Chicago's Memorial Day Parade honors all men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our country.

The Wreath Laying Ceremony will begin at 11am on Daley Plaza (Dearborn and Washington Streets). The parade will then step off at noon and proceed south on State Street from Lake Street to Van Buren Street.

During the Wreath Laying Ceremony and Parade, the City of Chicago honors fallen heroes and Gold Star family members who have lost a loved one in the United States Armed Forces to combat operations or while on active duty. Approved by Congress beginning

in 1947, Gold Star Lapel Pins and the Next of Kin Lapel Pins are presented to families not as an award, but as symbols of honor worn by family members in remembrance of their fallen loved ones and their ultimate sacrifice.



The Downtown Evanston Farmers' Market will open for its 43rd season on Saturday, May 5, 2018 at University Pl. and Oak Ave., behind the Hilton Garden Inn.

The market will be held every Saturday through November 3 from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Free parking is available in the 1800 Maple Self Park Garage with ticket validation at the City of Evanston tent.

Visitors are encouraged to arrive to the market hungry, as food will be sold on site. This season, up to 58 vendors will sell a wide variety of goods, including fruits, vegetables, meat, flowers, cheese, milk, eggs, baked goods and more. LINK cards are accepted at the market. Gov. Rauner Designates May As Asian American & Pacific Islander Heritage Month

Gov. Bruce Rauner proclaimed the month of May as Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage month. He designated this month as a celebration of the culture, traditions, history and accomplishments of Asian Pacific Americans here in Illinois.

"Asian Pacific Americans have made invaluable contributions to our state and our nation," Rauner said. "Their determination and perseverance have led to successes in so many areas: business, technology, education, medicine, government, and nonprofits. Yet they put family first and always work to create opportunities for future generations."

Lt. Gov. Evelyn Sanguinetti, the Illinois Department of Human Rights (IDHR), the Illinois Bicentennial Commission and other distinguished guests gathered at the James R. Thompson Center in downtown Chicago today to recognize six organizations for their ongoing economic and cultural contributions and leadership.

"We cherish our inclusion, we cherish our diversity, we cherish the heritage and traditions of our native nations, and we cherish what we share together as American citizens: family, faith, hard work, devotion to education, and love of helping our communities," Sanguinetti said. "Illinois is so blessed to have such a vibrant Asian Pacific American community. The accomplishments we celebrate today should remind us all that Asian Pacific American history is part of our shared history and should be embraced every day."

"It is crucial that we celebrate and recognize the achievements made in the Asian American Pacific Islander community," said IDHR Acting Director Janice Glenn. "They are playing leading roles in every sector of our society. Today, we honor some of these leaders, who contribute not only to their local communities, but to their home countries as well."

Ron Bongat, president of the Asian American Law Enforcement Association and detective at Oak Park Police Department, was the keynote speaker at the event.

"Thank you to the Governor's Office and Illinois Department of Human Rights for bringing everyone together to salute Illinois' legacy, contributions, and positive impact made to the Asian Pacific American community," Bongat said. "As president of AALEA, we will continue to do our part to support Asian Pacific American law enforcement officers and promote a greater understanding and cooperation between the community and law enforcement agencies."

The event also included performances by SoriBeat, Xiao Chen, and Mer and featured Chicago's ABC 7 Anchor Judy Hsu as the Mistress of Ceremonies.

Food is a favorite category. From produce, dried fruit and nuts, gourmet pastries, snacks to delicious hot food line up, no one will leave hungry. Have you ever had a mangonada? This chilled blend of fresh mango and tamarind sauce is a flea market favorite. It is worth the wait in line for this treat! Food vendors also offer tacos, pizza, ice cream, lemonade, hotdogs, churros, sandwiches and weekly specials.

Gardeners will find healthy perennials, annuals, shrubs and interesting decor accents to add to their flea market garden.

Maybe you are moving to a new home or first apartment and need a few decorative or functional items. Shoppers will find wall art, pottery, weird statues, electronics, vintage toys, galvanized metal, dishes, cookware, dining sets, maybe even a kitchen sink?

New furniture is costly and often what is affordable is not solid quality wood. Take a look at the retro, mid-century, antique and even handmade pallet furniture and you will notice the superior quality of older items. Likewise, "lightly pre-loved" items in excellent condition can be purchased for a fraction of the original retail price. One up and coming shopper personality is the Millennial. According to a recent article by Hollywood Reporter, as well as Wolff's Flea Market own observations, this age group (22-37) is developing their unique style by

Buy a gently read book for \$1 and you have already saved \$14! The same goes for movies, music and most everything else that is first-quality-secondhand.

Here are a few more numbers from Donald Wolff, "We are now open for our 28th season, and calculate that 5 million customers have walked up and down our aisles since we opened in 1991. And, if you walk the entire market, you will have walked 4 miles."

Mayor Emanuel Outlines Future Of Chicago As A Two Waterfront City In The Second Building On Burnham Address

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced that 985 acres of parks have been acquired and 5.5 miles of waterfront access have been developed under the Building on Burnham plan. The comprehensive plan to invest in the Lakefront, the Chicago River, natural areas and recreational opportunities in neighborhoods across the city will continue, with plans to acquire additional parkland and further develop the waterfront in the coming years.

"By preserving, protecting and improving our natural areas, we are building on the blueprint of Daniel Burnham's Plan for Chicago," said Mayor Emanuel. "Efforts like making our lake more accessible, reconnecting the city with the River and building new neighborhood parks and playgrounds are not just for the Chicago of today; these efforts ensure the city our children inherit is even more vibrant, more beautiful, more prosperous, and more inclusive than ever before."

Building on Burnham, which launched two years ago, outlined a comprehensive plan to invest in public spaces across the city. This built on expansions made since 2011 to Chicago's park systems, which now include 985 acres of new parkland, 327 new playgrounds under the Chicago Plays! program and generational park projects such as Maggie Daley, 31st St. Harbor, The 606 trail and park system and La Villita, the Big Park in Little Village.

Since 2011, the Chicago River has been transformed into the city's next recreational park, with vast opportunities for residents and visitors to access and enjoy the river at almost every mile. Completed projects include the four new boathouses in neighborhoods along the river, including the River Park Boathouse in Albany Park, Clark WMS Boathouse in North Center, Ping Tom Boathouse in Chinatown and the Eleanor Boathouse in Bridgeport.

The Chicago River flows right through the heart of our city, connecting people and neighborhoods to each other and to nature," said Margaret Frisbie, Executive Director of Friends of the Chicago River. "Increasing access, improving water quality and allowing wildlife to thrive sets Chicago apart and makes us healthier. Healthy rivers are good for everyone - physically, emotionally and economically.

The Chicago Riverwalk, which covers 1.25-miles through the heart of the city, was completed in 2016 and continues to offer new and improved ways to enjoy Chicago's waterfronts and architecture. The highly-decorated, world renowned project was designed by a team of architects including Chicago's Ross Barney Architects and Sasaki. It was constructed by Alfred Benesch & Co. Engineers and Walsh Construction under the supervision of the Chicago Department of Transportation. The idea of a riverfront promenade was first put forth in Burnham's Plan for Chicago.

"The river is back! Chicagoans can look forward to new educational and recreational opportunities made possible by reinvesting in our river," said Carol Ross Barney, Founder of Ross Barney Architects.

Chicago's Lakefront spans 26 miles of the city and is one of the most utilized assets in Chicago's park system. To alleviate areas of congestion along the 18 mile trail, the Lakefront Trail Separation project was launched to create a separate bike lane for cyclists and pedestrian trail for those on foot. During summer weekends, an estimated 100,000 people per day use this trail. The funding was provided by the Chicago Park District and a generous donation from Ken Griffin, Founder and Chief Executive Officer of Citadel. Construction on the entire path from Ardmore Avenue on the north to 71st Street on the south will be complete in 2018.

The Creed was written in 1918 by William Tyler Page of Friendship Heights, Maryland in the course of a nation wide contest on the subject. Page was a descendent of President Tyler, and Representative John Page, who served in the Congress fro 1789-97. William Tyler Page began his government career as a Congressional page in December of 1881. In 1919 he was elected Clerk of the House of Representatives, and held that position until December of 1931. A new post, Emeritus Minority Clerk, was then created for him which he occupied until his death on October 20, 1942.

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This Memorial Day, we join our community and the nation in honoring all service men and women who sacrificed their lives to preserve our freedom.

Their patriotism and sacrifice have given us a legacy of freedom and hope.



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





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Chicago Park District Opens Grant Applications For The Nature Play Initiative Applications Are Due June 1st For A Grant Of Up To \$10,000 To Build And Support Nature Play Spaces

The Chicago Park District today announced an in-kind grant program to support the expansion of our Nature Play initiative citywide. Park advisory councils and community groups are encouraged to apply for support to build or expand a nature play space in their park by June 1st. Chicago Park District will provide grants to 10 projects, with grant funding support of up to \$10,000.

"Studies show that when children play in natural environments, they are more imaginative and cooperate better with other children. The variety of experiences available to children through nature play, including risk-taking activities, is a necessary component of youth development and the development of a future generation of conservation-minded citizens," said Michael P. Kelly, Superintendent and CEO of the Chicago Park District.

Nature Play areas are managed with a goal of at least 50% native plant coverage that provides habitat benefits for local wildlife as well as educational benefits for kids. The Park District partners with community groups to fund and maintain the spaces. The new grant program aims to aid groups at any stage of the nature play space process including design, installation, maintenance, and training. These grants aim to broaden the availability of nature play to diverse communities throughout Chicago.

Spontaneous, self-guided nature play by children has a beneficial impact on their health, attention and stress levels. With frequent, repeated visits, habitats designated or created for nature play can become safe spaces for children to develop motor skills, friendships, creativity and a sense of place in the environment of their city.

As part of Mayor Emanuel's Building on Burnham initiative, the Chicago Park District is expanding natural areas and opportunities for nature education in many parks throughout Chicago's neighborhoods. This includes building Nature Play Spaces, a new type of playground that uses natural materials to promote imaginative and child-directed play and allow children to immerse themselves in nature. Nature play spaces include elements such as stepping stones and climbing structures made from tree stumps, or loose natural materials to create and imagine with.

This OPI designation truly exemplifies Stock's belief that all children, regardless of ability level, can learn and grow when given the appropriate opportunities and supports. Child and teacher relationships are first priority; staff positively look for ways to acknowledge children's different strengths and individuality. Individualized supports are provided for children with disabilities in all group activities. Stock's philosophy of inclusion does not stop at the school doors either, as family and professional partnerships are a vital part of the school's success.

Stock will be formally honored with this newest recognition at the state's 2019 Sharing A Vision Conference. This Outstanding Practices in Inclusion recognition will remain in effect for up to three years.

Roadside History of Illinois

This is the seventeenth in a series of monthly short articles about places in Chicago, nearby suburbs and elsewhere in the state that can be visited by those who seek to learn more about local history. The articles are partial excerpts from the book, Roadside History of Illinois (Mountain Press, 2013), by Chicago author and Illinois native Stan Banash.

Bellevue Place and Mary Todd Lincoln

Bellevue Place, built in 1853 as Batavia Institute, a boarding school for teenage girls, in 1867 became a sanitarium for disturbed women. In May 1875 the institution admitted its most famous resident, Mary Todd Lincoln.

After the death of her son, Thomas (Tad) in July 1871 and having already endured the loss of two other sons, Eddie and Willie, and her husband, Mrs. Lincoln exhibited increasingly erratic behavior. After several years of this and upon the recommendations of doctors, Mary's surviving son, Robert, took legal action to institutionalize her. On May 20, 1875 at the age of 56, she was admitted to Bellevue Place owned and operated by Dr. Richard J. Patterson, who believed in "peace, quiet, and gentleness" for the care of the mentally ill.

Mrs. Lincoln occupied two rooms on the second floor in the private front part of the building. The cost was \$10 per day. According to records kept of Mrs. Lincoln's stay at Bellevue Place, she was given more freedom than was typical of patients. She often left the beautifully landscaped grounds, taking carriage rides into town, visiting friends in St. Charles, and even dining with Dr. Patterson's family. Although she did well at Bellevue, she was not happy to be confined. On September

11, after less than four months and against Dr. Patterson's advice, she was released into the care of her sister, Elizabeth Edwards, in Springfield. Legally declared of sound mind in 1876, Mary began traveling abroad, but eventually her physical health declined, and she returned to her sister's home in 1880. She died two years later, possibly from a stroke, at age sixty-three. She was interred at the Lincoln tomb in Springfield's Oak Ridge Cemetery.

Bellevue Place remained a sanitarium until 1964, when it became a residential school for unwed pregnant girls. The school relocated in the 1970s, and later, townhouses were built on the grounds. The building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976. The original hospital was converted into apartments in 1986 and is not open to the public for tours.

The former Bellevue Place, at 333 S. Jefferson Street, is located a short distance west of IL 31 in Batavia, and visitors can drive on the grounds that at one time covered 16 acres. The wings on either side of the main building were added in 1885.

The bed and dresser used by Mrs. Lincoln are on display at the Batavia Railroad Depot Museum, 155 Houston Street, in Batavia.



Scams Aimed At Veterans, Caregivers And Donors Cheat And Dishonor Vets Service

The Better Business Bureau (BBB) is warning veterans and their families of scams that may be targeting them. The scams also target those with plans to donate to a military or veteran-related cause. The BBB says veterans and civilians who are planning to donate to a charity for Veteran's day should use caution; and recommends that they research the organization and check with the BBB.

"While these types of scams represent the most common there can also be several variations of them," says Steve J. Bernas, president & CEO of Better Business Bureau serving Chicago and Northern Illinois. "It's important to remember, never give money to someone online or over the phone when you aren't 100 percent certain where it's going or what your donation will be used towards."

The most common veteran scams include:

• Charging veterans for services they could get for free or less expensively elsewhere, such as military records.

• Fraudulent investment schemes that convince veterans to transfer their assets into an irrevocable trust.

• Offering "instant approval" military loans ("no credit check," "all grades and ranks approved") that can have high interest rates and hidden fees.

• Advertising housing online with military discounts and incentives then cheating service personnel out of the security deposit.

• Trying to sell things like security systems to spouses of deployed military personnel by saying the service member ordered it to protect his or her family.

• Selling stolen vehicles at low prices by claiming to be soldiers who need to sell fast because they've been deployed.

• Posing as government contractors recruiting veterans and then asking for a copy of the job applicants' passport (that contains important personal information).

• Posing for online dating services as a lonely service member in a remote part of Iraq or Afghanistan, and then asking for money to be wired to a third party for some emergency.

If you plan on donating to a military-affiliated charity this year, here are some tips on how to avoid scams:

• Watch out for charities that sound similar to more well-known ones. Many fake veterans' charities include the same words in different order or form to appear legitimate.

• Look for a clear description of the organization's programs in its appeals and on its website. If the charity says it's helping veterans, does it explain how (financial assistance, shelter, counseling) and where it is doing so?

• Telemarketing can be a costly method of fundraising unless carefully managed. If called, do not hesitate to ask for written information on the charity and its finances before making a decision.

• Be wary of excessive pressure in fundraising. Don't be pressured to make an immediate on-the-spot donation. Legitimate charities will welcome your gift whenever you want to send it.

• If donating clothing or other goods, find out how the charity benefits from the collection and re-sale of gifts.

• Check first before giving for free with charity monitoring services like BBB's give.org. For more tips on scams, visit www.bbb.org

Although motorcycles represent 3 percent of total vehicle registrations in Illinois, they account for 15 percent of traffic fatalities. There were 1,097 traffic fatalities in Illinois in 2017 – 162 were motorcyclists, eight more than 2016, according to preliminary data.

During the riding season, Start Seeing Motorcycles banners and yard signs will be on display throughout the state, reminding the public to always stay alert for motorcycles.

A motorcycle can easily be hidden behind other vehicles so all other motorists are advised to avoid distractions and be on the lookout at all times.

The Art of Summer Grilling

Keep the grill clean with a complete top to bottom scrubbing. Start by removing the grill grates and wiping down the interior of the grill with a paper towel; or mildly abrasive sponge in order to remove any built up grease and residue. By removing grease and residue on a frequent basis you are significantly reducing the likelihood of severe flare-ups so it definitely doesn't hurt to do a full scrubbing every few months.

Start with a clean grill: Removing remnants of last night's dinner and thoroughly, cleaning your grill will decrease the chance of flare ups

and over-charring food. Using a grill brush, thoroughly clean the grates and remove food remnants. Empty drip pans and ash catchers to start with a clean slate!

Apply non-stick spray or a light coat of olive oil on the grates before turning on the grill: a well-oiled surface will keep food from sticking!

Use a meat thermometer and take the guess work out. Using a thermometer will make you less likely to OVERCOOK your meat and will give you the courage to go ahead and pull it off the grill!! No more serving "rubber chicken!"

How To Make The Best Ribs You Ever Had!

From: Jerry's Quality Meats Season ribs on both sides with "Jerry's" Barbeque

rub. Wrap each piece in foil.

Cook on grill on low, direct heat for about 15-20 minutes on each side.

Remove foil and baste on both sides with your favorite sauce.

Cook on low, direct heat for about 7-8 minutes more, on each side or until ribs

are as brown as you like them.

Remove from grill and enjoy great ribs.





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
