



Evanston to Host Latex Paint Drop-off Event for its Residents July 6th

The City of Evanston will offer a one day latex paint drop-off event for Evanston residents only on Wednesday, July 6th from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. Residents will be allowed to drop-off latex paint at the city's Service Center visitor's parking lot, located across the street from 2020 Asbury.

The city will accept only latex paint. The paint can must have the original label identifying it as latex and be in a usable state. The goal of the latex paint drop-off is to collect, remix and give away the remixed latex paint at the city's inaugural Recycling Fair to be held at the Morton Civic Center on July 23, 2011 from 9 a.m. to noon.

Latex paints contain various amounts of toxic materials. If improperly discarded toxic materials are water soluble, that only means they could pollute ground water and the environment more quickly. If residents have any questions regarding this latex paint drop-off event, they can call 3-1-1.

Evanston 2011 Dutch Elm Disease Control Program

Approval of contract in the amount of \$697,305.00 from Nels Johnson Tree Experts, Inc. (NJTE) located at 912 Pitner Avenue, Evanston, Illinois 60202 for the 2011 Dutch Elm Disease Control Program.

Funding Source:

Funding for this contract will come from the General Fund (3535.62496) in the amount of



\$216,400 and Reserve funds from previous years (100.41332) in the amount of \$513,216. This funding will also be used to purchase fungicide and equipment for the additional 250 public elms scheduled for injection by Forestry staff this year. Any remaining balance after all eligible public elm trees have been injected will be transferred back to the reserve fund for future year funding of the program.

Summary:

Work on this project includes providing a preventative treatment for Dutch Elm Disease (DED) in approximately 2,290 parkway and other publicly owned elm trees through the root flare injection of Arbotect 20-S at the three-year rate. This program is a continuation of the City Council's expanded DED control methods initiated in September of 2004. The elm trees to be injected under this contract are the same Signature (30" or larger in diameter) and Significant (all elms on major, collector and distributor streets) elm that were initially injected in 2005 and 2008, as well as all remaining public elms that measure ten inches in diameter or larger. NJTE has agreed to extend their "per-inch" bid price to Evanston property owners who wish to have their private elms injected in 2011. Bids to Perform the injections were opened and publicly read on May 17, 2011.

Evanston National Winner of U.S. Conference of Mayors' Climate Protection Award

Evanston, IL Mayor Elizabeth Tisdahl and Houston, TX Mayor Annise Parker have been selected as the nation's top winners in the 2011 Mayors' Climate Protection Awards, an initiative sponsored by The U.S. Conference of Mayors and Walmart. The annual awards program in its fifth year recognizes mayors for innovative practices in their cities that increase energy efficiency and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. An independent panel of judges selected the winners from a pool of 130 applicants.

"It is an honor to be recognized for our Evanston Climate Action Plan, where our community leaders and the public identified more than 200 strategies to guide the city as we move forward in reducing our carbon emissions," said Evanston Mayor Elizabeth Tisdahl.

City Vehicle Sticker Deadline Is Here: Stickers Expire June 30, **Enforcement Begins July 16**

The deadline for purchasing and displaying the 2011 - 2012 city vehicle stickers is quickly approaching. Current stickers expire on June 30, with a two week grace period to purchase and display the new sticker extending to July 15. Failure to purchase and display the new vehicle city sticker by July 16 could result in a \$120 ticket and a purchasing late fee.

"I want residents to avoid late fees and the possibility of getting a ticket for not purchasing a city sticker. We have hundreds of locations where stickers can be purchased," said Clerk Mendoza. "The fastest, easiest way to buy a city sticker is online. Orders placed before July 4 will be processed and mailed in time to receive and display the sticker before the July 15 deadline."

Vehicle sticker and residential parking permit prices remain unchanged from last year. The cost of a passenger vehicle sticker is \$75 and larger passenger vehicle stickers are \$120. Senior citizens, age 65 and older, are eligible to receive one vehicle sticker for \$30. Annual residential zone parking is \$25 and residential zone daily guest passes are \$8 for 15 passes.

Stickers can be bought online at www.chicityclerk.com by clicking on the Buy/Renew Your Vehicle Sticker Online icon. Orders are being processed in record time and any order placed by July 4 should be received before the July 15 display deadline.

To purchase a sticker in person, residents must bring their driver's license or renewal form and know their vehicle license plate number. There are more than 400 city sticker sale locations in the city, including currency exchanges, Dominick's grocery stores, City Clerk and Department of Revenue offices. In addition, Aldermen are hosting vehicle sticker sales in each ward and motorists can go to any of these sales locations. Names Published of 69,000 Property **Owners Who Owe \$234 Million**

The names of more than 69,000 property owners who owe about \$234 million in delinquent taxes from last year are being published in community newspapers in advance of the Annual Tax Sale which begins July 19, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

Owners have through July 13 to pay the delinquencies and avoid having their unpaid taxes go to the Tax Sale. Payments are made by certified check, cashier's check or money order, and cash (only in person). No personal, company or business checks are accepted. Payments can be made:

Electronically at the Treasurer's website, cookcountytreasurer.com. At more than 400 Chase Bank locations.

At the Treasurer's Office, 118 N. Clark St., Suite 112, Chicago, 60602, in person or by mail.

The Annual Tax Sale, an auction of unpaid taxes from Tax Year 2009 (payable in 2010), runs from July 19 through July 22. Registered tax buyers submit electronic bids to pay the taxes. If the owners do not redeem, the tax buyers later can ask a court for deeds to properties.

The on-line Sale will be conducted from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Unpaid taxes in the County's 30 suburban townships, followed by Chicago's eight townships, will be offered according to the following schedule:

July 19 - Barrington, Berwyn, Bloom, Bremen, Calumet, Cicero, Elk Grove, Evanston, Hanover, Lemont, Leyden, Lyons, Maine, New Trier, Niles, Northfield, Norwood Park, Oak Park, Orland.

July 20 - Palatine, Palos, Proviso, Rich, River Forest, Riverside, Schaumburg, Stickney, Thornton, Wheeling, Worth, Hyde Park.

EPL Baby Falcons Receive Their New Names

Recently at the Evanston Public Library, scientists from Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History, the Shedd Aquarium and the Brookfield Zoo banded four baby peregrine falcons, three boys and one girl. They are the eighth batch of baby falcons to be born at the library. About 150 residents, bird watchers and elementary students were in the audience to view this spectacular event.

The library had a ballot (both on-line and paper) with seven male and seven female names asking folks to pick their top four. Squawker and Nona's (the parent peregrine falcons) latest hatchlings are named:

Wilbur – named after Wilbur, the runt pig in E.B. White's Charlotte's Web. The runt of the litter, Wilbur is saved from a terrible fate by his friend Charlotte the spi-

Lincoln – named after Abraham Lincoln, born in Illinois and our 16th president. He led the nation through Civil War and brought an end to slavery in the United

Dewey - named after Melvil Dewey, American librarian and reformer. Dewey established the Dewey decimal system of classifying books and played a prominent role in developing professional institutions for librarians.

Rosalind - the central character of Shakespeare's As You Like It. Some critics call Rosalind one of the most complex, fully realized Shakespearean characters. As an added bonus, there is a falcon reference in As You Like It (Act 3, Scene 3 - Touchstone: "As the ox hath his bow, sir, the horse his curb and the falcon her bells, so man hath his desires; and as pigeons bill, so wedlock would be nibbling").

The scientists also took blood samples for DNA tracking purposes along with feather samples. When they were finished, the fledglings were successfully returned to their nest.

"For the past several years, a pair of peregrine falcons has nested on one of the columns along the south side of the library and at least one baby falcon has successfully fledged each year," explained Evanston Public Library Director Mary Johns. "While the nest cannot be viewed directly from either inside or outside the building, the library has set up a webcam which transmits a streaming live image for all to

The peregrine falcon is a raptor, or bird of prey. Adults have blue-gray wings, dark brown backs, a buff colored underside with brown spots, and white faces with a black tear stripe on their cheeks. They have a hooked beaks and strong talons. Peregrine falcons are the fastest flying birds in the world – they are able to dive at 200 miles per hour and catch their prey in mid-air. There are an estimated 1,650 breeding pairs in the United States and Canada.

Peregrine Falcons have adapted to living in many cities and make use of tall buildings that provide suitable ledges for nesting and depend on the large populations of pigeons and starlings in cities for food. Peregrine falcons mate for life and breed in the same territory each year.

Evanston Reminds Dog Owners to Keep Their Pets on a Leash & Clean Up After Them

With the warmer weather now here, dog owners are more likely to take their pets out into the public. Residents are reminded that not only must their dogs be leashed (Ord 9-4-7 of the City Code), but they also are required under the law to pick-up after them (Ord 9-4-12). Nobody likes to step in dog waste!

City Code 9-4-7 requires that dogs must be leashed in public and they are not allowed to run loose in public parks or on the majority of the city's beaches. If you wish to allow your dog to run off leash, you may purchase an annual membership to Pooch Park or the Evanston Dog Beach.

City Code 9-4-12 requires dog owners to pick-up their dog's waste from public or private property and should have with them something with which to properly dispose of the waste. Dog waste can spread disease and it's bad for the environment. Dog feces may contain various organisms and parasites such as E. coli, tapeworm, and roundworm. They can all make people really sick. Small children are especially vulnerable so it's really important to clean it up! 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How To Protect Your Pet During Record Heat Wave

As temperatures reach towards 100 degrees today, pets are particularly at risk of a heat stroke. Pet owners

need to know how to protect their pets and the warning signs their animals may be in danger.

Pedro Boria, DVM, MS, DACVIM, an internal medicine specialist with BluePearl Veterinary Partners in the North Shore area, advises pet owners, "Don't go outside in the heat of the day, keep your pets in an air-conditioned environment, and limit strenuous activities such as running and playing ball in the park. Always bring water with you when outside, take breaks during your walks and find shade wherever possible." Dr. Boria also shared that, "If your pet does get overheated, spray the animal down with room temperature water, not cold – and never ice water. The cold water or ice causes a decrease in blood flow to the skin and heat can't escape the body – which makes the heat exhaustion symptoms worse. We have seen this in patients coming into our emergency facility recently."

The emergency care team at BluePearl Veterinary Partners warns if your pet is overly lethargic, vomits several times, has severe diarrhea or brick red gums, these are signs of heat related distress. Cool the animal with room temperature water and consult your veterinarian right away. Dr. Boria adds, "If your pet is panting uncontrollably, becomes severely agitated or collapses, take the animal to your veterinarian or a veterinary emergency hospital immediately."

Pet owners are advised to carry water with them whenever they take their animal outside, stay in the shade, venture outdoors for short periods of time and limit strenuous exercise such as running. And a word of caution: never leave your pet in a locked car with the windows closed. If you have questions or think your pet may be suffering from symptoms of heat exhaustion, contact your veterinarian.

Urban Wildlife Coalition:

Bird/Window Collisions – How You Can Help

More than five million birds representing upwards of 250 species are expected to pass through the Chicago area this spring, and May is a particularly busy month. A great time for bird-watching, but unfortunately, a bad time for bird collisions with windows.

Sometimes these stunned animals may appear to be dead, but are not. In fact, with timely treatment, more than 80% of these injured birds can be saved and released back to the wild! Urban Wildlife Coalition works closely with Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation, a state- and federally-licensed facility dedicated to rehabilitating injured and orphaned wildlife.

Volunteers are needed to help transport injured animals to the rehabilitation center(s). A few hours one morning a week can save hundreds of birds. Training is provided. For more information, please visit www.flintcreekwildlife.org/volunteer.htm or phone 847-842-8000.

If you find an injured or orphaned bird:

First off, it is a myth that if you handle baby birds, the mother will reject them. Place the bird in a paper bag with a folded paper towel at the bottom. Secure the bag with a clip.

Place the bag in a dark, quiet location and phone the number above (enter this number into your cellular phone for quick emergency access)

Do not give the bird food, water, or try to provide medical care which may cause further injury. Sometimes our best intentions actually cause further injury to the

Injured birds can be dropped off at Flint Creek's Northerly Island site (1400 S. Lynn White Drive, Chicago, IL 60605) between 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. daily. Directions are available on the website at www.flintcreekwildlife.org. Please call the number above first, so the rehabilitation team can prepare. Orphaned birds also are accepted between 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. daily, but it is necessary to call first so they are certain the bird requires treatment. Oftentimes, birds that appear to be orphaned may not necessarily be, and taking them from their parents can be detrimental.

He popular perennial flowering shrub, known as the Hydrangea, begins blooming at the start of July. The blooms are either shaped like a large snowball, technically known as a mophead, or like a cone. White is the most popular color. This is why hydrangea flowers are sometimes called "snowballs"... they are white in color and shaped like a ball. However, there are some blue, pink, and red varieties available now which will survive our cold Chicagoland winters.



There are a few reasons why white is the most popular color. First, most of the old fashion varieties that are hardy in Chicago only came in white. Second, the new colorful hydrangeas often require an acidic soil, something we don't have in Chicago because our soil is quite alkaline. In some of the newer varieties like "Endless Summer" and "all Summer Beauty" acid in the soil changes the color of the flower from pink to blue. In the Chicagoland area, one must add sulfur to the soil to make it more acidic to produce more vibrant colors. These varieties seem to do best in the southeastern part of America where the soil is naturally more acidic.

Hydrangeas can be divided into three size categories. First there are the 3' tall varieties. This size is the most popular. Second, there are the tall varieties that can easily grow to 6'. Third, there are the climbing hydrangeas which they say will grow to 85' tall. Personally, the climbing hydrangeas make a nice climbing plant, but I have never seen one anywhere near to 75' tall.

Hydrangeas prefer growing conditions which range from full sun to part shade. If the plant is in too much shade, then it will not bloom. In my experience, hydrangeas need at least half a day of sun to really bloom well. People might argue with me, but that has been my experience. Some even promote hydrangea s as shade plants and I just do not agree.

The flowers of hydrangeas can be picked in bloom and put in a vase with water. The flower heads can also be picked and allowe4d to dry out, and then used in dried flower arrangements. When fall approaches, some people leave the dried flower heads on the plant for interest in the garden during winter.

If you want to grow a hydrangea your best chance for success will be to grow one of the old fashion white varieties. I recommend the variety "Annabelle." This is a white, mophead or snowball type flowering variety which grows about 3' tall and 4' wide. "Annabelle" is very hardy during cold Chicagoland winters, and is very easy to grow. Unless you really want to exert a lot of time and effort growing a hydrangea, I do not recommend any of the newer blue and pink varieties. From talking to many gardeners, I have not heard many success stores. So, give yourself the best chance for success by growing an "Annabelle" hydrangea.

TAKE A WALK THROUGH THE WOODIES

22nd Annual Evanston Garden Walk, Sunday, July 10, 2011, 12 noon – 5 pm

After 22 years of sponsoring the Evanston Garden Walk, Keep Evanston Beautiful, Inc.(KEB),is still amazed to find so many new and wonderful gardens to feature. This year, there are seven glorious private gardens and two very different public gardens in locations all around Evanston, so transportation is required. (Bikes and carpooling are recommended.)

Of particular interest this year are some incredible collections of woody plants, including unique evergreens, many types, sizes and colors of deciduous trees, and wonderful flowering shrubs which make up the "bones" of an outstanding garden. One garden is the personal pallet of a retired horticultural writer for the Chicago Botanic Gardens; two surround historic houses near the lake, offering peaceful respite from the hubbub of downtown Evanston, with fantastic container gardens, raised organic vegetable beds, and a wealth of perennials suited to the charming architecture.

Another landscape is the passion of a gardener who "gardens in my head when I go to bed." She has created a designated wildlife preserve as well as a beautiful garden retreat. For those seeking something to soothe their psyche, we offer a Zen garden dotted with treasures from the owners' travels and fun finds at the flea market. There's also a garden created by two artists with a passion for plants, and a perennial garden with layers and levels of beauty in front, and a deep back garden full of surprises. Unusual annuals and perennials, water features and garden art abound on this year's walk.

The two public gardens include an interactive garden behind a senior living facility in downtown Evanston, where residents can get their hands dirty, and a recently renovated public park where local residents united with the local fire department to raise funds and get it done. At the park during the walk, members of the Herb Society of America (Northern Illinois Unit) will answer questions about growing and using culinary herbs, and will serve lavender lemonade and other refreshments.

Most of the private gardens are either designed or planted by the homeowners themselves, though professionals help with hardscape, maintenance and some of the design. This is a wonderful opportunity to see some amazing gardens, and talk to the gardeners/homeowners. Visitors are encouraged to bring your notebook and camera, because you will be inspired!

Tickets for the walk are available on-line at www.evanstonkeb.org, where you can also find a list of local retailers who are selling the tickets through July 9th. Or you can stop by the KEB office in the Evanston Ecology Center, 2024 McCormick Blvd. Tickets will also be available on July 9th at the Evanston Farmer's market in the Friends Tent. All proceeds from the event fund environmental education projects in Evanston and Evanston/Skokie schools, as well as promoting community cooperation in a variety of anti-litter and recycling-related programs.

CHICAGO PUBLIC LIBRARY FEATURES EXHIBITION OF CIVIL WAR ARTIFACTS

The most devastating war fought on American soil was the Civil War. The divisive, bloody armed conflict involved 11 Southern slave states or "the Confederacy," against 20 Northern free states known as "the Union."

As a tribute to the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, as well as the soldiers who fought as part of the Union, the Chicago Public Library Special Collections & Preservation Division presents In Service to the Union: Civil War Artifacts, an exhibition of vintage Civil War artifacts that can be viewed in person and online. The exhibit is currently on display through July 27, 2011, in the 9th floor Special Collections Hall at the Harold Washington Library Center, 400 S. State St.



Some of the highlighted items in the In Service to the Union: Civil War Artifacts exhibit include:

- · Swords carried by Union field and cavalry officers
- · George Armstrong Custer's non-regulation hat
- · The saddle Lt. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's used at the Battle of Wilderness and the Appomattox Campaign
- · An artillery jacket worn by Pvt. John Stagg, who served in the Chicago Board of Trade Battery
 - · A bugle and pennant from the Chicago Board of Trade Battery
 - · A drum from the 65th Illinois Volunteer Regiment
 - · A Colt .56 caliber single shot musket
 - · Hardtack biscuits—a staple in the Union soldiers diet
- · A spoon-knife-fork set, pocket chess board, rollaway sewing kit, and a collection of dated posters, medals and other Civil War items

Many of these exhibit items, taken from the Library's Grand Army of the Republic and Civil War Collections, have been in the collection for nearly 100 years. The Grand Army of the Republic was a Union veteran's organization.

To make these Civil War artifacts available to a world-wide audience, the Library has mounted detailed photographs of the artifacts on its website. The online images are part of the Wayne Whalen Digital Archive of the Grand Army of the Republic and Civil War Collections. These dramatic photographs include details not visible in the exhibit hall, such as close-ups of maker's marks and fish skin grips on the swords. The digital archive is made possible by generous gifts to the Chicago Public Library Foundation by the partners of Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom LLP in honor of Wayne Whalen.

Evanston 4th of July Parade

As many as 140 entrants are expected to wind their way from Central Park Avenue East on Central Street to Ashland Avenue, beginning at 2:00 PM. Lawn chairs may be placed along Central street beginning July 1st, 6:00 AM in accordance with City ordinance.

Evanston 4th of July Parade Seating Ordinance

In Evanston, it is more than just rules, it is the law. Section 7-2-9 (B) of the Evanston City Code states:

Fourth Of July Parade Parkway Regulations:

(B) 1. Chairs and blankets only are permitted on the parkway on Central Street from the west side of Bent Park to Asbury Avenue each year no earlier than six o'clock (6:00) A.M. on July 1 for the sole purpose of viewing the July 4 parade. No such chairs and blankets are permitted at any time on the sidewalks and on areas where the pavement extends to the curb. Such chairs and blankets shall not encumber, obstruct, or encroach on crosswalks or handicapped access to the sidewalk. All such chairs and blankets must be removed no later than six o'clock (6:00) P.M. on the day of the parade. Any person placing such chairs or blankets on the parkway shall assume all responsibility for doing so and by placing such chairs or blankets on the parkway holds the city harmless for any and all consequences of such act. Such chairs and blankets placed on the parkway prior to six o'clock (6:00) A.M. on July 1 or remaining on the parkway after six o'clock (6:00) P.M. on the day of the parade will be removed by the city. The city is not responsible for loss of or damage to property placed on the parkway or removed from the parkway.

2. No tape, rope, stakes, or other similar material for the purpose of cordoning off or reserving any area in the parkway shall be permitted at any time. Such materials will be removed by the city. The city is not responsible for loss of or damage to property removed from the parkway. Any person placing such chairs and blankets on the parkway shall assume all responsibility for doing so and by placing such chairs and blankets on the parkway holds the city harmless for any and all consequences of such act.

(C) Penalty: Any person violating the terms of this section shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for any such offense.

Fireworks Safety Reminde

The Skokie Police Department reminds the public that most fireworks are illegal and individuals who use them risk being cited or arrested and of course injured.

The only fireworks considered legal to possess by an individual not licensed to handle them include smoke or glow-worm pellets, smoke devices, sparklers, noise-makers known as 'party poppers,' 'snappers' or paper caps.

Even though sparklers are legal, they are dangerous, especially in the hands of young children.

Sparklers can heat up to a core temperature of 1800 degrees Fahrenheit. This temperature is hot enough to melt some precious metals and third-degree burns can result at 220 degrees Fahrenheit. The Skokie Police Department strongly recommends against purchasing these items and suggests leaving all fireworks to professionals.

The Skokie Police will be on the lookout for illegal use of fireworks and will take the appropriate enforcement action.

Each year numerous calls are received about illegal fireworks being set off, and sometimes, the Fire Department must be called out to extinguish a fire started by fireworks.

On Monday, July 4, 2011, shortly after dusk, the Village of Skokie will co-host a 3-D fireworks display at Niles West High School, 5701 Oakton, Skokie.

Drive Now. Text Later - Raise Awareness of the Dangers of Texting While Driving

The Illinois Tollway, Illinois Department of Transportation, Illinois State Police, Illinois Secretary of State and AAA Chicago has issued a new campaign entitled "Drive Now. Text Later."

The Village of Skokie would like to remind residents that it is illegal to text while driving. The State law prohibits sending or reading text messages while driving in Illinois.

Nationally, nearly 5,500 people died in 2009 in distracted driving-related crashes and another nearly half a million people were injured. Distraction-related fatalities represented 16 percent of overall traffic fatalities in 2009 – the same percentage as in 2008.

Tips to avoid distracted driving:

- · Put your cell phone out of sight and out of reach when you get in the car.
- Display a "Drive Now. Text Later." window decal and remind yourself and others to stop texting while driving. Which can be ordered from the Illinois Tollway website www.illinoistollway.com
- · Pull over to a safe location to use a cell phone.
- · If you must answer the phone, use a hands-free device.
- · Do not send or read text messages while driving.
- · Blackberry users: When in the car, set up a "driving" profile on your smart phone, to silence alerts and the phone.

To listen to the radio, use the volume and station buttons on the steering wheel, instead of reaching for the center console.



If you are a subscriber or selecting a play to see I encourage you to see their production of "Broadway Bound" by the comedy genius of playwright Neil Simon.

David New is the director of the show and can be proud of what you will see on stage. He has assembled a strong cast that includes three strong veteran stage actors.

Carmen Roman plays Kate the mother and Paula Scrofano is Blanche, the aunt who is wealthy while the family is middle class. Mike Nussbaum is Ben, father of Kate. Mr. Nussbaum is a Chicago actor who is ageless at 87 years old. He gives a memorable performance and has performed not only all over the world, but on Broadway, film and television. First Floor Remodeling with Help of City SBIF Grant to Begin Soon The DANK Haus German American Cultural Center was fortunate to be one of the Lincoln Square businesses to win the late 2010 lottery for a SBIF Grant from the City of Chicago.


This large-scale endeavor will begin as soon as June and will continue through fall, with the aim of revitalizing the appearance of the DANK Haus and the organization itself, along with several Lincoln Square businesses, including the Athenian Shoe Store and Becker Pharmacy, which are part of the building.

The remodeling might cost up to \$250,000, 50% of which will be reimbursed through the SBIF Grant upon completion. Executive Director Nicholle Dombrowski hopes that this project will ensure that the DANK Haus "goes from being a 'hidden gem' to the 'jewel of Western' for generations to come."

The balance will depend on fundraising efforts. Fundraising plans are underway and donations are accepted at any time and are tax deductible.

The SBIF Grant specifically uses local Tax Increment Financing (TIF) revenue to help businesses remodel their facades and is processed by SomerCor 504, Inc., a federally certified Small Business Administration lender. Eligible renovations include new windows, floors or roof, sign removal and replacement, and tuck pointing, among others.

The DANK Haus is a registered 501(c)3 with the mission of preserving and promoting German and German American culture, heritage, language, and the fine arts.

What's in a Word?

We use words every day without much thought. Words can have different meaning in different contexts. Sometimes this "play on words" can give rise to humor. In fact, comedian George Carlin based his career on the subtleties in the usage of language. Carlin became famous for the "Seven Dirty Words" skit detailing the words that were prohibited in broadcast media. In fact, Carlin's skit was the subject of a U.S. Supreme Court Case which clarified the boundary between free speech and obscenity. Carlin often pointed out apparent oxymorons like "jumbo shrimp" or "military intelligence." George Carlin died recently, at age 71.

Ask them to pull out their tablet, iPad, or laptop and show you how to find your way around Social Security's website, www.socialsecurity.gov.

Ask them to show you how to use www.socialsecurity.gov to avoid unneeded trips to a Social Security office. Have them show you our library of online publications containing all the information you might want to know on an array of Social Security, retirement, and Medicare subjects. The publications can be found at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/index.html. If you're thinking about retirement, for example, you may want to check out When To Start Receiving Retirement Benefits at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10147.html. (Unlike some libraries, there's no due date to remember.)

That was easy! With the young ones helping you, you might as well go ahead and spend another 15 minutes to get the job done. No need to put on your shoes and sunglasses — you can apply online without having to leave your home. Visit www.socialsecurity.gov/applyonline where you can apply for retirement benefits in as little as 15 minutes. Once you click the "submit" button, you're done; in most cases there are no forms to sign or documents to mail in.

Heat Emergency Information

Summer is here, and with this season comes the heat. The Skokie Health Department recommends the following during forecasted heat advisories:

Use a buddy system to check in on family, neighbors and friends;

Plan activities for the coolest times of the day (early morning and late afternoon);

Reduce exertion and exercise in an effort to stay cool;

Drink plenty of fluids;

Wear light colored, loose fitting clothing outdoors;

NEVER leave children or pets in a parked car;

Protect your pets. Make sure your pet always has cool, clean water and a shaded area to rest if left outside;

Stay indoors and, if at all possible, stay in an air-conditioned place. If your home does not have air conditioning, go to the shopping mall or public library – even a few hours spent in air conditioning can help your body stay cooler when you go back into the heat; and

Electric fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90s, fans will not prevent heat-related illness. Taking a cool shower or bath, or moving to an air-conditioned place is a much better way to cool off.

The effects of extreme heat conditions on the human body are cumulative and can lead to variety of health complications, including heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

Village Cooking Corner

KOTA KAPAMA (CHICKEN IN TOMATO SAUCE)

This is a dish served in many parts of Greece, especially in Arcadia in the Peloponnese - to guests and a special menu on Sundays.

1 whole chicken cut into parts $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of Canola or Olive Oil

½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. pepper

1-1/2 tsp of cinnamon

Sauce:

1 tbsp of drippings

1 tbsp of all-purpose flour

2-3 cups of water

1 cup of canned diced tomatoes (no salt added)

1 cup of tomato sauce (no salt added)

½ cup of dry white wine (optional)

1 whole cinnamon stick 6 whole cloves

½ tsp oregano Juice of one lemon

2 tbsp of grated Kefalotyri cheese (found in Greek markets*) or Parmesan or Romano)

Cut the chicken in parts, wash and dry and then place in a bowl. Sprinkle with lemon juice, salt and pepper and 1-1/2 tsp. of cinnamon Marinate for about 15 minutes. Heat oil in a Dutch Oven or large pot and saute the chicken until golden. Add the wine, cover and simmer for about 15 minutes. In the meantime prepare the sauce in another pan by mixing the flour with a little of the water to a paste consistency. Combine the rest of the ingredients but not the cheese. Cook the sauce on a low/ medium fire on top of the range for about 10 minutes stirring to combine. Add the sauce to the chicken and continue to cook another 20 to 25 minutes or until the chicken is well done.

Prepare the pasta Macaroni* or Spaghetti as directed by the pasta maker. Drain and place on a platter sprinkling the pasta with the grated Kefalotyri, Parmesan or Romano as desired. Place the Chicken and the Sauce into an appropriate serving dish along with the platter of pasta and present to your family and/or guests. Bon Appetite (Kali Orexi)


Free Evanston Youth Summer Lunch Program Began June 13

Lunch sites are Mason Park (Church St. at Florence Ave.), James Park (at the Fieldhouse west of the Levy Center at 300 Dodge Ave.), and the parks adjacent to Fleetwood-Jourdain Center (1655 Foster St.) and Robert Crown Center (1701 Main St).
