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In Memory

The buzz of the news media personnel and their interviewing people shocked with the news: "The President is Dead." Did we not all experience utter shock and sorrow as the news spread throughout the United States ... throughout the world ... throughout each mind and heart upon hearing of this tragedy of Polish President Lech Kaczynski and 95 others, who were all, in one way or another, very important at this time in Poland's history: political, economic, legislative leaders ... and Chicago's own artist/sculptor, Wojciech Seweryn.

Not too long ago, Seweryn completed a tribute to the "slaughter," in the Katyn Forest of 20,000 highly influential Polish military and intelligencia, who 70 years ago, after the Second World War, would be capable of leading the Nation at the end of the Soviet and Nazi war, which tore Poland apart. Seweryn's Father was one of the 20,000 massacred at Katyn.

At the entrance gate of St. Adalbert's Cemetery in Niles, the large cross with angelic wings, the statue of the Blessed Mother holding her own Son in her lap at the foot of this cross ... another Pieta, was the design and the dream of Wojciech. Another tribute at this monument was meant to be held in the first days of May, when President Kaczynski was to be in Chicago for the Polish Independence Day parade.

There was supreme joy in the Seweryn household that Wojciech was invited to the original location in the Katyn Forest for the 70th anniversary memorial as part of the presidential delegation ... accompanying President Kaczynski on the Polish Air One.

The questions are many: why were so many political, economic, military and influential Polish people on one flight?

The Polish are accustomed to walking in pilgrimage for miles - even days - in the annual tribute to Our Lady of Czestochowa during the month of August. Thousands march from St. Michael Church on South Shore Drive to Merrilville, IN in a prayerful procession. Two thousand Poles marched along Milwaukee Avenue from the original "port of entry" of years ago (Division and Milwaukee) to St. Hyacinth Basilica (Milwaukee and Central Park) to celebrate at Mass the death of another most beloved world leader, the Polish Pope, John Paul II.

On Sunday, April 11th, three hundred walked from Chopin Park (Long at Belmont) to St. Hyacinth Basilica Parish.

As three thousand people filled the Basilica, they heard each name of the deceased announced individually. They came to pray for each of them.

Afterwards they struggled to find the words which would somehow express how they felt about the tragedy ... words of grief ... words of gratitude ... words of hope ... words of love of Country ... for the leadership which is bringing Poland from the grips of Communism.

From this difficult and painful, yet communal experience, strong and peaceful might describe the sentiments of these Polish people: powerless and helpless, yet strong; sad, yet divinely peaceful; broken, yet whole.

It is faith in God which unites the praying community, connecting this world with divine life. All that matters is simply a communion of people with no words needed. The deaths of our brothers and sisters bring us all together here, and at many other churches where the memory of these people will be celebrated in masses at various churches throughout the world.

Eucharist is thanksgiving.

They rest in peace. May they inspire us to live in the memory of Katyn of 70 years ago and the Katyn of today.

We remember ... their patriotism ... love of Country and family.

We celebrate ... their dedication.

We believe ... we will see them in the eternal life.



JUST AROUND THE CORNER: THE 2010 TALKING PICTURES FESTIVAL

Now in its second year, the 2010 Talking Pictures Festival takes place May 6 - 9 in Evanston and celebrates independent films from around the world mixed with brand new offerings by local filmmakers. From animation to documentaries and fiction films, this year's four-day festival features 18 full-length films and five programs of shorts, including regional premieres from the US, Japan, Israel, Canada and Georgia/Kazakhstan, among others.

The 2010 Talking Pictures Festival opens with the regional premiere of George Ovashvili's THE OTHER BANK (Georgia/Kazakhstan), winner of the Grand Jury Prize at the Seattle International Film Festival. THE OTHER BANK draws strong performances from non-professional actors as it follows a child's dangerous journey across a war-ravaged land. "Kinderchor" to Celebrate 75 Years

In today's ever changing world, it is rare to find an organization that has thrived for 75 years and still holds true to the tenets on which it was founded. But so it is with the renowned German-American Children's Chorus, more commonly known as "Kinderchor" (children's choir), as they prepare for a gala anniversary concert and dinner-dance on Sunday, May 16 at the Avalon Ballroom in Elk Grove Village.

It was 1935 when the flourishing men's and ladies' German choruses in Chicago gave birth to the "Deutsch-Amerikanischer Kinderchor" (German-American Children's Choir). Founded by active members of the United Male Choruses of Chicago, the Kinderchor was formed for children ages five through fourteen.

The large number of children who enrolled in those early years necessitated the formation of four groups in the Chicago area by geographical region: The young group flourished and gained recognition by performances at Chicago's International Amphitheater as 3,000 children's voices were raised at the 1938 National Saengerfest of the Nord Amerikanischer Saengerbund. Another performance accompanied by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra earned the Kinderchor a special citation which is on file in the United States Library of Congress. The four groups continued successfully until membership began to decline and in 1958 the then two remaining North and South Side groups merged under the direction of Mr. Ludwig Lohmiller until his retirement in 1972. Successor directors Marilyn Kern and Rose Dick, together with their very able assistants, kept Kinderchor in the spotlight and allowed them to remain a bright shining star in Chicago's German-American Community.

Today, the same dynamic energy and enthusiastic spirit remains imbedded within Kinderchor. Under the very capable direction of Ms. Carol Himmel, Kinderchor remains focused on fostering its heritage through song in today's multi-ethnic environment. The children perform two major concerts annually – a Mothers' Day and a Christmas Concert – and are in great demand to perform at numerous civic, community and ethnic functions. Most recently, they performed in concert on April 3 at the Irish-American Heritage Center with the world-famous Bielefelder Kinderchor from Bielefeld, Germany.

In June 2002, Kinderchor undertook its first successful concert tour through Germany and a second European tour in 2007 with performances in Munich, Salzburg, Passau, Reutlingen and Seefeld. Between tours was a visit to Florida's Disney World and EPCOT – and whether Germany, Austria or Florida, the friendship, music and travel are experiences the children will remember throughout their lives.

The gala 75th anniversary concert and dinner-dance will be a celebration to remember for all attendees – but will provide former Kinderchor members with a unique opportunity to reunite, recollect and rekindle friendships enjoyed while being a part of Kinderchor's history. Recycling In Skokie Is Easier Than You Think

Skokie residents have the opportunity to make a significant contribution to the environment through the Village's comprehensive weekly curbside recycling program. Each single-family residence is provided with 65-gallon carts for recyclable materials. Skokie's recycling collection is provided by Groot Recycling and Waste Services, the firm with which the Village contracts for service.

By choosing to recycle residents can reduce pollution, create jobs and conserve natural resources and energy. All items that are recycled do not have to be disposed of in a landfill, creating a savings to the community.

Collection of recyclable materials occurs every week in single-family residential areas. The total weight of the filled recycling cart shouldnot exceed 150 pounds. Please flatten large boxes and place them next to the cart. Please do not mix garbage or landscape waste in the recycling cart. Please try to minimize food waste remaining in recyclable containers. In curbside collection areas, please set out recyclingcontainers by 7 a.m. on the day of pickup, but not before 6 p.m. on the night before collection.

Materials accepted in the recycling program include: aluminum cans, foil & tins; steel, tin, and bi-metal cans; empty/dry steel paint cans; empty aerosol cans; glass containers - all colors; plastic containers marked 1-5, 7; beverage six-pack rings; plastic grocery bags; plastic newspaper bags; foam egg cartons; small plastic foam trays; newspaper; magazines; catalogs; phone books; junk mail; gift wrap; white paper; corrugated cardboard; chipboard (cereal boxes, etc.) and colored paper. All boxes should be flattened. Soiled cardboard is not recyclable.

If refuse and recycling are not properly packaged for disposal, the Village may ticket the property owner and/or decline pickup of these items. Please contact the Public Works Department with questions at 847/933-8427.

Ordinance to Ban Hand-held Cell Phones While Driving Takes Effect - Police to Conduct Educational Enforcement Action

Evanston Police will begin an educational enforcement program to help inform motorists about the city's newly enacted ordinance making it illegal to engage in communication on a hand-held mobile telephone while driving. The ordinance was put forth by 7th Ward Alderman Jane Grover.

"The data shows that distracted driving, using a cell phone while driving, quadruples the risk of an accident," explained Grover. "The ordinance will help reduce that risk in Evanston. When drivers try to manage their phone and their car at the same time, safety always loses out."

Drivers, while operating a vehicle in Evanston, must use a hands free system which allows them to talk on the phone but at the same time keep their hands on the wheel and their eyes on the road. Prohibited mobile telephone usage also includes text messaging, sending, reading or listening to electronic messages or browsing the internet. The ordinance calls for a \$50 fine for violators, with and additional penalty not to exceed \$200 if the violation occurs at the time of a traffic accident.

Illinois law already bans texting while driving. The City's new ordinance also bans texting while driving but additionally prohibits web browsing or listening to voice mail while driving. The City ordinance permits drivers to talk on the phone while driving if they use a hands-free device.

"This new ordinance puts Evanston in line with a handful of other Illinois communities that have banned the use of hand held devices while driving," said Grover. "All Evanston residents support increased safety on our streets, whether they are in a car, on a bike, or walking across a street."

THE STEM OF STUDENT SUCCESS

Niles Township High School District 219 STEM Labs Win National Award If you walk down the science corridor at Niles North or Niles West High School, you will reach a large window that displays a setting unlike any other within the schools. It is like looking into an aquarium, only instead of plants and ornaments, there are sophisticated technologies and scientific equipment. Most exciting is what is happening within these high-tech industrial labs: tomorrow's engineers and scientists are researching, interacting, and exploring.

They are called STEM (science/technology/engineering/mathematics) labs, and educators from 30 high schools and 8 colleges and universities within Illinois have visited Niles Township High School District 219 (D219) to tour them. Now the labs have attained a national platform.

The National School Boards Association (NSBA) has awarded the D219 STEM labs a citation in its 2010 Exhibition of School Architecture. Only three other educational projects in the nation received the distinction.


According to NSBA, "The jury was very impressed with this well thought-out design. The STEM labs have the feel and look of commercial labs. Special features within the layout, such as the Think Tank area, provide excellent opportunities for students to brainstorm and collaborate on scientific issues. The jury felt these multi-disciplines represent a best practice for STEM laboratories."

The projects will be displayed April 10 - 12 at the 2010 NSBA Conference in Chicago. Over 5,000 board members, superintendents, and other educational leaders from throughout the U.S. are expected to attend the conference to discuss ways to improve student achievement.

"The D219 STEM labs cross the professional research laboratory with features of a traditional production shop," says James McDonough, director of education at Legat Architects, Inc. "It's all about promoting curricular integration and getting students excited about exploring, researching, and solving real life problems."

Remodeled from existing space within the high schools, each lab is about 3,000 SF and has two primary zones. The Think Tank area supports presentations, conferencing, and thinking out loud. It includes full AV input and output, a plasma TV, projectors/screens, and interactive white boards. In the Lab Zone, students have everything they need to apply lessons toward invention and problem solving: flexible configurations, storage, places to plug in, and equipment. The Lab Zone further divides into areas for physics, chemistry, and biology.

Dr. Nanciann Gatta, D219 Superintendent, says, "Our new STEM research centers at Niles North and Niles West provide opportunities for our students to collaborate with each other to carry out sophisticated research, communicate with e-mentors and peers throughout the world, and gain a competitive advantage as they seek college entrance. The STEM centers will better equip our students with the skills they need to build successful careers as scientists, mathematicians, engineers and researchers."

Urban Wildlife Coalition:

Spring Urban Wildlife Tips

Spring is a wonderfully busy time for urban wildlife. Take advantage of the season and our wild neighbors by enjoying nature hikes, watching the dazzling array of birds in our area, and following these tips.

Drive carefully, especially near forest preserves, parks, and other natural areas. Especially later in the spring, inexperienced young animals may venture out into the road. Be especially cautious during the dawn and dusk hours. Keep to the speed limit; allow enough space between cars; and scan the edges of the road.

In spring, animals like squirrels, mice, raccoons, and foxes are looking for ideal nesting sites. If you prefer not to host wildlife in your home, prevention is key – so much easier than trying to rid your home of unwanted visitors later. Take an hour or two now to inventory your home for possible entry sites, and seal them before new residents move in. If wildlife has already started unpacking, a bit of patience goes a long way. Try to wait until newborns are on their own before trying to evict wildlife visitors.

Keep cats indoors. Outdoor pets are the leading cause of wildlife deaths in the spring.

Animals are establishing new nests in the spring, so avoid cutting trees and shrubs and applying pesticides and herbicides.

Think strategic gardening. Want to attract wildlife to your backyard? Consider plants and landscaping that lure birds, butterflies, and others. Hoping to deter animals from your garden? Now's the time to think about growing plants they do not enjoy and building fences around the types they do. Look to the next issue of Our Village for specific gardening tips.

The Writers' Theatre in Glencoe, Illinois, is honoring Black History Month with their production of John Henry Redwood's play "The Old Settler."

I know I've seen the show once before but I don't remember if it was at "The Goodman Theatre," "Court Theatre," "Steppenwolf Theatre" or "Northlight Theatre."

While it takes two and a half hours to tell this warm, heart-breaking story with intermission it is an engrossing evening of theatre and it does have some funny scenes.

Ron OJ Parson has done a wonderful job in his direction and casting with Cheryl Lynn Bruce as Elizabeth Borny, Wanda Christine as Quillly McGarth, Kevin Rosten, Jr. as Husband and Alexis J. Rogers as Lou Bessie Preston.

The play is set in Harlem in the spring of 1943. Elizabeth and Quilly are sisters who share their quiet lives together. When Elizabeth encounters Husband who is from the country she invites him to rent a room since he is having a difficult time adjusting to the Big City.

Every actor in this production that is poetic, lyrical, melancholy, has its humor gives a powerful performance. Chicago Philharmonic Presents Blockbuster **Beethoven's Ninth: Ode to Joy**

The Chicago Philharmonic will present the classical masterpiece Beethoven's Ninth: "Ode to Joy" on May 2, 2010 at 7 p.m. at Pick-Staiger Hall in Evanston. The concert will feature rising stars from the Ryan Center for Young Artists at Lyric Opera and the North Shore Choral Society. Larry Rachleff will conduct.

The evening will open with a cappella excerpts from 'The Peaceable Kingdom' by Randall Thompson presented by the North Shore Choral Society, conducted by the Society's music director, Dr. Julia Davids. The group will perform Have Ye Not Heard? and Ye Shall Have a Song. Following the choral pieces will be Beethoven's Romance for Violin and Orchestra No. 1 in G Major Opus 40 with David Perry, Violin. Beethoven's Symphony No. 9: "The Choral" presented in its entirety will conclude the evening.

One of the most influential symphonies ever written, Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 is complicated, powerful and exciting. Symphony No. 9 was Ludwig van Beethoven's last complete symphony. It was completed in 1824, only three years before his death in 1827. Beethoven was completely deaf at the time that he composed this epic piece. It is regarded by most as a masterpiece, and one of the greatest accomplishments of his very productive life. Symphony No. 9 was also the first example of a major composer incorporating voice into a symphonic work. In the fourth and final movement, Beethoven adapted a poem written by Friedrich Schiller in 1785 – An die Freude ("Ode to Joy"). The elaborate movement features four soloists and a full chorus. The North Shore Choral Society and soloists from Ryan Center for Young Artists at Lyric Opera will join the Chicago Philharmonic to deliver this final movement and the spectacular "Ode to Joy".

The Chicago Philharmonic will also welcome to the stage a small group of very talented budding young artists. As part of the orchestra's Side by Side program, in partnership with New Trier High School, seven exceptional young players have been working very hard alongside of some of the orchestra's finest mentor members. What Keeps a New Mom Up at Night Besides the Baby?

The birth of a new baby is a wondrous, joyous event. Henry David Thoreau said that "every child begins the world again." Your world certainly began anew with your new baby!

It was a long path and it all seemed to happen so fast! But, it seems like there are still so many decisions to be made now and as your baby grows from infant to toddler, to school-age, to young adult. And, who would make those decisions if something happened to you?

This program provides incentives for Illinois consumers to replace older appliances with specific residential ENERGY STAR qualified appliances, water heaters, and HVAC equipment. The new appliances must be purchased in Illinois through participating retail stores or contractors.

Illinois' program will be rolled out in two phases:

- Until April 5, 2010, consumers can get point of purchase rebates on qualifying heating and cooling equipment through participating HVAC contractors. Water heater rebates are no longer available.
- Point of purchase rebates on ENERGY STAR qualified clothes washers, dishwashers, refrigerators, freezers and room air conditioners will be available for items purchased from participating retailers during April 16 – 25, 2010.

Private Elm Tree Insurance Applications Now Available

Private Dutch Elm disease insurance is again being offered to Evanston residents through the City of Evanston's Park/Forestry Division. While the City maintains elm trees on public property, homeowners are responsible for removing diseased elms from their private property. Costs for removing diseased trees can range from \$1,000 for a medium-sized tree to more than \$4,000 for a very large tree.

The Private Elm Tree Insurance Program covers the cost of removing trees lost to Dutch Elm disease. If an insured tree is so infected that it must be removed, the City will handle all aspects and costs of the removal to ground level.

Removal of the remaining stump is up to the homeowner. Costs for the private insurance range from \$60 to \$140 per tree, per year, depending on a tree's size. This is a one-year insurance program, and new applications must be submitted each year.

Salmon Braise with Tomatoes and Peppers (Moroccan style)

- 4 salmon steaks or fillets, about ½ pound each
- 3 tomatoes, cut in chunks
- 2 red peppers
- 2 green bell peppers
- 3 garlic cloves crushed
- 2 large shallots -chopped
- 4 tbl. spoons of olive oil salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tsp. of paprika

½ tsp. of cayenne pepper

bouquet garni (parsley, thyme, bay leaf)

In a skillet, lightly brown the steaks/fillets of salmon on both sides in the oil. Cut the bell peppers open, remove the seeds, and cut it into wide strips. Cut the tomatoes into large chunks.

In a large sauté pan, heat the olive oil over moderately low heat. Add the minced garlic and shallots and stir until translucent, about 3 minutes. Add tomatoes, peppers and bouquet garni and increase the heat to moderate. Season with salt, pepper, paprika, and cayenne pepper. Cook for about 5 minutes until the flavors are well blended. Add salmon steaks/fillets and sauté for about 10 minutes. Discard the bouquet garni. Transfer to a deep serving dish, garnished with lemon slices and serve hot for the main course. 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
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
