCIETY INDUCTIONS FOCUS ON THE THEME OF "SERVICE"

### Mitchell Museum Announces Native American Crafts for Kids During Summer Break

The Mitchell Museum of the American Indian in Evanston will offer special activities for youngsters June 11-14 during the first week of summer break for students in Evanston/Skokie School District 65.

During the museum's "School's Out Family Fun Week," kids can engage in do-it-yourself craft projects making simple versions of traditional Native American items including Southwest woven rugs, Northwest Coast masks, Plains shields, and Lakota star quilts. The crafts are recommended for children ages 5 and older. Participants must be accompanied by an adult.

Native American stories will be read each afternoon at 2 p.m. in the museum's teaching lodge.

The "school's out" activities are included with the price of museum admission. Regular museum hours will be in effect.

#### **Kids Craft Morning Programs**

The museum will also offer its "Kids Craft Morning" programs on Saturdays and Sundays in June, July, and August.

Mitchell staffers and volunteers lead the informal, one-hour sessions where children learn to construct simple versions of traditional Native American objects using everyday craft materials.

Kids will make corn husk dolls out of corn husks and twine; porcupine quill boxes out of colored toothpicks and cardboard; woven baskets of yarn applied to drinking cups; Northwest Coast button blankets of plastic buttons glued to felt; Northwest Coast rattles of dry corn kernels sandwiched between paper plates; bolo ties of nylon cord, cardboard, and colored mosaic tiles; beaded key chains of hemp cord, beads, and metal key rings; beaded bracelets and headbands of cord and beads made on a cardboard loom; Plains ledger drawings sketched on columnar accounting paper; Seminole patchwork of fabric pieces glued onto cloth; God's eyes of colored yarn and craft sticks; and a Cherokee syllabary, a booklet using written symbols to represent syllables of the Cherokee language.

The museum also makes available coloring projects and other simple craft activities on request at the workshops.

Offered year-round, the museum's Kids Craft workshops are designed to introduce children to Native cultures of the U.S. and Canada, which are the focus of the Mitchell Museum's collections and exhibits.

Workshop participants have the opportunity to view authentic examples of Native crafts from the Mitchell's collection and illustrations of Native designs as models for their projects.

Kids Craft Morning activities are recommended for children ages 5 and up, but there is no minimum age requirement. Participants must be accompanied by an adult. No pre-registration is necessary.

Admission to Kids Craft Morning workshops is included with museum admission, which is \$5 for adults, \$3 for children (ages 1- 17), students (with ID), teachers (with ID), and seniors (age 65+). Admission is free for Mitchell Museum members and tribal members. Museum admission is also free for activeduty military personnel and their families through September 1 in conjunction with the national Blue Star Museums program.

Miles Harvey is a Chicago author, playwright and journalist, best known for his bestselling book, The Island of Lost Maps, which recounted the story of Gilbert Bland, who stole many old and precious maps from various libraries across America; as well as Painter in a Savage Land: The Strange Saga of the First European Artist in North America. His play, How Long Will I Cry?, the harrowing account of a Chicago neighborhood, was recently performed throughout Chicago by actors from the Steppenwolf Theatre for Young Adults, as part of the Now Is The Time Anti-violence Campaign. Harvey has also written a number of short stories for The Michigan Quarterly Review, The Sun, Nimrod, and other publications.

Jennifer Brier, Ph.D., holds joint appointments in the Program in Gender and Women's Studies and the History Department at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Her research and teaching largely focuses on exploring the historical intersections of gender, race, and sexuality. #### Mitchell Museum to Offer Free Admission To Military Families May 28–September 1

The independent nonprofit Mitchell Museum of the American Indian, 3001 Central St., Evanston, will offer free admission to active-duty members of the U.S. military and their immediate families from May 28 to September 1 as part of the national Blue Star Museums summer program.

The Mitchell is the only Evanston institution enrolled in the program and one of just five in Chicago's northern suburbs, according to online data from the National Endowment for the Arts, one of the program's organizers,

The Mitchell is among more than 1,800 fine arts, science, history, and children's museums and nature centers across the country participating in this summer's program.

The NEA describes the Blue Star Museums program as "a collaboration between the arts and military communities." In addition to the NEA, an independent federal agency that funds arts programs, organizers include Blue Star Families, a nonprofit organization that supports and advocates for military families, and the Defense Department.

The Blue Star Museums program, which operates from Memorial Day through Labor Day, provides free admission for active-duty members, with military ID, and five immediate family members. The program includes active-duty reservists and active-duty members of the National Guard.

Mitchell Museum exhibits on view during the 2013 Blue Star Museums program are "The War of 1812: Fighting for Their Homeland," through August 25; "Another View of American Indian Fine Art," through September 1; "New Treasures of Our Collection," through September 8, and the ongoing "Did You Know They're Native?," a photo gallery of noteworthy Native Americans from different walks of life, with a new edition opening July 27.
