# Mayor Emanuel Announces Major Investment In Midway International Airport Facilities

### Extensive Upgrades To Improve Experience For Travelers, From Parking To Security Checkpoints To Concessions

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced the largest investment plan for Midway International Airport in nearly a decade. The roughly \$248 million project will include an expansion of the concession facilities, the terminal parking garage, and security checkpoints - addressing concerns that have been raised by business travelers and tourists for years and strengthening a driver of Chicago's economy.





80,000 square foot security hall will be created, the existing pedestrian bridge over Cicero Avenue will be increased from 60 feet to 300 feet, and 20,000 square feet of new concessions space will in an optimal location. The terminal parking garage expansion, which is in the design phase will add four levels and 1,400 premium parking spaces to the terminal garage - making it easier for travelers to get in and out of the airport quickly.

Midway is a strategic regional and national transportation facility. It is premier point-to-point airport in the U.S., offering travel to 75 markets including eight international markets, and is one of the fastest growing airports in the U.S. It generates approximately \$7 billion in economic activity each year and 90,000 jobs for the region.

Southwest Airlines is the largest flight carrier at Midway, and Midway is the largest market in the airline's network.

"Midway is more than an airport. It is an important economic engine for the City of Chicago so with this modernization we are making an essential investment in the future of Midway but also the future of Chicago," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "These enhancements will create jobs for Chicago's residents, provide an improved experience for travelers from the garage to the gate, and ensure that our world class city has two world class airports."

To begin the project the City will issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a single-entity concessions operator in September, aiming to further enhance the experience for travelers, create good-paying jobs for residents and help achieve higher Airport Concessions Disadvantaged Business Enterprise participation goals. Under the project, concessions areas, stores, and restaurants will be renovated, shopping, dining, lounge facilities, spa services, and medical services will be added. The new concession areas will also feature the best of Chicago through iconic brands and concepts while providing opportunities for local businesses and residents.

An expansion of Midway's security checkpoint area will address the bottleneck that frequently occurs in the current security area, a frustration to travelers. A new

### Mayor Emanuel, Chicago Shakespeare Announce New Theater Space At Navy Pier

Mayor Emanuel, Chicago Shakespeare Theater Artistic Director Barbara Gaines, Chicago Shakespeare Executive Director Criss Henderson and Navy Pier CEO Marilynn Gardner today announced a new performance venue, The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare.

The new theater space announcement comes during Navy Pier's centennial year and underscores the Mayor's commitment to reinvigorate the attraction. In November 2015, the Mayor announced Shakespeare 400 Chicago, a yearlong international arts festival celebrating the vibrancy, relevance and reach of Shakespeare.

"Creating this state-of-the-art performance venue is another step in the redevelopment of Navy Pier to ensure that it remains one of Chicago's premier centers for commerce but also for culture and I want to thank Chicago Shakespeare for their tremendous contribution to that effort," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "There is no better time to announce this new performance space than in the year when we will bring local and international artists together for Shakespeare 400 Chicago, which will keep the spirit of Shakespeare alive in our schools and on our stages. I look forward to watching The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare become one of Chicago's next great cultural jewels for years to come."

Navy Pier's Centennial Celebration will kick off with the opening of the new Ferris wheel on May 27, followed by the unveiling of the Polk Bros Fountain and Plaza, Louis Vuitton America's Cup World Series Chicago from June 10 through 12, 4th of July celebration, Tall Ships Chicago from July 27 through 31, and the opening of The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare in Fall 2017.

### Mayor Emanuel Appoints Eddie Johnson as Interim Police Superintendent

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced today that he is appointing Eddie Johnson, the current Chief of Patrol, to serve as the Interim Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department, and plans to ask the Chicago Police Board to conduct a new search process for the Police Superintendent position.

"I am deeply appreciative of the time and hard work the Police Board put into this search. The three candidates I interviewed have distinguished careers in law enforcement and they all impressed me with their commitment to public safety," said Mayor Emanuel. "However, as our city works through the challenges ahead, it is more important than ever that we find the right person who knows our city and can provide the level of safety every resident deserves, lift the morale of Chicago's police officers, and build on the work that's been done to restore trust and accountability in the police department."

Eddie Johnson is a Chicago native who grew up in Cabrini-Green until he was 9-years-old before moving to Washington Heights where he remains today. He joined CPD as a patrolman in May 1988, and has held a number of leadership positions in the Department's Bureau of Patrol -- ranging from patrolman to sergeant, lieutenant in the 15th District, Commander in the 6th District, Deputy Chief for Area Central, Executive Officer, and Chief of Patrol. Johnson is a member of the Executive Board of NOBLE's Chicago Chapter, and has received a number of awards -- including department commendations, Chicago Defender Men of Excellence Award, and others.

Interim Superintendent Johnson had a strong track record in fighting crime, notably as the deputy chief of patrol for Area Central. Under his leadership, Area Central led the city in 2013 with a 32% reduction in firearm related violence, lowering the number of murders, shootings and shooting victims in Area Central. And during his tenure as the Deputy Chief of Area Central in 2014, his team continued to drive down firearm related violence. Under his watch, Area Central patrol drove down shootings by an additional 27% -- double the shooting reduction of other Areas in the city at the time.

The Mayor has worked with Interim Superintendent Johnson over the past five years and believes he is the right person for the job and this time. The Mayor came to this decision following months of conversations with a wide range of individuals, including police officers, community leaders, clergy, aldermen, law enforcement experts and others from which he gathered input on what they believe are the key attributes needed for someone to lead the Chicago Police Department.

"Appointing the next Police Superintendent is one of the most important responsibilities I have as mayor, and that's why I've approached it deliberately and carefully. Throughout his career at the police department, Eddie has proven to be a terrific leader and fair boss who puts his officers first and has their backs. He has also been willing to hold officers accountable when necessary. I have full confidence that in the coming months he will run this department just like he has approached his other command positions -- with independence, hard work, and a love for this police department," Mayor Emanuel said. "On behalf of the entire city of Chicago I want to express my gratitude to John Escalante for stepping in and stepping up to lead the police department at an incredibly challenging time and an incredibly challenging juncture. I look forward to continuing to work with him in the years ahead."

The Mayor will work together with the Police Board on the timing of the second search.




## The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie -**April 22 to May 8**

We've all had that special mentor in our life, the person who inspired us to grow and stretch, and exceed our own expectations to reach our full potential. It may have been a parent, a coach, a member of the clergy, or even a teacher. As parents, we trust these people to guide our children appropriately. But what happens when

that trust is misplaced? This theme is explored in the award-winning play The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie.

Jean Brodie is an unconventional teacher in a very conservative school. She is in the business of putting old heads on young shoulders, and all of her special girls are "la crème de la crème". She dresses in colorful, fashionable clothes, and shares stories with her students of her love affairs and trips abroad instead of teaching history and math. Her bohemian approach to education is



exciting to her girls, and horrifying to her peers in 1930's Scotland.

But Brodie gets very wrapped up in her private life. She is, "in her prime." As she indulges more and more in her narcissism, she looses sight of her girls, and has permanent and dangerous effects on them.

The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie was originally a book written by Muriel Spark. It was adapted into a play by Jay Presson Allen, and is notorious for the stars it attracts for it's leading lady. Vanessa Redgrave originated the role in the London production in 1966, and Maggie Smith won an Oscar for her role in the movie.

Megan Wells stars as Jean Brodie in the MadKap production at Skokie Theatre. Wells is a nationally-renowned actress, director, and story-teller who has appeared in Skokie in her one-woman adaptations of Dracula and The Great Gatsby. She has looked forward to playing this role through her entire career, having made her professional stage debut in this play as Sandy, the smartest and most capable of Brodie's proteges. That torch is passed to Josephine Longo, who makes her Skokie Theatre debut in this production. Others in the cast include Jeff Broitman, Lili Cleveland, Austin Cornett, Maxwell Downs, Caitlin Dunlap, Ariel Henry, Courtney Miller, Stephanie Murphy, Amy Ticho, Brianna Valentine, and Grace Wilkerson.

A play set in the 1930's with a large cast and multiple scenes and locations can be quite a challenge for a costume designer. Deerfield resident Patti Halajian is rising to the occasion, creating and sewing original designs based on authentic patterns from the period. Other designs include sets and props by Gordon Leibowitz and lighting by Andrew Vanderbye.

The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie opens on April 22 with nine performances through May 8. Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30 pm, Sundays at 2:00 pm, and a special matinee performance on Wednesday, April 27 at 1:30 pm. Tickets are \$34 general admission, \$29 for seniors, and \$24 for students. Many parks offer early morning and late-day sessions as well. Fees vary depending on location, offerings and hours.

Family Discount

When patrons register for two or more programs for family members less than 18 years of age in one transaction, the order qualifies for a 10% discount on the less expensive program(s).

Discount is available for online and in-person orders, but cannot be combined with the CHA or DCFS discount programs. All family members should be entered into one account on the Chicago Park District's registration system.

Financial Assistance

The Chicago Park District has limited funds available to provide financial assistance for families who wish to enroll in the 2016 summer day camp program. Applicants that do not qualify for financial assistance may inquire about the payment plan option at their local park.

Summer Food Service Program

In accordance with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) federal regulations, the Chicago Park District will participate in the Summer Food Service Program in conjunction with summer day camp. Lunches and/or snacks will be provided for enrolled children at most camps.

# Mayor Emanuel, Chicago Shakespeare Announce New Theater Space At Navy Pier The Yard At Chicago Shakespeare Is The Latest Investment In The Revitalization Of Navy Pier

Mayor Emanuel, Chicago Shakespeare Theater Artistic Director Barbara Gaines, Chicago Shakespeare Executive Director Criss Henderson and Navy Pier CEO Marilynn Gardner today announced a new performance venue, The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare.

The new theater space announcement comes during Navy Pier's centennial year and underscores the Mayor's commitment to reinvigorate the attraction. In November 2015, the Mayor announced Shakespeare 400 Chicago, a yearlong international arts festival celebrating the vibrancy, relevance and reach of Shakespeare.

"Creating this state-of-the-art performance venue is another step in the redevelopment of Navy Pier to ensure that it remains one of Chicago's premier centers for commerce but also for culture and I want to thank Chicago Shakespeare for their tremendous contribution to that effort," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "There is no better time to announce this new performance space than in the year when we will bring local and international artists together for Shakespeare 400 Chicago, which will keep the spirit of Shakespeare alive in our schools and on our stages. I look forward to watching The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare become one of Chicago's next great cultural jewels for years to come."

At a cost of \$35 million, the project repurposes components of the venue formerly known as Skyline Stage, located adjacent to Chicago Shakespeare. The Yard is connected to the existing facility, which currently houses two theaters, through expanded lobbies. The year-round, flexible venue can be configured in a variety of shapes and sizes with audience capacities ranging from 150 to 850, defining the audience–artist relationship to best serve each production.

The Yard will be Chicago Shakespeare's third stage and, together with the two existing performance spaces, positions the Theater to amplify its artistic vision and community impact—expanding audiences and its service to Chicago schools through its nationally recognized arts-in-education programs.

"We've long needed a third theater, but we knew that a fixed theatrical space would not serve next-generation theater makers or the artistic ambition of our company" shared Chicago Shakespeare's Artistic Director and founder Barbara Gaines. "The Yard will offer a new kind of venue, one that allows us the freedom to reconfigure and recalibrate a playing space each time we approach it. The Yard has been designed as a fun, responsive theater that will adapt to artistic impulses. It offers the volume for us to dream bigger, engaging future audiences in surprising and provocative ways."

"The Yard demonstrates that a creative, yet economical approach can revitalize an existing facility and transform it into a world-class resource for education and entertainment," noted Executive Director Criss Henderson. "By adding The Yard, Chicago

Shakespeare's home will feature three diverse theatrical platforms: an Elizabethanstyle courtyard theater; an intimate studio theater; and a flexible 'state of the imagination' theatrical yenue.

Thanks to our partnership with Navy Pier and the generosity of a community of donors, this expanded campus will allow us to foster the work of the leading theater artists of our time; produce and present theater that breaks traditional boundaries of expression; extend popular productions; and double our service to students and teachers."

The development of The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare marks a significant milestone in transforming the Pier's 50 acres of premier urban waterfront into a spectacular, global destination and treasure for Chicago and its guests.

The redevelopment builds on the strengths of the Pier—its singular location along the edge of Lake Michigan and downtown Chicago, its size and scale and its programmatic richness. It seeks to enhance the experience for current guests while drawing new audiences with evening and year-round entertainment and cultural attractions. In addition, Navy Pier is reimagining its arts and discovery programming, as well as its 13-acre entrance, now known as Polk Bros Park, with new multi-stage performance lawns, public fountain and expansive promenade.

"Chicago Shakespeare and Navy Pier have had a visionary partnership since the forward-thinking decision to bring the Theater to our venerable civic space in 1999," explained Marilynn Gardner, President and CEO of Navy Pier, Inc. "With the Theater's proven track record for serving the community and creating award-winning performances, we are confident that this investment will lead to a successful second act. This expansion, new dining options and the completion of the Pierscape plan will not only enhance the theater-going experience for guests, it will continue to elevate Navy Pier as a major cultural destination and growing draw for worldwide visitors to Chicago."

Building on the Theater's 16-year partnership in residence on Navy Pier, The Yard will be funded through a \$15 million investment by Navy Pier, Inc. along with \$20 million in capital funding raised through Chicago Shakespeare's Our City, Our Shakespeare Campaign.

Navy Pier's Centennial Celebration will kick off with the opening of the new Ferris wheel on May 27, followed by the unveiling of the Polk Bros Fountain and Plaza, Louis Vuitton America's Cup World Series Chicago from June 10 through 12, 4th of July celebration, Tall Ships Chicago from July 27 through 31, and the opening of The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare in Fall 2017.

### Women's History And Social Security

March is Women's History Month — a time to focus not just on the past, but on the challenges women continue to face in the 21st century.

Ida May Fuller, born on September 6, 1874, was the first American to receive a monthly Social Security benefit check. Along with Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins — who was instrumental in the creation of the Social Security Act — Ida May Fuller was one of the first famous women of Social Security. She received the check, amounting to \$22.54, on January 31, 1940. Back then, people understood that she would be one of millions that would be positively affected by retirement benefits.

Seventy-six years after that first check, Social Security continues to play a vital role in the lives of women. With longer life expectancies than men, women tend to live more years in retirement and have a greater chance of exhausting other sources of income. With the national average life expectancy for women in the United States rising, many women will have decades to enjoy retirement. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, a girl born today can expect to live more than 80 years. As a result, experts generally agree that if women want to ensure that their retirement years are comfortable, they need to plan early and wisely.

#### What you can do

"The best place to begin is by knowing what you can expect to receive from Social Security, and how much more you are likely to need to enjoy a comfortable retirement," said Carolyn W. Colvin, Social Security's Acting Commissioner and a Social Security pioneer woman in her own right.

You can start with a visit to Social Security's Retirement Estimator. There, in just a few minutes, you can get a personalized, instant estimate of your retirement benefits. Plug in different scenarios, such as retirement ages or projected earnings, to get an idea of how such things might change your future benefit amounts. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov/estimator.

You should also visit Social Security's financial planning website at www.socialse-curity.gov/planners. It provides detailed information about how marriage, widow-hood, divorce, self-employment, government service, and other life or career events can affect your Social Security.

Your benefits are based on your earnings, so you should create your personal my Social Security account to verify that your earnings were reported correctly.


