Columbus Day Observance, Oct. 10th



Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and became a federal holiday in 1937. However, people have celebrated Columbus's voyage since the colonial period. During the four hundredth anniversary, in 1892, teachers, preachers poets and politicians used Columbus Day rituals to teach ideals of patriotism. The first official, regular Columbus Day holiday was proclaimed by Colorado governor Jesse F. McDonald in 1905 and

made a statutory holiday in 1907. In April 1934, as a result of lobbying by the Knights of Columbus, Congress and President Franklin Delano Roosevelt made October 12 a federal holiday under the name Columbus Day.

Rabbi Posner's Yom Kippur Message

This Wednesday is my dear wife's birthday. Like every year, I will not get her a cake on her birthday. I will not buy her a gift on her birthday—we will not even go out to a restaurant. And I am not a bad husband, I think. You see, my wife was born on Yom Kippur, the holiest day on the Jewish calendar.

In fact, her parents chose to name her "Esther Yona" because she was born on this holy day.

She was named Yona (which, in addition to meaning "dove," was also the name of the Hebrew prophet whom G-d had sent to urge the people on Ninve to repent), because on Yom Kippur afternoon Jewish communities all over the world read the Book of Jonah-Yona in Hebrew.

The connection of Esther to Yom Kippur is a bit trickier, but it holds a very deep lesson. Esther, is the heroine of the miracle of Jewish survival during the Persian period chronicled in the book that bears her name. We celebrate it every year on the super-joyous holiday of Purim. Now, the word Yom Kippur(im), can also be read to mean "the day that is like Purim." This means that as special and holy as we think we may become on Yom Kippur, this is merely a reflection of that which we can attain on Purim through joy. So keep on smiling!

Now, on Yom Kippur we neither eat nor drink, living like angels for 25 hours. Since our family celebrates birthdays according to the Jewish calendar, her birthday always is on Yom Kippur. This means that she never gets a cake on her

The truth is, in a certain sense, everyone's birthday is on Yom Kippur. This is because the Chassidic masters teach that your birthday is your own personal Yom Kippur. Yom Kippur is the day when we take stock of the past year, and look forward to the coming year, seeing what we should continue and what needs improvement. In Chassidic tradition, we spend our birthdays much in the same manner, contemplating, meditating, and connecting out our souls.

But just in case you are getting worried, we don't ignore my wife's birthday. We just hold the party a few hours early. That is because on the day before Yom Kippur we feast (twice in fact) so that we have enough nourishment to carry us through the fast, and one of those feasts also doubles as a party, replete with ice-cream and all the trimmings.

As Jews all over the world prepare for this special day, I want to wish everyone a meaningful and easy fast. And to Yona: Happy birthday! Sincerely,

Governor Rauner Proclaims First Gold Star Family Day in Illinois

Governor Bruce Rauner today proclaimed September 26, 2016, as the first Gold Star Family Day in Illinois. To mark the day, the Governor attended a Gold Star Family Day event in the Capitol Rotunda with members of Gold Star families, the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs and Survivor Outreach.

"Today we honor the supportive and loving families that our American heroes left behind when they made the ultimate sacrifice," Governor Rauner said. "I want to say thank you on behalf of the people of Illinois. You have a hole in your hearts that can never be filled,

but every day you show exceptional strength and commitment to this country. This day is for you."

On Veterans Day at the Illinois State Fair in August, Governor Rauner signed HB4389 to designate the day after Gold Star Mothers' Day as Gold Star Family Day to honor and commemorate the families of men and women who gave their lives while serving with the armed forces of the United States. The new law will help bring more awareness to the sacrifices of the families of fallen service mem-

Taxes from Cook County Treasurer's Office

Pappas Urges 15,865 Owners To Pay Back \$56 Million in Sold Taxes to Avoid Losing Homes and Other Property

Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas today urged 15,865 property owners whose \$56 million in unpaid taxes have been sold to redeem quickly to avoid the danger of losing their homes, businesses or land.

Pappas said the owners can find out if their taxes have been sold by visiting her website at cookcountytreasurer.com and entering their Property Index Number (PIN) after clicking in a redbox on the home page titled "Find out if your property taxes have been sold." They

will:

- See whether the taxes on their home or other property had been sold, and
- Be given a link to the County Clerk's Office to arrange redemption (paying back the sold taxes).

At the recent Annual Tax Sale, tax buyers purchased \$56 million in unpaid taxes on 15,865 properties. The unpaid taxes were on property tax bills for Tax Year 2014, which were issued and due in 2015.

Preckwinkle Announces Cook County's New Mapping System

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle today announced that Cook County is upgrading its mapping system to better improve efficiency and services to residents and facilitate graphic representations of what would otherwise be available only as statisti-

Previously, only County employees who were experts in Geographic Information Systems (GIS) could create interactive, online map applications. Now any employee who knows how to use a simple spreadsheet that includes addresses can create an interactive web mapping app with ArcGIS Online (AGO).

Since Preckwinkle took office, she has prioritized sharing government data with the public. In 2014, Preckwinkle eliminated charges for Cook County's GIS data, making it free and more accessible to the public.

"The public has already paid for the data once with their tax dollars," President Preckwinkle said. "Making it accessible for everyone to download and use creates positive value for everyone in Cook County."

One of the first web maps to come out of Cook County AGO is the "History of Municipal Incorporation in Cook County" which can be found here. This educational "story map" presents a written history along with historical images and documents on the left side of the screen. On the right side of the screen, as you

scroll through the text, the map moves forward in time, showing each municipality's incorporation and boundary changes over time.

Another new AGO map, which helps the County operate more efficiently, is the Early Voting Sites map created by the County Clerk's office. The Clerk's office uses the map to route volunteers to the early voting site closest to them that is most in need of their help. The application keeps track of language skills and other special information per early voting site, which helps the Clerk's office send volunteers where they are needed most.

ArcGIS Online can take excel spreadsheets, data published using Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) desktop app and data created within ArcGIS Online to create a collaborative, simple-to-use, web-based app.

The phased implementation of AGO to Cook County agencies is under way. The first agencies to come on line are the County Clerk's Elections Departm ent, the Emergency Telephone System Board (ETSB) and the Department of Transportation and Highways (DOTH).

County employees and the public will still have access to existing web mapping applications; however, now County employees will have the ability to create their own custom web apps to analyze data, streamline workflows or share information with the public.

A recently enacted federal law, Accuracy for Adoptees Act, promotes greater accuracy of U.S. Birth record for foreign adopted children by allowing medical information as a factor.

In addition to representing adopting parents, Ms. Wildman currently assists adult adopted persons who search for biological family. Access to birth family information has expanded for adopted adults. Illinois law created an Adoption Registry, allowing adopted adults and their birth families to share family and updated medical information. A growing trend in other states, adopted adults born in Illinois can now apply for a copy of their original birth certificate by request to Illinois Department of Public Health [www.idph.state.il.us/vitalrecords].

U.S. House Votes to Rename Evanston Post Office in Honor of Abner J. Mikva

On Thursday, September 22, the U.S. House of Representatives voted to rename the Evanston Post Office, located at 1101 Davis St., in honor of Abner J. Mikva.

Mikva served at a high level in all three branches of the federal government, including representing Evanston and surrounding North Shore communities in the 10th congressional district in the U.S. House of Representatives.

"People in Evanston are smiling today remembering Abner Mikva," said Evanston Mayor Elizabeth Tisdahl. "He was a great man and a good man. His name should be on our post office and now it will."

Mayor Tisdahl continued, "The City of Evanston thanks Representative Jan Schakowsky for her leadership in achieving this important recognition of Abner Mikva."

After serving five consecutive terms in the

Illinois General Assembly, Mikva was elected to U.S. Congress in 1968, first serving as representative of the 2nd congressional district and later as representative of the 10th congressional district. In 1979, President Jimmy Carter appointed Mikva to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, where he served for 15 years, the last four as Chief Judge. Mikva resigned from the bench in 1994 to serve as White House Counsel for President Bill Clinton.

Mikva later returned to the Chicago area and taught at Northwestern University and the University of Chicago Law School. He and his wife, Zoe, started the Mikva Challenge, engaging 7,000 young people each year in civic leadership roles.

In 2014, President Barack Obama awarded Mikva the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honor.

More and more people are considering doing their own estate plan without the aid of a professional. What are the downsides to this? Can it be done properly? What is the risk of getting it wrong?

A good estate planning seminar should also advise you of tools to use if you have concerns about leaving money to a child who may be involved in an ugly divorce. Perhaps one of your heirs has never learned to handle money and would tear through an inheritance in no time. Children who have special needs can lose government assistance if they receive an inheritance without proper planning. And what if you think one of your heirs might someday be involved in a personal bankruptcy? Is there any way for them to protect their share of your estate? All these are matters which are touched upon during a good seminar.

At the end of a seminar there is usually a chance for a few questions from the audience if you need a point to be clarified. This is a great opportunity to have a question answered by someone who is familiar with this complex field.

There are many reasons that it takes someone with years of education and practical experience to advise you and prepare documents to accomplish your estate planning wishes. So go ahead and commit to an hour or so to take advantage of that experience at an estate planning seminar.


