Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and became a federal holiday in 1937. However, people have celebrated Columbus's voyage since the colonial period. During the four hundredth anniversary, in 1892, teachers, preachers poets and politicians used Columbus Day rituals to teach ideals of patriotism. The first official, regular Columbus Day holiday was proclaimed by Colorado governor Jesse F. McDonald in 1905 and

made a statutory holiday in 1907. In April 1934, as a result of lobbying by the Knights of Columbus, Congress and President Franklin Delano Roosevelt made October 12 a federal holiday under the name Columbus Day.

Attorneys with the Chicago Bar Association's Call-A-Lawyer Program will be available to take calls from the public and offer brief legal advice on Saturday, October 20th, as part of an ongoing legal public service program offered by the CBA.

Calls will be accepted Saturday, October 20th from 9 a.m. to noon at (312) 554-2001. Call-A-Lawyer events are typically held on the third Saturday of each month in the morning hours.

Citizens can call in and briefly explain their situation to an attorney who will then work to suggest self-help strategies or provide advice to help resolve their issues. If callers need further legal services, or have questions beyond the scope of the attorney's practice area, they will be advised to contact the CBA Lawyer Referral Service during the week for a referral to an attorney in the appropriate area of law.

The CBA's Lawyer Referral Service has more than 200 prescreened, qualified lawyers experienced in almost every area of law that offer their services to the public. When contacting the LRS during normal business hours Monday through Friday, callers can be referred to attorneys practicing in numerous areas of law including:

- Domestic Relations, including divorce, custody, support and other family law matters);
- Personal Injury (including auto accidents, slip and falls, products liability, wrongful death, malpractice and other types of injury cases.
- Estate Planning, including will and trust drafting, probate and will contest.
- Real Estate, including buying or selling real estate, foreclosure defense and landlord/tenant issues.
- Employment Law, including wrongful termination, harassment and discrimination.

Additionally, the CBA offers an afterhours On-Call service which provides callers' access to attorneys in three different areas of law at any time after normal business hours. Roadside History of Illinois

This is the twenty-first in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, Roadside History of Illinois (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.



The Maxwell Street Market and Great **Chicago Fire Origin Site**

The Maxwell Street Market no longer takes place on Maxwell Street. The market was moved after 120 years at its original location at Maxwell and Halsted Streets, now part of the UIC campus. Some of the original buildings still stand, thanks to preservationists, but the market was moved to Canal Street in 1994, then moved again, to its current location along Desplaines Street from Roosevelt Road to Harrison Street in 2008.

Beginning in the 1870s, Maxwell Street was an entry point for new immigrants to Chicago; it was sometimes called the "Ellis Island of the Midwest." The area residents were Irish, Greek, Italian, German, Russian, and other ethnicities. Most of the neighborhood survived the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, and immigrants continued to settle here, especially Eastern European Jews. Later, African Americans from the South added to the community, and after that, Mexican immigrants.

The legendary open-air market sprang up shortly after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. For more than a century, merchants, street vendors, and Chicago residents with junk to sell hawked their wares here. Beginning in the 1930s, street musicians, es-

pecially black musicians from the South, performed at the market and developed a new style of amplified music known as the blues. Thus Maxwell Street is often identified as the birthplace of the blues. It also is the birthplace of the "Maxwell Street Polish" sausage sandwich.

The market continues today, every Sunday, as the New Maxwell Street Market, and in spite of all the changes, it remains a Chicago tradition. Meanwhile, preservation-minded groups are still fighting to save the last remnants of the old neighborhood.

Another place of significant historical interest in this area, a mere block away from the new marketplace, is the site where the Great Chicago Fire originated. On October 8, 1871, a blaze started in the twenty-by-sixteen foot wooden barn of Patrick and Catherine O'Leary at 137 De Koven Street and spread for several days until about a third of the city was in flames. Today, the Chicago Fire Academy stands where the home was located, now numbered 558 De Koven Street, and a bronze sculpture was erected near the entrance in 1961 as a monument to the Great Chicago Fire.



Celebrate Halloween At Chicago Parks ~ Festivities Include Pumpkin Patches, Movies & More Chicago Park District Announces 3rd Annual 'Campfire Horrors' Movie Series Lineup at Northerly Island

Horror classic screenings kick off October 5th

Featured activities include a live original score, marshmallow roasting, carnivorous plant demo, tiara give-away, and a Harry Belafonte dance party

The Chicago Park District announced today the movie lineup for the third annual 'Campfire Horrors' outdoor Halloween-themed feature film series at Northerly Island, located at 1521 S. Linn White Dr. The film series kicks off on Friday, October 5th and will continue every Friday through the month of October.

In the spirit of Halloween, Northerly Island will showcase six scary classics, ranging from tame to terrifying. Each screening will be accompanied by campfires, family-friendly activities, and marshmallow roasting.

The film series will kick-off on October 5th at 7 p.m. with the silent godfather of horror, Nosferatu. The 1922 silent German vampire film will be accompanied by a remount of last year's brand-new live score commissioned by the Chicago Park District, composed by Maxx McGathey and performed by the live band, Gramps the Vamp.

The evening will wrap up with a screening of 1986's musical-horror-comedy Little Shop of Horrors with a sing-along and a chance to learn about real-life carnivorous plants from Chicago plant experts.

On Friday, October 12th, Stephen King's Carrie will grace the big screen. The popular 1976 film centers on the story of a vengeful (and telekinetic) prom queen. To get audiences in the spirit, free prom tiaras will be provided to the first 50 audience members named Carrie (or any spelling variation).

In week three, the campy and over-the-top fun of Beetlejuice and accompanying Harry Belafonte dance party will offer something for younger viewers. After all that fun, another meaner boogeyman takes over the park as Freddy Krueger arrives in A Nightmare on Elm Street.

Rounding out the month, Campfire Horrors will feature a seminal film of the horror genre, as shocking now as it was in 1973, The Exorcist. This terrifying tale of possession was the

first horror film to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Picture and sent audiences screaming from theaters in its original release.

Campfires, with ample firewood, will be set-up throughout the park to create a cozy atmosphere and for roasting marshmallows provided by the Park District along with roasting forks. Hot coffee, tea and cocoa will be available for free to keep visitors warm on chilly nights. Screenings are outdoors, weather permitting, and audiences are encouraged to bring their own chairs/blankets and layer up for the cooler weather. Campfires will be lit 30 minutes before the start of the film, and burn bright throughout.

All screenings are scheduled to take place outdoors at the Northerly Island Visitors Center, located at 1521 S. Linn White Dr.



Halloween is a time of celebration and superstition. It is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor all saints and martyrs; the holiday, All Saints' Day, incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows' Eve and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a secular, community-based event characterized by child-friendly activities such as trick-or-treating. In a number of countries around the world, as the days grow shorter and the nights get colder, people continue to usher in the winter season with gatherings, costumes and sweet treats.

Village Cooking Corner

Polish Kolackys

Borrowed from the Website Pinterest Ingredients

- 8 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 8 oz. (1 cup) unsalted butter, softened
- 11 1/4 oz (2 1/2 cups) unbleached all-
- purpose flour, sifted; plus more for rolling
- 1 12-oz. jar good-quality apricot preserves (about 3/4 cup) or any flavor fruit iam
- 1 large egg, beaten
- Confectioner's sugar, for dusting
- 1 Tablespoon Vanilla

In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the cream cheese and butter on mediumhigh speed until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Scrape down the bowl and paddle. With the mixer on low, gradually mix in the flour until a smooth dough forms.

Turn out onto a lightly floured surface and the dough gently to form a ball. Divide the dough in thirds, wrap each in plastic wrap, and flatten into squares. Refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight. Heat the oevn to 350 degrees F. Line 3 cookie sheets with parchment paper. Remove one piece of dough from the refrigerator and roll it out on a lightly floured

surface into a 1/8-inch thick rectangle. Using a sharp knife or pizza cutter, trim the rough edges of the dough so the sides are straight, and then cut into 2 & 1/2 inch squares. Spoon about 1/2teaspoon of the preserves onto the center of each square. Fold one corner into the center, dab with the beaten egg, and then bring the opposite corner into the center and pinch firmly together to seal the corners. With a thin spatula, transfer the cookie to the prepared cookie sheet. Repeat the process with the remaining dough.

Bake one sheet at a time until golden and very lightly browned and puffed, 10 to 12 minutes. Transfer to a rack to cool completely and then dust with confectioner's sugar.

You can freeze the fillings with little loss in flavor or consistency. As for the kołaczki. Freeze them filled and unbaked and bake them from the frozen state. Don't freeze baked kołaczki because when you defrost them, they will become soggy.


