# **Skokie Offers New Online Payment Option**

The Village of Skokie Finance Department launched a new, convenient online payment program on Tuesday, February 17, 2009. Payment for water bills, parking tickets and miscellaneous invoices may be made online using American Express, Debit, Discover, MasterCard and Visa cards. The Village does not charge a fee for this service.

Previously, the only electronic payment option was available for water bills, through the State of Illinois Treasurer's Office. A convenience fee was charged for this program by the Treasurer's Office.

The Village will still offer Automatic Bank Payment for water bills. This program lets residents pay water bills directly through a checking account. The Village does not charge a fee for this service.

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# **Grand Opening of Evanston Fire Station 5**

The men and women of the Evanston Fire Department warmly welcome you to join civic and community leaders, including Mayor Morton, Alderman Moran and Fire Chief Alan Berkowsky at the grand opening of the Evanston's newest Fire Station and the Public Art Dedication:

Friday, Feb. 27th, 2009, 3:00 PM - 5:00 PM, Ribbon-Cutting at 3:15 PM New Fire Station 5, 2830 Central Street, Evanston, IL. 60201

We are pleased to announce this new facility, which is now in service and protecting the City of Evanston.

Following Friday's brief dedication ceremony, there will be a chance to tour and enjoy refreshments at Evanston's newest Fire Station.

All members of the community are warmly welcomed to this family-themed public event.

Please let us share a brief history of former Fire Station 5.

Built more than 50 years ago, Old Fire Station 5 on Central Street housed multiple firefighters and equipment over the years. The physical space as well as electrical, mechanical, and plumbing systems was no longer efficient and reliable. The space itself proved unable to support a modern and diverse workforce. Lastly, only two of the Department's fire engines were able to "fit" into the low profile apparatus doors.

Fire Station #5 was a total renovation of a 1950's era one-story fire station building consisting of the demolition and removal of the existing structure and subsequent reconstruction of a new 14,260 square foot facility on the same site. The fully sprinklered, updated station design provides three new apparatus bays including one drive-thru bay. There is a two-story living area with dorms, kitchen, a work-out area, office space and a basement for utilities. The new station is compatible with modern requirements and today's technology and is the City's first LEEDs (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) building which is a green building rating system. As a result of the LEEDs certification, the City of Evanston received a \$100,000 grant from the Illinois Clean Energy Grant Program.

The architect for the building was Muller and Muller Architects, Chicago, Illinois. CATH Associates Inc. (an Evanston firm) acted as the owner representative, working closely with the City of Evanston's Facilities Manager and the Fire Department staff during the construction of this facility. The general contractor for the project was Central Lakes Construction out of Prospect Heights.

Groundbreaking for New Fire Station 5 took place in 2007. Built at a cost of \$4.7 million and almost 2 ½ times the size of the facility it replaces, the new station opened for service on January 12, 2009.

Fire Station 5 is staffed around the clock with 3 firefighter/paramedics. The staffed advanced life support engine company supports the City's responses to more than 9,000 calls for service annually.

The men and women of the Evanston Fire Department look forward to seeing you at the Grand Opening.

# City Clerk's Office Open for Voter Registration, February 28

To facilitate voter registration, the City Clerk's office will be open from 9 a.m. to noon on two Saturdays: February 28 and March 7, 2009. Voter registration closes Tuesday, March 10 at 5 p.m. for the April 7, 2009 Consolidated Election.

Voters must re-register if they have changed their name or have moved from Chicago or from outside suburban Cook County. Two forms of identification are required to register, one of which must show name and current address. A bank statement, utility bill, apartment lease, driver's license or personal check may serve as proper identification.

Persons who are at least 18 years old, a U.S citizen (if naturalized, know court location and date) and a resident of their precinct for at least 30 days may register to vote.

#### New Property Tax Bills Are Due March 3, Pappas Says

A due date of March 3, 2009, is on tax bills being mailed to Cook County property owners, Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas said today.

The bills are for the first installment of tax year 2008 on some 1.8 million homes and other parcels of real estate in Cook County, the nation's second-largest county.

Pappas said payment can be made:

- Electronically, from a checking or savings account at cookcountytreasurer.com.
- In person, at more than 330 Chase Banks, including 68 at Dominick's stores.
  - In person, by direct debit at 220 participating community banks.
  - By return mail, postmarked no later than March 3, 2009.

For on-line payment, owners should have their 14-digit Property Index Number available. For other forms of payment, owners should write the PIN on all checks, returning the payment coupon by mail and having the bill with the payment coupon when making payment at banks

Owners can call 312.443.5100, enter the PIN and get the bill amount in English, Polish or Spanish.

During and following the impeachment trial, Durkin appeared on FOX News, CNN, PBS, the BBC, all the national and local evening network newscasts, and was quoted in the Wall Street Journal, New York Times and USA Today.

In January 1995, Durkin became an Illinois State Representative in the 44th district. In 2002, Durkin was the Republican nominee for United States Senate but was unsuccessful in his bid to defeat U.S. Senator Dick Durbin. In 2006, Jim was appointed to fill a vacancy in the 82nd House District and has since successfully run for re-election.

In 2000 and 2008, Durkin was State Chairman for U.S. Senator John McCain's presidential campaigns and served as Chairman for the Illinois Delegation at the 2008 Republican National Convention in Minneapolis.

#### **Grey Wolves Removed from Endangered Species Act**

On January 14, the Department of the Interior announced that it was removing Montana and Idaho gray wolves from the Endangered Species list while the Wyoming gray wolves would remain on the list.

The National Wildlife Federation opposes this decision, because while humans may acknowledge state lines, the Northern Rocky Mountain population of gray wolves does not. Wolves in Montana and Idaho need the same treatment as wolves in Wyoming.

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# Legends of the Lake

The sky is crisp blue. It is 19 degrees with a bracing 10- mile-per-hour wind whipping from the west. The beach sand is slushy and the lake is crusted with ice. Perfect day for ... a swim?!

Milwaukeeans Gustav Marx, Frank Sutter, and Jim Brazell may not have been the first to brave the frigid waters of a midwinter Lake Michigan, but in 1916, newspaper reporters cap-



tured the moment and the "polar bears" became famous. So much for Midwestern sensibility.

The tradition lives on. Today, daredevils with cold hands and warm hearts, strip down to their skivvies, and chill for charity.

Polar plunges have become successful fundraisers for philanthropic organizations. More than 40 Special Olympics Polar Plunges take place around the country each year, raising \$10 million. Here in Chicago, the ninth annual icebreaker happens March 1 at North Avenue Beach.

Want to try some winter wading? Dipping tips:

Lake Michigan rarely freezes completely. In fact, generally, ice only covers half the lake's surface.

Early March lake temperatures at North Avenue Beach should be in the thermal low- to mid-30s (August averages are in the mid-70s)

The human body cools 25 times faster in cold water than in air.

Taking the plunge? Wear water shoes or sneakers for rocks, ice, and the frozen beach. Avoid changing into clothes with buttons or zippers – frozen fingers don't work so well.

#### **Spring Home Critter-Proofing Tips**

As spring approaches, many urban animals like raccoons, rats, and squirrels are house shopping, trying to find a cozy place to raise a family. A wild animal in your home can be distressing, even for the most ardent animal lovers. Take preventive measures now to avoid more difficult removal later.

Top-to-Bottom Inventory and Troubleshooting – allow several hours in the daytime for this assessment

Gather binoculars and a flashlight. Bring a camera if you'd like to document problem areas for professional service.

#### Attic

Is anyone home? See if animals are currently living there. (track marks, droppings, holes, nesting materials).

Turn off lights – daylight shining through will indicate gaps or holes that should be filled.

Never seal a hole if you suspect an animal may be in your home. You'll block its escape route and trap it indoors.

#### Chimney

Shine flashlight up the chimney looking for animal indicators, especially on the damper and smoke shelf.

Certain no animals are present? Install a rugged, animal-proof chimney cap.

#### Foundation

Check for possible entrances, with special attention to places where different building materials meet: window wells, exhaust vents, siding cracks, etc. Small openings can be filled with caulk, foam, or copper mesh. Larger openings should be repaired before the cold weather sets in.

Again, take precautions. Make sure your home is animal-free before sealing any gaps.



Mistakes on your tax return can be costly, both in time and money. Review this list of the 12 most common mistakes before filing your return and double check to make sure you avoid them.

*Math Mistakes* – Double check all the figures on your return; have someone else check it over; and use a calculator.

*Incorrect or Illegible Address* – Incorrect address can delay processing of your return, or cause IRS correspondence to go to the wrong address

Incorrect Filing Status or Checking Multiple Filing Status Boxes – You could lose out on valuable deductions if you make a mistake here.

Not Using the Correct Tax Table or the Correct Column in the table – Double Check yourself

Incorrect or Missing Social Security Number

Incorrect Number in Direct Deposit bank account number – this can cause your money to float between financial institutions and be a night-mare to straighten out.

*Incomplete or Missing Documentation* – Attach all the appropriate forms (W-2s, 1099s, etc.) Failure to do so may prompt the IRS to make its own adjustments

# FBI: Don't be Fooled by Work-at-Home Scams

The FBI and the Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) continue to receive numerous complaints from individuals who have fallen victim to work-at-home scams and remind consumers to be vigilant when seeking employment online.

These work-at-home schemes are designed by criminals to gain the trust of job seekers in order to take advantage of working relationships to further illegal activity. Most victims do not even realize they are engaging in criminal behavior until it is too late.

In many of the reported scams, victims are often hired to "process payments," "transfer funds," or "reship products." However, these scams exploit unwitting employees by having them cash fraudulent checks, transfer illegally obtained funds for the criminals, or receive stolen merchandise and ship it to the criminals.

Other scams entice victims to sign up to be a "mystery shopper," receiving fraudulent checks with instructions to cash the checks and wire the funds to "test" a company's services. Victims are told they will be compensated with a portion of the merchandise or funds.

Job scams also often provide criminals the opportunity to commit identity theft when victims provide their personal information, sometimes even bank account information, to their potential "employer." The criminal/employer can then use the victim's information to open credit cards, post online auctions, register websites, etc., in the victim's name to commit additional crimes.

"Don't get duped by these criminals offering easy money. Remain skeptical of unsolicited job offers that sound too good to be true and report any scams you might encounter," said Richard Kolko, FBI National Press Office.

#### Bears of Hope participated in PACE's "Community Day"

I'm working on the Bears new website and when it's ready to go live, there is a link to your website and the bears articles you graciously printed in Street Level. Right now the Bears website only has a blurb about what we do and a picture gallery.

This past weekend, Bears of Hope participated in PACE's "Community Day." The PACE students are ages 18-30 years of age with multiple learning disabilities. #### **Spring Forward and Test Your Batteries**

Daylight savings time begins on Sunday, March 8, 2009 when clocks need to be set forward one hour.

The Skokie Fire Department reminds residents to check and change batteries once a year in all smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors and all emergency accessory kits to make sure they are in working condition. Replace smoke alarms every 10 years for optimal effectiveness. Follow the manufacturer's recommendation regarding carbon monoxide detector replacement, as all models vary.

Additionally, all Illinois homeowners and landlords must have carbon monoxide detectors in buildings containing bedrooms and sleeping facilities. All residential units are required to have at least one carbon monoxide alarm within 15 feet of every room used for sleeping purposes.

#### **Rabies: A Discussion for Kids**

#### What is Rabies?

Rabies is a disease that affects wild animals, domestic animals (like pets and livestock), and humans. It is caused by a virus. Only mammals (warm-blooded animals with fur) can get rabies.

The word "rabies" comes from a Latin word that means "to rage." Rabies got its name because animals with rabies sometimes act as if they are angry. Rabies attacks the brain and spinal cord. It kills you if not prevented. The best way to prevent rabies is to make sure your pets get their rabies shots and to avoid contact with wild or stray animals.

#### **History of Rabies**

People have known about rabies for a long time, as animal cases were reported in early Babylonian, Greek, and Roman records. Rabies was likely brought to the Americas when settlers first came from Europe, bringing rabid animals with them.

A 9-year-old boy was the first person to have received an effective shot for rabies. In 1885, Louis Pasteur thought that if he injected a weak form of virus from one rabid animal into another, the second animal might be able to fight off the disease. He tried this hypothesis out on the boy, he survived and lived a long life. That was how people starting giving shots for rabies.

After this success, other rabies vaccines were made. In the 1950s, people who had been bitten by a rabid animal got 23 shots along the abdomen. Today, the shots are more effective and less painful. They consist of a series of 6 shots given in the arm over a 1 month period. One shot is given around the bite and the rest are given in the arm.

#### **How Do You Get Rabies?**

You get rabies from the saliva of a rabid animal, usually from a bite. The rabies virus is spread through saliva. It is not spread through contact with urine, feces, or blood of an infected animal. You cannot get rabies by petting an animal. You may get rabies from a scratch if the animal, such as a cat, was licking its paw before it scratched you. (Remember that the rabies virus is found in the saliva of an animal).

#### What Does The Virus Do?

The targets of the rabies virus are nerve cells. The rabies virus infects the body usually through a bite from a rabid animal. Once inside the body, the virus travels along the peripheral nerves (the nerves that run throughout the body). Its main target is the central nervous system, which is made up of the brain and spinal cord.

Viruses cause disease by attacking the cells of the host They enter the host cell. Once inside, the virus makes more viruses. The host cell may die. The virus leaves the host cell and moves on to other host cells where the process starts again.


#### What Kinds Of Animals Get Rabies?

Only warm-blooded animals can get rabies. You cannot get rabies from birds, even though they are warm-blooded. Snakes and fish cannot have rabies because they are cold-blooded. In the United States, rabies is much more common in wild animals than in pets like cats or dogs. This is because most people who take good care of their pets make sure that their pets get the rabies vaccinations.

In the United States today, about 93 of every 100 reported cases of rabies are in wild animals. Most of the cases are found in raccoons, skunks, bats, and foxes. Raccoons are the most common wild animal with rabies today. Cats had the largest number of reported rabies cases in pets

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




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
