Gov. Rauner Kicks Off Yearlong Celebration of Illinois Bicentennial at Fifth Third Bank Winter WonderFest at Navy Pier

On December 3rd, Gov. Bruce Rauner and leaders of the Illinois Bicentennial Commission officially kicked off the state's yearlong 200th birthday celebration at Fifth Third Bank Winter WonderFest at Navy Pier. Illinois Bicentennial will pay tribute to the people, places, and things that are being BORN, BUILT & GROWN in the nation's fifth most populous state.

"This is an opportunity to celebrate all that has been great in our first 200 years and lay the foundation for 200 more years of growth and prosperity," Rauner said. "Illinois is home, and the Bicentennial gives us a chance to reflect on how we can continue to make it great for our children and grandchildren."



"Today marks Illinois' 199th birthday," said Lori Healey, co-chairwoman of the commission and chief executive officer of the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority. "Illinois Bicentennial will be a yearlong celebration between Dec. 3, 2017, and Dec. 3, 2018, which will be our state's 200th birthday."

"The Bicentennial is a once-in-a-lifetime invitation to fall in love with Illinois all over again," said Gloria Castillo, co-chairwoman of the commission and president and CEO of Chicago United. 



New Year's Day

The early Roman calendar consisted of 10 months and 304 days, with each new year beginning at the vernal equinox; according to tradition, it was created by Romulus, the founder of Rome, in the eighth century B.C. A later king, Numa Pompilius, is credited with adding the months of Januarius and Februarius. Over the centuries, the calendar fell out of sync with the sun, and in 46 B.C. the emperor Julius Caesar decided to solve the problem by consulting with the most prominent astronomers and mathematicians of his time. He introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the more modern Gregorian calendar that most countries around the world use today.

As part of his reform, Caesar instituted January 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honor the month's namesake: Janus, the Roman god of beginnings, whose two faces allowed him to look back into the past and forward into the future. Romans celebrated by offering sacrifices to Janus, exchanging gifts with one another, decorating their homes with laurel branches and attending raucous parties. In medieval Europe, Christian leaders temporarily replaced January 1 as the first of the year with days carrying more religious significance, such as December 25 (the anniversary of Jesus' birth) and March 25 (the Feast of the Annunciation); Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January 1 as New Year's.

Need A Lawyer? The Chicago Bar Association Can Help Talk To A Lawyer For Free On Saturday, Jan. 20, 2018

Attorneys with the Chicago Bar Association's Call-A-Lawyer Program will be available to take calls from the public and offer brief legal advice on Saturday, January 20th, as part of an ongoing legal public service program offered by the CBA.

Calls will be accepted January 20th from 9 a.m. to noon at (312) 554-2001. Call-A-Lawyer events are typically held on the third Saturday of each month in the morning hours.

Citizens can call in and briefly explain their situation to an attorney who will then work to suggest self-help strategies or provide advice to help resolve their issues. If callers need further legal services, or have questions beyond the scope of the attorney's practice area, they will be advised to contact the CBA Lawyer Referral Service during the week for a referral to an attorney in the appropriate area of law.

The CBA's Lawyer Referral Service has more than 200 prescreened, qualified lawyers experienced in almost every area of law that offer their services to the public. When contacting the LRS during normal business hours Monday through Friday, callers can be referred to attorneys practicing in numerous areas of law including:

-- Domestic Relations, including divorce, custody, support and other family law matters);

-- Personal Injury (including auto accidents, slip and falls, products liability, wrongful death, malpractice and other types of injury cases.

-- Estate Planning, including will and trust drafting, probate and will contest.

-- Real Estate, including buying or selling real estate, foreclosure defense and landlord/tenant issues.

--Employment Law, including wrongful termination, harassment and discrimination.

Additionally, the CBA offers an after-hours On-Call service which provides callers' access to attorneys in three different areas of law at any time after normal business hours. 

Voter Registration Series Seeks to Ensure All Voices are Heard and Votes Counted

As one of the most culturally diverse communities in the U.S., Skokie is home to people from more than 50 countries, speaking over 100 different languages.

But while many of these residents make up the largest percentage of unregistered voters, Niles Township Government, in partnership with Skokie Public Library and the League of Women Voters, is seeking to change that.

The three will collaborate on 'Your Vote is Your Voice,' a voter registration series in January and February that looks to make the registration process a breeze for residents who hail from all cultural backgrounds.

The program kicks off on Saturday and Sunday, January 13 and 14, when Skokie Public Library hosts voter registration from 1-5 p.m., and then again on Monday, January 15, from 1-8 p.m. During these first three days, Niles Township Government will arrange for interpreters to help those speaking the following languages register to vote: Armenian, Chinese, Korean, Assyrian, Spanish and Urdu. Interpreters speaking additional languages may also be available.

The series will continue on Sundays through February 18 from 1-5 p.m.; and aptly concludes on Presidents' Day, Monday, February 19, from 1-8 p.m.

Skokie Public Library is located at 5215 Oakton Street.

"We want to make sure that all Niles Township residents become registered voters and have their voices heard locally as well as on the state and federal levels of government," said Niles Township Government Trustee Bonnie Kahn Ognisanti. "Having interpreters on site January 13, 14 and 15 will help make the process an easy one, no matter what language you speak."





State Rolls Back LLC Fees

Governor Signs SB 867, Slashing Filing Costs For Small Businesses

Gov. Bruce Rauner today signed legislation that substantially reduces startup, annual filing and other fees for limited liability companies (LLCs), the organizational structure preferred by many of Illinois' 1.2 million small businesses.

The new law will encourage more businesses to form in Illinois rather than go to other states to escape high fees. Effective today, the filing fee for new LLCs drops to \$150 from \$500 and annual report fees drop to \$75 from \$250. Previously, Illinois charged fees that were among the highest in the nation.

'Small businesses are the engines of our economy, our job creators who employ the majority of new workers in our state each year," said Lt. Gov. Evelyn Sanguinetti, who chairs the Governor's Rural Affairs Council. "We need to keep them here and help them grow, and this legislation will reduce their costs and make us more competitive with surrounding states. This is especially important for our small towns because we need more small businesses in rural Illinois to drive their economies and create jobs."

A hearing aid is an incredibly personalized piece of medical equipment-it's worn every day, on the head (one of the most sensitive parts of the body), it's directly visible to others, and you rely on it for one of the five senses you have for making sense of the world.

When your audiologist first sets you up with a hearing aid, you'll have a few days to wear it and decide if it's indeed the right choice for you. Here are four things to watch for during that crucial trial period.

1. Hearing improvement - the reason you wear your hearing aid is to help you hear better, and that's clearly the most important aspect of the selection process. Do you find a dramatic improvement over not wearing the device (or, if you already wear one, your previous hearing aid)? Do you notice a reduction in listening difficulty? Is it easier to follow conversation?
